Borough Council, the Authority and Staff are always seeking ways to better assist our residents! As part of that, one of our newest members, Jacob Harper assisted us in building a new web page. Please visit www.mcveytownboro.com regularly to keep informed of updates.

As you all are aware, the McVeytown Borough Authority completed their sewer rehabilitation project. We are pleased with the improvements but the Authority is always looking for ways to better the services provided to our residents/business owners, while doing preventive maintenance and repairs to minimize future major increases. As part of that, we need your help. We ask every resident/business owner to check the connections in your home/business, if you have a floor drain or sump pump. McVeytown had two oil spills in the past few years, and THIS IS A VERY SERIOUS MATTER. The two events were accidents, but should not have happened at all. This has been a very serious concern that has been addressed to residents/business owners for several years. Borough Council and the Authority can't risk this happening again, and must take action.

We can't stress it enough—If you *have any floor drains and/or sump pump connections connected to the sewer system, you must have them checked and any problems corrected.* Most people don't realize the impact heating oil can have on a public sewer system and

costs associated for removal and repairs let alone the impact on the resident's home/business. Average cost can range from \$50,000 to \$100,000 or more. Some homeowner's insurance policies won't even provide this coverage. Would you be able to pay this expense? Please do your part and check your connections.

If you need assistance or guidance in checking your connections, please contact the Borough Secretary (717) 899-6323 or the Maintenance Office (717) 899-7436 to schedule an appointment.

At this time, you won't receive any fine if you are connected to the sewer system

but you must take action now to avoid future problems.

Another issue the Authority will be working on is grease traps. If you are a business owner, please be advised, this is another area we will be investigating as a preventative measure to maintain our sewer system.

We are here to assist you in anyway we can. Thank you for your prompt attention to these matters.

The Street Tree Project Explained

Spring has sprung in McVeytown and numerous residents can be seen daily taking advantage of our peaceful and friendly streets out walking, biking, and socializing. As a McVeytown resident of almost 3 years, I've grown to love our little town for many reasons, however I have noticed that it is missing one thing—street trees!

As the birthplace of Joseph Rothrock, "Conservationist and father of the state forest idea" I feel our town could improve upon his legacy while also beautifying our streets for the residents who proudly call it home. At the March borough council meeting I purposed moving forward with a plan to renew our once tree-lined streets.

Over the next few months, the Community Improvements Committee will be assessing locations across town for

possible tree planting sites and developing formal plans and guidelines. To avoid any potential impacts, the project will utilize the slogan "Plant the right tree in the right location." Community involvement will be key to make this project successful, so anyone interested in potentially having a tree planted along their property frontage is encouraged to reach out.

Local and state grant funding, as well as donations and volunteers will be used to implement the project at no cost to borough residents. Planning for the project will go on throughout 2019, and when funding is secured, planting will hopefully begin in spring of 2020.

Borough Council Report

The Borough completed the 2019 budget with **NO** tax increase; therefore, our real estate tax millage will stay at 9.5 mills. Our general operating budget will be around \$105,000.

Council does not take lightly its responsibility to appropriate and spend **Your** tax dollars wisely. A preliminary budget was passed at our November meeting and was available for public review and public comment, at the Borough Office. It received final approval at the December meeting and went into effect on January 1, 2019.

The Borough continues to face budgetary challenges as costs continue to escalate. Some of the line items are as follows: employee payroll; snow removal and cinderling, street maintenance, heating costs, street lights and other electrical costs, building and property maintenance, legal services and the ever increasing insurances (workers comp-liability-property). In addition, we financially support the Fire Company, Playground and Library.

Residents are welcome to stop at the Borough Office and review the budget at any time and offer comments. We encourage all residents to become familiar with how your tax dollars are spent.

A 'Fire Tax' will help Volunteers Serve Our Community

The Fire Company has approached the McVeytown Borough Council, as well as Oliver and Bratton Townships, asking to impose a fire tax. Fire protection is by law mandatory for municipalities to provide for its citizens. Currently all three municipalities provide fire company monies from their annual budgets. These funds are a line item budget, meaning that they can be rescinded or reallocated at any time. If the monies are designated as a fire tax, then the monies would have to be used for fire protection by law. A fire tax would insure funding for the Fire Company.

Below are a few questions that have been asked about a fire tax:

• Why a tax now? Isn't the fire company doing OK without a tax?

Currently the fire company is financially ok but costs are going up every year and required standards for training and equipment are new sizable costs. Looking forward a short fall of funding with our current fundraising methods can be foreseen.

• Why do we need a tax for fire funding?

Many individuals and businesses contribute to the fire company, but most do not. A tax would ensure a fair assessment for all. A tax can only be used for fire protection, so there would be no questions about where the money goes.

• Where does the fire company's monies come from now?

Currently funding comes from fundraising events (Bingo, Cash Nights, Gun Raffles), Fund Drives, Grants and the Municipalities line item contributions and Fireman's Relief monies.

• How much should the Fire Company annual budget be?

An annual budget of about \$105,000 is projected for the increasing costs related to firefighting, to budget for timely replacement and updated of capital equipment.

• Doesn't the Fire Company have too much equipment?

Equipment needs are an important topic of discussion between the Fire Company and the Municipalities. It is essential that the protection of life, property and the

safety of the volunteers are in an integral part of that discussion.

• How will the Fire Department use the monies?

The Fire Company will be permitted to spend fire tax monies on operational expenses and capital equipment purchases. The Fire Company has invited representatives for each municipality to audit the financial books every year.

In conclusion we ask for you to support the Fire Company with a Fire Tax. We are transparent to the public with all our operations. If anyone has any question or concerns, please contact us at the firehouse.
