McVeytown Borough Council Update...On January 6, 2020, McVeytown Borough Council held their re-organization meeting.

As a result of the 2019 Election we are proud to announce that Steven Feathers, Rex Goss and Mark Zong will serve another four years as volunteer members of the McVeytown Borough Council.

Wilda Fisher, Mayor of McVeytown Borough so graciously provided the oath of office to the members, and commented on how proud she was of the group of people that represent our community. At the meeting, motions were made to reappoint Steven Feathers as Council President, Roland Fagan as Vice-President and Jacob Harper as Assistant Secretary/Treasurer.

Borough Authority Update.... For many years now, a long-range goal for the McVeytown Borough Authority was to purchase and install emergency backup generators!

What does this mean for you...during a major storm event with power outage, the Authority will now be able to provide residents with water and have accessibility to operate the sewer system accordingly.

Hopefully by now, you have noticed an improvement in your water. Two variable-speed

pumps were purchased and installed on the well pumps, and as a result, you should see clearer water with less air.

In past newsletters, we mentioned the Authority is in the process of obtaining funds to provide an additional water supply as added security. More information to come in upcoming editions.

The McVeytown Borough Authority is honored to report that the Borough of McVeytown was officially released, effective January 22, 2020, from their obligations in the Consent Order and Agreement, with the PA Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP).

McVeytown Borough Authority is now one of very few municipalities in Mifflin County that operates a sewage treatment plant that isn't on a consent order and agreement with PA DEP. For many years, McVeytown Borough Authority was in violation for having overflows at the Wray Pump Station into the Juniata River, as a result of a defective system with inflow and infiltration issues and extra flow. Every time we had a significant rainfall event that meant another overflow and another fine.

We again thank you for your patience while the sewer rehabilitation project was completed, and for your assistance in checking your home for floor drains and sump pumps that were connected to the sewer system. To some, that extra flow may not seem like a lot but every bit matters. Nothing lasts forever, as we all know, so McVeytown Borough Authority and staff will continue to diligently seek preventative measures to sustain the improved sewer collection system.

Please do your part. If you haven't already done so, please check your home and/or business for

any floor drains or sump pumps that may be connected to the sewer system. You won't be fined; we just need to eliminate any unlawful connections. If in question, please contact the Borough Office for assistance.

As an added preventative measure, the Authority has submitted a proposed plan to PA DEP—a request to purchase and install an equalizer holding tank at the Wray Pump Station, as added protection to prevent future overflows in years to come. It takes people like members of Borough Council, the Authority and the Mayor (all people of the committee like

Good News for Town Residents!

A preliminary 2020 budget was presented and accepted at our November meeting. Thereafter it was made available for public review and public comment at the Borough Office.

At our December meeting, it received final approval from Borough Counsel and it took affect January 1, 2020.

The Borough was able to complete the 2020 budget with NO tax increase, therefore our real estate tax millage will set again at 9.5 mills.

The Borough continues to face many difficult budgetary challenges and works very hard to see that *your* tax dollars are spent wisely. Residents are welcome to stop at the Borough Office and review the budget at any time and offer comments. We encourage all residents to become familiar with how your tax dollars are spent.





2020 US CENSUS

What Is the 2020 Census?

The 2020 Census counts every person living in the United States and five U.S. territories—once, only once, and in the right place. This census is conducted every 10 years by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency.

Why We Do It

The results of the census determine your congressional representation as well as federal funding for states and communities. Every year, more than \$675 billion goes toward hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and more.

It's also mandated by the Constitution: The United States has counted its population every 10 years since 1790.

When You Can Take the 2020 Census

By April 1, 2020, households will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. You'll then have three ways to respond: online, by phone, or by mail.

Everyone Must Complete the 2020 Census

If you live in the United States, you are required by law to participate in the 2020 count, even if you recently completed another survey from the Census Bureau. A complete and accurate count is critical, as the results of the 2020 Census will affect congressional representation, community funding, and more.

2020 Census will ask:

- How many people are living or staying at your home on April 1, 2020.
- Whether the home is owned or rented.
- About the sex of each person in the household.
- About the age of each person in the household.
- About the race of each person in the household.
- About whether a person in the household is of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin.
- About the relationship of each person in the household to one central person.

The Census Bureau will never ask you for:

- Your Social Security number.
- Money or donations.
- Anything on behalf of a political party.
- Your bank or credit card account numbers.

If someone claiming to be from the Census Bureau asks you for one of these things, you may be the target or victim of a scam. For more information, visit Avoiding Fraud and Scams on the 2020 US Census Website by visiting 2020census.gov

What Happens to My Answers?

Your personal information is kept **confidential**. We are bound by federal law to protect your information, and your data are used only for statistical purposes.
