Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business 19 May 2024

The meeting opened with a moment of silence with Clerk, Dick Bell, presiding.

Ministry and Counsel: Richard Cooper (who needed to leave early thus bumping this report to the top of the agenda), reported for the committee, which met via Zoom on 13 May 2024.

Donna Knight has resurrected the Centre computer we use for Zooming on Centre Sundays. Thank you, Donna!

Donna Knight has updated the meeting website with the most recent fifteen newsletters. Storage capacity issues require us to remove one (oldest) issue every time a new one is added. Donna is keeping up with this.

Eloise Haun wrote a letter that was published in the Northern Virginia Daily regarding the Shenandoah County school board's recent decision to revert two schools to their former confederate names.

Jennifer Dyer has made a request to the meeting to be able to park her new RV on Hopewell meeting property for about two weeks in June. There will be minimal to no need for electric, water, or sewer connections. She will be going to the Flying J to dump sewage and practice making utility connections. Friends wondered if our insurance or the law imposes any limitations on having an inhabited RV on our property. Friends united in support of Jennifer's request and look forward to having her.

CQE – (Continuing Quaker Education): Friends shared their reflections on this month's CQE quote:

We define eldering as the ministry of deepening the spiritual grounding of individuals, a Quaker meeting, or other faith groups or gatherings. Elders are those who have a distinct and noticeable gift of spiritual groundedness that uplifts, deepens, and broadens the spiritual core of a meeting or gathering. When the gifts of eldering are present, Spirit often takes individuals and groups to places they might not otherwise go. Quaker eldering is not connected with chronological age. Some come to the gift very young and others never develop the gift past a basic capacity. - from the website, Friendly Meetings

### Thanksgivings and Concerns:

- Dick shared his gratitude for the semi-annual blood drive in Berryville that is conducted in honor of his late nephew, Matthew Bell, in which he participated this week.
- Donna shared gratitude for the many blessings that have come from recent hardship and loss.
- Peter expressed gratitude for his renewed concern for and involvement with the Ethiopian visitors and his continued leading to carry their concerns.
- Pam shared aloud the poem "I Worried" by Mary Oliver as an expression of gratitude for many recent blessings.

Treasurer's Report (Includes news and reports from Finance): Jim Riley shared the Treasurer's report for April:

Income: Contributions totaled \$1,450. For the use of Centre, \$335, Sarah Zane fund \$100.

Expenditures included \$8,500 for the patio. Jim reminded us that we had received a special contribution earmarked for this last year so there was no additional expenditure out of any general or restricted funds. We paid our quarterly apportionment of \$1,670 to BYM. Sarah Zane disbursement \$78.

At the end of the month, we have \$10,605 in our checking account, a little over \$33,000 in the Rogers property fund, and \$3,371 in the Sarah Zane Fund.

Social Concerns and Outreach: Josh Riley offered an informal report about the committee's recent meeting at Christian Mollitor and Andrew Gertge's home. The committee has united in support of another Interfaith supper to be held in the fall. The committee also united in support of possible future Eco-spirituality Workshops.

Buildings and Grounds: Pam Hambach reported that the committee had met last first day, 12 May 2024 with the following updates and requests:

The gutters at the caretaker's residence clog easily and are well out of reach. We approved seeking estimates for installing gutter guards.

Gender neutralizing of Hopewell and Centre bathrooms: Pam has found vinyl signs with a combined male/female pictogram. Some members expressed a desire for more historically appropriate or attractive signage. We approved moving forward with vinyl signs as a good first step. We will need to re-label the keys as well.

Fire pit: The committee has researched portable smokeless fire pits that could be stored in the shed and cost about \$300. We approved this purchase.

Brush clearing around holly tree: We have a glorious holly tree near the rear corner of the carriage shed that could use some clearing around its base. We approved moving forward with estimates for this work. Interiors (under care of B&G) - no report Graveyard (under care of B&G) - no report

Pastoral Care: No report this month. Those whom we are holding in the Light are always listed in the newsletter. Donna Knight reminds us that we may submit any pastoral concerns (and anything else for that matter) to the newsletter editor. She is beginning to work on the June newsletter now.

Martha Hanley shared about her upcoming knee surgery on May 31st, indicating that she has good support lined up before and after. We will be keeping Martha in the Light.

We continue holding John and Francine Guiser in the Light.

Hospitality: The committee made requests for storable/freezable sweets. Our current inventory of cheese and crackers is solid.

Old Business: We revisited what we might do with the Apple Blossom parking money. Sending a child to camp could be a worthy use of it. Josh's friend's son, Dorian has been identified as wanting to attend.

Betty recalls that in the past we have given half of it to the youth fund and half of it to the Highland Food Pantry.

We also heard a suggestion to have a Hopewell picnic.

We agreed that we would move forward using general funds to support Dorian Hewlett's attendance at camp and that Scott and Josh and Jonathan would meet to discuss other possible uses of the parking money.

New Business: Jim was approached by an AA group with a request to use Centre on Wednesday nights at 7:00 while their regular meeting place is being renovated, possibly permanently. We discussed this request and affirmed our aim of keeping Monday and Thursday evenings at Centre unscheduled and available for other uses.




### Quaker Religious Education Class
