Martha attended a session at Annual Meeting about welcoming newcomers to your Meeting. We do a good job of making people comfortable, however, there is room to grow with what information we have ready to share...and offering more connections to newcomers. Martha will lead a working group on this to update materials and our communication process.


We discussed supporting voting in November with our sign for the polls and newspaper. In reviewing polling sites, the committee felt it would be overwhelming to try to get signs out to all the sites. However, if anyone is interested in putting a sign up where they vote, the committee can help with getting a sign.

The committee does recommend using the sign wording for a 1/2-page Winchester Star ad to be published on Oct. 17, 24 (Thursdays) and Nov. 4 (Monday). The cost for this is \$425. Per ad, total of \$1,275.

After considered discussion about cost and size of the advertisement, the Meeting approved this action with the following adjustment: The Meeting will cover \$705.00 of the expense (this is what 1/4 page ads would cost) with donations covering the remaining \$570. (several members felt moved to donate for the larger ad size.)

The committee also felt we should have large signs made with the same message to be displayed in front of both Centre and Hopewell Meeting House. The cost for this would be 3 x 5' signs - \$120. each. (Vital Signs, Winchester - best quote) 4 x 6' signs - 192. each

The Meeting decided to have one of each size made - the smaller to be displayed at Centre Meeting House, the larger at Hopewell.

From the clerk

The singer stood in front of the band. He and his wife were celebrating their 25th wedding anniversary. And to cap it off Fred sang Frank Sinatra's "Time After Time" to his wife Debbie. He did it well. Fred Teitgen sang "Time After Time" to his wife Debra Byars at their wedding, every anniversary, and every day of importance since they first met when Debbie moved to Madison, WI to become the state public administrator who shepherded the state budget through the many committees of the legislature decades and decades ago. At the time he was a divorced structural engineer with three daughters. She was redoing the fix-it-up house in Madison she had just bought. They ended up married and traveling the world together.

Fred was diagnosed with pulmonary fibrosis in 2021. I saw him and a bevy of other friends this past August to celebrate a mini-bellringer reunion at Fred's and Debbie's beautiful house on Lake Wisconsin. Fred was in the pink of health, relatively. His current pulmonologist's report showed him with normal lung function — to everyone's delight. Fred credited not only the array of meds he was taking but several supplements pals of his had recommended. Fred had beat the diagnosis of two years remaining by over a year and appeared to be in superb health. That was two months ago. Last month he entered the hospital. Today he will die.

Fred Teitgen was a strapping Mid-Westerner. He loved to travel, work outside, take on projects, and serve his community. He was elected to his local county's planning commission, I believe, for terms totaling 12 years. I remember visiting Fred and Debbie at their home near the one they reside in now. I got up for breakfast and was chatting with Debbie, whom I've known well since we were in our early teens. I asked her where Fred was. "Oh, he's outside piling up brush into piles." I excused myself and went out to help Fred. The dew was still on the ground; mist was still in the air. Fred was dragging this huge branch and flung it onto the top of the second of two mammoth piles of brush. He was done. I muttered something about "when did you get up." Fred answered, "A couple hours ago. Just wanted to get this knocked out before the day got going."

Fred built his own final house on the shores of Lake Wisconsin. Debbie and he designed it themselves. It could handle guests and Fred's and Debbie's burgeoning family. It was also gorgeous. He was always busy taking care of some detail. During my August visit Fred vaccinated his trees against blight. The vaccination was quite the tricky task.

Debbie, who after public service, went on to become and retire as senior vice president of Oscar Meyers also took on community service as a mission where she is now president of the League of Women voters.

When you visited Fred's and Debbie's you inevitably were entertained by one of their photo journals. Their final one was of their adventures through Portugal and Spain. It was fantastic. Those journals and Fred's singing.

This last time to the hospital Fred's doctors told him there was nothing more they could do. They could move him to hospice and gradually remove the 'heavy' oxygen which was keeping him alive. Today is the day that process ends. Fred will pass holding his beloved wife Debbie in his arms.






Three Zoom workshops on understanding and addressing racism, October 19, October 26, and November 16

The BYM Working Group on Racism is sponsoring three interactive Zoom presentations this fall designed to help Friends understand racism and how to undo the harm it causes:



Saturday October 19 at 10 a.m. Smith College Professor Loretta Ross will discuss with Friends how bringing empathy to our antiracism and other social justice work can make it more effective and more enjoyable. She is an activist, public intellectual, and scholar. Her passion is innovating creative imagining about global human rights and social justice issues. As the third director of the first rape crisis center in the country in the 1970s, she helped launch the movement to end violence against women that has evolved into



today's #MeToo movement. You can register for the workshop at this <u>link</u>. **Saturday October 26 at 10 a.m.** Debby Irving, author of <u>Waking Up</u> <u>White, and Finding Myself in the Story of Race</u>, will use historical and media images to examine how she used her white-skewed belief system to interpret the world around her. She explores how she spent decades silently reaffirming harmful, archaic racial patterns instead of questioning the racial disparities and tensions she could see and feel. This workshop is designed to support white people in making the paradigm shift from

'fixing' and 'helping' those believed to be inferior to focusing on internalized white superiority and its role in perpetuating racism at the individual, institutional, and cultural levels. There will be pauses for reflection, dialog, and Q&A. You can register for the workshop at this <u>link</u>.

Saturday November 16 at 10 a.m. Debby Irving will help Friends learn how to engage in transformational conversations. Because dominant white culture encourages us to avoid conflict, many of us raised in it have not fully developed the insight, skill, and emotional stamina necessary to broach and navigate differences of perspective and opinion, especially when harm to a member of a marginalized group is part of the mix. Too often these conversations are completely avoided or broached only to go from bad to worse. There is a different way. In contrast to the social norms of whiteness are norms designed to develop the vulnerability, skill, and courage necessary to create deep connection and resilience; ways of being that sustain and grow us personally and collectively. This workshop will explore how to embed new, transformational norms into our personal and institutional practices. You can register for the workshop at this link.




