From the clerk

As I recall it, I was in fifth grade, and it was Christmas Eve. We had gotten our tree from the woods behind us in Nanjemoy, MD. Tree lots were a wonder we had not yet discovered. Probably because we lived on the edge of a mature forest, most pines were spindly and focused on reaching the soaring canopy above. Our tree looked especially bedraggled that year – Charlie Brown had nothing on us.

We dragged out our box of decorations and realized soon that we didn't have very much to work with. The main problem was the lights. It took us awhile to get any to light. The sum total of actual working light bulbs we got to fire was 11. Worse, a plurality of them was this awful shade of weak lavender. We were boys and preferred bold colors like red, blue, and green. We kept trying bulbs in different sockets to see if they would suddenly light up. Sadly, no miracles occurred.

We then began hanging balls and realized that without lights the balls looked flawed, miscolored, and outstandingly inadequate. There were branchless areas on our tree where a hawk could have flown through without tipping his wings.

Also, we found we had done a pathetic job storing last year's icicles. They were mostly gobs of knots from which we were only able to resurrect at the most ten or twelve strands.

Standing back and taking stock of our creation, we were decidedly bummed.

Mother could not miss our disappointment. We thought this year Santa would surely pass our house by. Mother then produced her 1876 silver dollar – the one given her as a child by her Grandfather Ridgeway, and we hatched a plan. I would ride my bike to Kleins Grocery at least four miles away on Nanjemoy Point Road. The two stores in Nanjemoy, Finall's Grocery and Miss Mary's, did not keep Christmas light bulbs and the other main object of our shopping that day: a jar of baby food for my brother Matt. I had to be just nine. Mother instructed me to buy only Gerber's – but if there were none of the flavor Matt wanted then I was to substitute Beechnut. It would be the longest I had ever ridden.

Armed with Mom's heirloom silver dollar and dressed as warmly as I could, I began the epic ride. I ran into little traffic. The gray skies invited snow and the cold bit my cheeks and the tips of my ears. Making it past the beer joint, I knew I was in the home stretch. I pulled into Kleins and immediately went for the light bulbs. Their selection of Christmas bulbs was extremely limited. I finally settled on a set of four, only one of which was the hated lavender. They had no Gerber's baby food so I bought Beechnut. The ride back was shorter, and I got home with still plenty of light.

We set up our trains under the tree then put the four new bulbs in empty sockets, expecting a dramatic improvement. The tree looked only barely better. All our heroics – Mom's silver dollar, my epic bicycle ride – had only produced a pale imitation of any child's dreams.

When Dad got home after dark, we took him in to look at our work, leaving out none of the dramatic details. He agreed with us that the tree looked pretty grim.

That night we went to bed, and I'm sure because it was Christmas Eve, we had a hard time falling asleep.

The next morning, we got up and burst into the front room. The tree was full of strands of lights, festooned with brand new balls, and covered with cascades of unknotted icicles. Our train set had been expanded and had brand new cars. Wrapped presents overflowed the floor. The miracle of Christmas had happened.

Right there in our house.

The note left by Santa sealed the deal.
