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**Meeting for Worship for Business**  
**Hopewell Centre Monthly Meeting, November 9, 2025**  
**Clerk Dick Bell, Presiding**

The Clerk opened the Meeting with a moment of silence.

**CQE:** (Continuing Quaker Education)

**Social Concerns and Outreach:** Margie Riley reported the following:

The committee met on November 6, 2025

Attending: Betty McCormick, Kristin Zimet, Martha Hanley, Sheila Tilley, Margie Riley

-We are hosting Coming to the Table at Centre Meeting House on Thursday, Nov. 20, 2025, 6:30 - 8 p.m. for a program titled "Quaker Solutions to Slavery: Freedom, Colonization, and the Underground Railroad". This highlights the work of Hopewell member and attendee Samuel M. Janney (1801-1880) and his Agricultural Science-based Abolition Writings. Next year- 2026- local chapters of Coming to the Table nationwide will be celebrating the history of the Underground Railroad, so there are more opportunities for Hopewell and other Virginia and West Virginia Meetings to partner with Coming to the Table Chapters. Belle McQuail (from Charles Town) is the contact for Coming to the Table.

-We are hosting a Regional Gathering with Frederick Friends (MD), Goose Creek Meeting, and Shepherdstown Meeting on Sunday, November 23, 2025. Please note: this is usually a potluck at Centre Meeting House but we will be at Hopewell Meeting House instead due to space.

Meeting for Worship will be as usual, 10 - 11 a.m., followed by a short break to set up group tables in the worship area. We will then reseat ourselves in mixed groups, representing the 4 Meetings, for conversation and a potluck meal. The four organizers of this event (Helen Doerr, Patricia Barber, Betsy Tobin, Margie Riley) have a list of conversation queries for the tables to follow as Spirit leads. We will end the gathering with a short reflection time where tables briefly share a highlight of their discussion. We will need childcare during the Meeting for Worship (2 volunteers) along with 6 volunteers to be a recorder and Hopewell table "host" for the programmed discussion and potluck. If you can help, please talk with Margie Riley.

The vision is to have our four Meetings rotate hosting gatherings in 2026 on the months that have a 5th Sunday: March 29, May 31, Aug. 30, Nov. 22 (a week early due to Thanksgiving). Feedback from this 2025 gathering will be used to plan for 2026. We are asking Friends to RSVP for this gathering in order to accommodate everyone comfortably in our Meeting space. Please do so asap. And, plan to bring your own water bottle. Thank you!

-Anne Bacon and Kevin Slick have had a beginning conversation about our wish for online individual purchasing of Hopewell Centre Quaker merch. If you have a particular wish in mind, please let them know. We will ask them to try to have something available so we can order items in time for Christmas.

-Goose Creek, Shepherdstown, and Kent Friends Meeting of Columbus Ohio have all written minutes on current social concerns. We brainstormed ways to support these minutes, including 1) asking if we can add a Hopewell Centre endorsement at the end in support of the minute, 2) checking into having the Shepherdstown minute published in the Winchester Star, the Northern Virginia Daily, on

our website, 3) sending copies to our neighboring churches, along with phoning the churches to bring attention to what we're sending, and 4) putting copies in our Meeting Houses, sending a copy to Winchester Worth Fighting For, asking members to share the minutes with their families/friends/neighbors. We had a question about the proper procedure for this - and will call the respective Meetings to ask permission to use their minutes for outreach.

- We are hosting a WATTS dinner on Nov. 12. Becky Ebert is coordinating the outreach.

-The planning committee for Spirituality Retreats will be meeting soon to discuss the vision for these Saturday outreach events for 2026. Please let Margie Riley know if you wish to help with this.

-We are informally going through past business meeting minutes to list past outreach activities and also compiling a list of members and their past/present outreach activities to be used as an information base for our Meeting.

-We discussed a variety of other ideas including...

1. There's an interest in the Enneagram, a personality model that categorizes people into nine interconnected types, that is a helpful tool for self-understanding and personal growth, extending to one's spiritual path. It had been suggested that we include this in a Spirituality Retreat, but the committee felt this was of high interest and would like to recommend that we either include this as an RE topic OR a special interest group (perhaps at Centre Meeting House). Note: Would this be open to the greater Winchester community?

2. We discussed promoting music on Sundays and Kristin Z. offered to play the piano and Sheila Tilley was asked to share chants that she's used with youth. If anyone has a talent or idea about sharing music/chanting or other idea, please let us know!

3. The book Circle of Simplicity, by Cecile Andrews, was recommended for a study group. There are many books by Quaker authors that would also be strong choices for a study group as a "common read" related to Quaker culture and social justice. Perhaps we could include films, too. We will get a list of titles going and see where this leads. (Also, we need to note what books have been done in the past with the Seekers group.) Note: Would this be open to the greater Winchester community?

4. Kevin S. and Vicki Q. have shared with us how the Boulder, CO, Friends Meeting had a simple outreach after their weekly Meetings for Worship where they held a silent prayer vigil (need more specific detail). Our committee discussed ways we might share our Quaker voices after our 4th Sunday potlucks at Centre Meeting House, since it's in town and close to the Winchester walking mall. We could have signs available and anyone who would like to take a stroll down the walking mall could carry one...or people could bring a sign of their own; we could use the time to write post cards, get on our computers to write our congress representatives, write letters to the editor for the Winchester Star, etc. These could be activities for whomever feels led on any particular potluck Sunday. How does the Meeting feel about this kind of "impromptu activity that would be lightly preplanned?"

5. The idea of hosting volunteer work days where we have a group active with a community project was proposed. Ideas?

6. We would like to reach out with more directed intent to our newcomers, offering ways to meet/talk beyond our Sunday fellowship time and potlucks. Ideas?

Jim Riley reported that besides the graveyard wall being repaired, tree and brush overgrowth is being cleared along the wall. Also, the furnace on the worship side of Centre is being repaired and the Hopewell furnaces will be checked for any needed service as well.

Anne Bacon announced that there will be a celebration for Black History Month on March 15 at Shenandoah University. Featured will be speakers from each of the three abolitionist religions from our area: Unitarian, Mennonite, and Quaker. We will be considering how we will participate in this program.

Sheila Tilley announced that she is considering offering a summer program for kids at Centre. Please see Sheila with ideas. And what a great idea for community service!

The Meeting approved the sending of a "letter of invitation to Quaker Meeting" to the editors of local newspapers written by Margie Riley.






