s with every winter, the Borough struggles Awith plowing on our narrow streets, and the streets must be cleaned up in the event of an emergency—ambulance or fire. So, remember, if you shovel snow onto the street, we will plow it back to the side again. Every effort is made to remove excess snow (when we have several storms in a row) to the Borough building, but this is an added expense.

Please remember residents are responsible for cleaning their sidewalks within 24 hours of a snow fall.

Christmas trees will again be picked up the first 2 weeks in January. Please leave your undecorated tree curb side and Randy or Matt will pick it up.

Water & Sewer Authority

Earlier this year, the Authority hand delivered income surveys to all customers of the McVeytown sewer system. We got a good response but since we did not do a follow-up on unanswered surveys, we are required to do that follow-up now. Therefore, the Mifflin County Planning Department will be sending out before Christmas a follow-up letter to people who did not complete the first survey. Please take the couple of minutes to respond. It is very important that we qualify for grant money for this sewer project.

The first quarter 2016 water & sewer bills will reflect the 3rd step of the 5-year fee increase announced in 2013. The bill will be \$49.85 for water and \$84.98 for sewer or a total minimum bill of \$135.24.

McVeytown Borough Council Report

There is no easy way to say it, but in formulating the 2016 budget it became necessary to impose a 2 mill tax increase. This will equate to approximately \$60 per property owner and increase the general operating budget to around \$115,000. Council does not take lightly its responsibility to appropriate and spend your tax dollars wisely. The last such increase took place during the 2008 budget.

The Borough continues to face many budgetary challenges as costs continue to escalate. Some of the line items are as follows: employee payroll; snow removal and cindering, street maintenance, heating costs, street lights and other electrical costs, building and property maintenance, legal services and the ever increasing insurances (work comp-liabilityproperty). In addition we financially support the Fire Company, Playground and Library.

So stop in the Borough Office and ask to review the budget and gain a better understanding of how your tax dollars are spent. This budget will come before Council for adoption at our December meeting and will take affect January 1, 2016.

In addition, a new service—an Ionic Detox Foot Spa—is now set up in a room designed for privacy and relaxation during your treatment.


