The Clerk opened the Meeting with a moment of silence.

CQE: (Continuing Quaker Education)

"Decisions about nuclear weapons and about military things in general, they're all taken by men. It seems right that it should be women [protesting]. I began to have visions of women walking down the road with our banners and our placards. We walked from Cardiff, the capital of Wales, to Greenham Common. The press were not interested. We had to do something more dramatic, and we decided to chain ourselves up to the gates of Greenham when we got there. We had to stay a night, and another night, a week two weeks... gradually, the support did come in. It was the biggest women's demonstration ever, I think, in this country." Anne Petit

Comments included: It's inspiring - the power of women. And the power of quiet persistence. It's significant that the demonstration started small and then grew.

As it turns out, Shepherdstown, Goose Creek, AND Frederick Meeting are on board for a fall regional gathering! The suggestion is to meet on a Sunday - have regular Meeting for Worship, followed by a potluck and program time. Does the Meeting approve Sunday, Nov. 23 for this? We would be host. YES - APPROVED

Next year the 5th Sundays occur in March, May, Aug, and Nov. and we will rotate who hosts for each. As we share we will learn from each other and open opportunities to support one another, join efforts, combine energy and output, and grow individually and collectively.

Our next Interfaith Saturday Spiritual Retreat is coming up on Oct. 4. The flyer has been sent out and we look forward to this outreach. This years summit theme is "strong and supported" with keynote speaker Robin-Wall Kimmerer, author of Braiding Sweetgrass, scientist, and enrolled member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation. Note: She will speak via Zoom from 7:30 -8:30, the event will be from 7 - 9 p.m. and hosted by Margie Riley and Julia Storberg-Walker. APPROVED

It was suggested we invite the general public to this and Margie will post it with Winchester Worth Fighting For - a nonprofit with a central, widespread listing of nonpartisan area events.

From the clerk

In 1787 on September 17th in Philadelphia, delegates from every state (except Rhode Island, which didn't want its outsized influence under the Articles of Confederation government diminished) signed the initial draft of the United States Constitution. The result as Dr. Benjamin Franklin so wryly put it was, "A republic...if we can keep it."

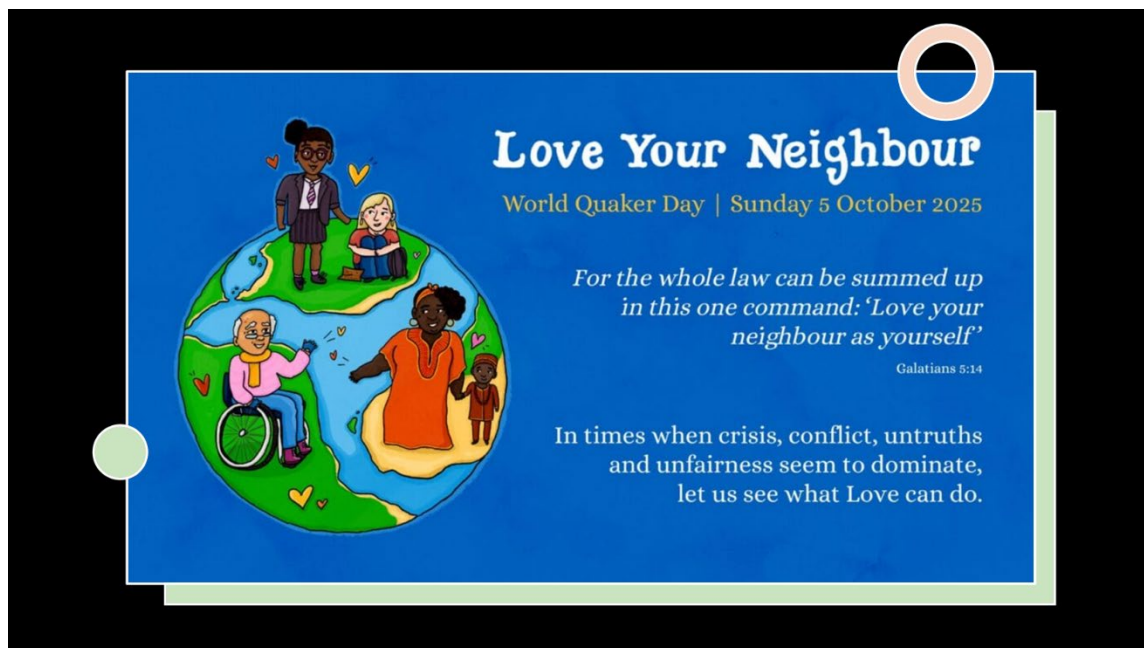
The document was a marvel in governance. It outlined a strong Congress counterpoised with a strong executive, the President. A third branch, the Judiciary, was nebulously defined and outlined, the founders relying on Congress to largely create the Judiciary's levels and role. One thing, for sure, was the federal judges had life-time appointments and there would be a Supreme Court. No one realized there was a John Marshall out there to finish defining that court's role – a least well enough to get the nation started.

My search engine says there were no Quakers among the delegates of that convention. But one can say that the convention itself which ran from roughly May, 1787 until September was structured on a Quaker meeting model. Certainly Washington, who was elected president of the convention, ran it much as a clerk might run meeting for worship. He spoke little and concerned himself chiefly with beginning and ending sessions. He was determined not to be part of the debate. Various members voiced leadings. They decided not to keep an official record of the debate or of the convention. The document would emerge from behind a veil of silence with virtually every member on board. They reached a remarkable 'consensus.'

We Quakers have our fingerprints and footprints all over the beginning of this country – our strengths...and our foibles. Some of the harder issues such as democracy and slavery (and its attendant racial legacy) are still gaining clarity in the national psyche. But 240 years ago we got off to a good start.

Although, there's still plenty to do.

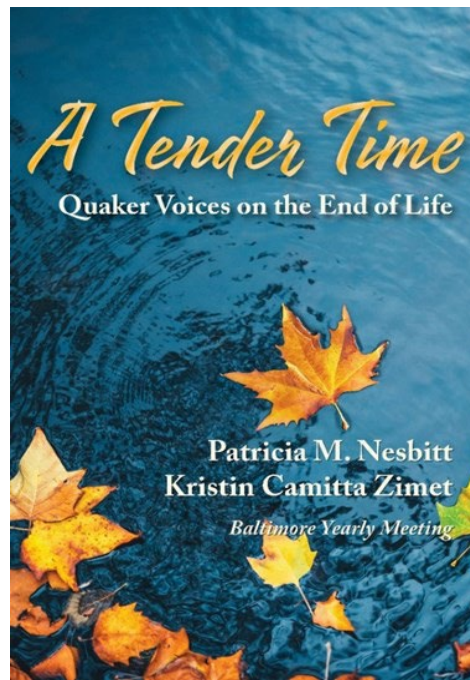
Support the Highland Food Pantry
