The 2015 Establishment Day Ceremony

This year is the 197th birthday of Crawford County. To mark the county's birthday, the CCHGS held a celebration featuring four guest speakers. They were Dan Crecelius, Jim Kaiser, Roberta Toby and Sharon Wilson. Dan Crecelius, a County Commissioner and Vice-President of the Crawford County Veterans Association, spoke about the status and upcoming construction of the Veterans Memorial. Jim Kaiser, former President of the CCHGS, talked about the history of the county's agricultural organizations. These organizations included Crawford County Purdue Cooperative Extension Services (CES), the 4-H, Farm Bureau, FFA, etc... Jim also spoke about the history of the CCHGS, with its modern roots starting in 1974 and onto the present day, highlighting significant milestones. Roberta was next and she gave a condensed history of the state and county. Her speech was included in a pamphlet she handed out that was accompanied with some pictures as well. The last speaker was Sharon Wilson of the



Crawford County Tourism Bureau. Sharon spoke of the upcoming State Bicentennial celebrations next year especially the torch relay which starts in Harrison County and heads into Crawford. Volunteers will be needed to relay the torch through the county which will go into Leavenworth, up to Marengo then west through English, Taswell and finally south on SR 37 into Perry county. More information on that event as we get closer!

Some History of Indiana and Crawford County

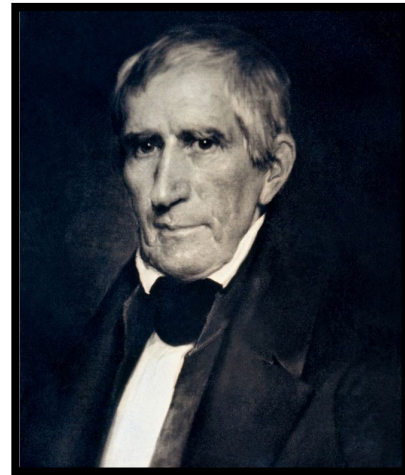
These are some items taken from the book “Historical and Biographical Atlas of Knox County, Indiana.” Some items are in the section called, “Combined Atlases of Knox County, Indiana 1880-1903.” These titles are in the same book. The book was compiled through the sponsorship of the Vincennes Historical and Antiquarian Society, Vincennes, Indiana.

Indiana was the first state formed in the Northwest Territory. This vast region from which five states; Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Michigan and Wisconsin were formed, was explored by the French as early as 1665, and this became the Territory of the French.

By the Treaty of Paris, in 1763, the Northwest Territory was ceded to Great Britain, which held it until the close of the Revolution, in 1781. At that time the Territory was claimed by Virginia, but other states disputed her claims to a part of the region. Finally the question was settled by ordinances of 1787. Virginia relinquished her claim, and the Northwest Territory became the first Eminent Domain of the National Government. Consequently territories were formed, the first being Indiana Territory.

On July 4th, 1800, the Territory of Indiana was formed at Vincennes, which was the capital. Indiana Territory originally included all of what is now this state, Michigan and Illinois. Michigan was cut off and became a separate territory in June 1805, and Illinois in 1809, which reduced Indiana to its present size. The name Indiana was derived from the Indiana who lived in vast numbers in the region.

William Henry Harrison (*pictured to the right*) was the first Governor of Indiana Territory. He had previously served as secretary of the Northwest Territory. General John Gibson served as territorial secretary.



A land office was opened in Vincennes in 1804, with John Badollet as registrar, and Nathaniel Ewing as receiver. In 1809 there were but four counties in Indiana Territory; Knox, Harrison, Clark and Dearborn.

During the early days of Indiana Territory the settlers were treated terribly by the Indians. Many whites, including men, women and children were massacred, their homes burned and their horses and cattle driven away by the savages. After several attempts to secure peace through treaties with the Indians, General Harrison led an army against the savages and defeated them at the Battle of Tippecanoe, November 11, 1811, in which the famous Indian known as “The Prophet” was killed. During General Harrison’s absence in this Indian campaign, Secretary Gibson acted as Governor. The following year the War of 1812 began with England, and the Indians

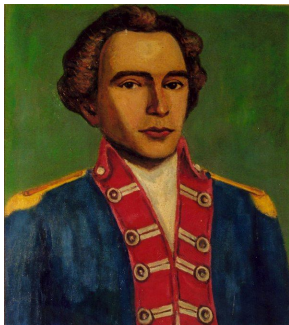
became active allies of the British. During this time, Thomas Posey of Tennessee was appointed Governor of Indiana Territory. His duties began in May of 1813.

In February, 1813, the last session of Legislature at Vincennes was held. At that meeting the Capital was prorogued to Corydon, Harrison County. In December of that year, the Legislature of the Territory of Indiana met the first time at Corydon. A Capital building was erected at Corydon 1813-1815, which still stands today. The last session of the Territorial Legislature was held in Corydon in 1815. At that session, a memorial to Congress, praying for statehood, was passed, and in April, 1816, President Madison approved the bill, which enabled the people of Indiana to form a constitution and state government. The population of Indiana was then 63,897, and the Territory comprised thirteen counties. When the weather was warm, the constitution often met under a big elm tree. This tree became known as the "Constitutional Elm", the stump of which still remains today. Jonathan Jennings (*pictured*) presided over that convention and William Hendricks acted as Secretary. In August, 1816, the first state election was held in Indiana, and Jonathan Jennings was elected Gov. with Christopher Harrison, Lt. Gov. and William Jennings was to represent the new State in the House of Representatives of the United States. In November, 1816, the first General assembly of the State of Indiana convened at Corydon.



Vincennes was the first town settled in the state; Corydon, second; New Harmony; third and Carlisle, fourth. Indianapolis came into prominence and in 1821 was selected as the Capital of the State. At that time the population of the state was only 147,112.

In 1817 the people who lived in the area were either, Orange, Perry or Harrison County residents and had to travel quite a distance to do business. On Dec. 31, 1817, a petition was presented by Martin H. Tucker to Mr. Pennington at Corydon along with other petitions. The petitions were signed by people praying for the formation of a new county. The state was still young at this time and many changes were being constantly made in order to form more counties. Crawford County was formed by taking parts of Orange, Perry and a larger portion from Harrison. The Governor signed the order on Jan. 29, 1818 and became law on March 1, 1818. Therefore we celebrate the birth of our county on March 1.



I don't know who Crawford Co. is named after for sure, as there seems to be some confusion. My thoughts are that it was named after Col. William Crawford (*portrait on the left*) who served with General George Washington and was burned at the stake by Indians in Ohio. There have been several Counties named after him. Some say that our county was named after William Crawford who ran for President in 1824 from Georgia. Since we were already a county at that time I don't see a connection. I do

wish we could find proof of the person who presented the name and who the honor should go to. Most all history about Crawford County gives credit to Col. William Crawford.

Since there was a need to correctly identify boundary lines, a Land Ordinance was created by Pres. Thomas Jefferson on May 20, 1785. Ebenezer Buckingham Jr. U. S. Deputy Surveyor, on September 1, 1805 established the initial point in Indiana from which land is surveyed. This was established by a base line and the Second Principal Meridian which runs N. to S. through Indiana. This is how they determined the twp. or range description on land records. This Initial Point is called "Pivot Point", and is located just a few miles north of the Crawford Co. line, just to the left of hwy. 37 in Orange County.

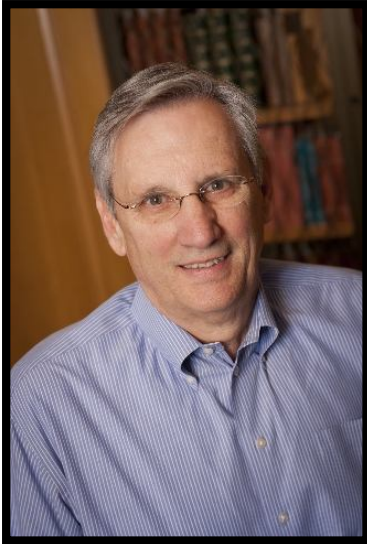

I am researching the **Ross lineage**, specifically, I am looking for **any information on Joseph Ross**, the first of the Rosses of my line to enter Indiana, in about 1822-1824. I cannot find any information on him before his entry into Indiana.

Joseph had 4 sons and 2 daughters, one son was William Shelby Ross (1849-1908)

I believe:

1. that he came to Indiana with two brothers, John (1798-1848) and Shelby.
2. That Joseph’s father was born in Scotland and his mother in Virginia.
3. that he purchased land in 1831 in Floyd Co. and by 1840 was in Orange Co but returned to Whiskey Run Twp, Crawford Co. by abt. 1863, and died in Milltown, Crawford Co. in 1892. He is buried in Milltown Cemetery/Harrison Co..
4. That he married Sarah (Sallie) Summers in Floyd Co. in 1837.

I would love to find out who his parents were, where he was born (census says Virginia, but where?), any more information on John or Shelby that would lead to more on Joseph and the family.

Minutes from the Previous 3 Meetings:

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING (no regular meeting this month)

January 13, 2015

The board met at 2 p.m. at the Archives in English. Those attending were Bill Piper, presiding, Roberta Toby, Rita Eddleman, Sharon Morris, Henry Laswell, and Carol Tomlinson.

The February Meeting on the 10th was discussed. Feb. is Black History Month so a presentation related to that as pertains to Crawford County will be presented by Bill and Roberta. Valentine's Day will also be observed by having snacks and drinks.

The March Meeting was discussed because the County's birthday occurs in that month. The Board's recommendation was for a short business meeting at 5 or 5:30 followed by a pitch-in dinner at 6:30 p.m. The Commissioners and other County officials would be invited as well as the public. Roberta as County Historian will give a presentation on the history of Crawford County.

Rita reported on the Proctorville property followed by a discussion of closing in the shelter house.

Other recommendations were

To be thinking about ideas for the Bi-Centennial celebration such as a float for the parade.

To contact Bonita Coats with the Community Foundation to obtain info about applying for a grant and to consider making a \$100 donation to them on a yearly basis. Jim Kaiser had made one in honor of Densil and Hugh.

To pick a couple of goals to focus on this year

For the By-Laws Com. to consider how to handle an organization that joins the Society and voting rights of such an entity

To think about May as the time to invite Dr. James Madison as a guest speaker (Armed Forces Day)

Bill Piper is working on a history book for our 4th graders. The meeting adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

Feb 10, 2015

The meeting was called to order by our President Don Standiford. A moment of silence was observed followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Don welcomed the members and our guests then asked each of us to introduce ourselves.

Bill Piper gave a program with Black History Month in mind. He presented information about the black settlement located between Valeene and Paoli near Lick Creek. The settlement was once referred to as Little Africa. Bill showed a film of the cemetery there and also one of a descendant of one of the inhabitants of the settlement. The original story said the people there were slaves, but this descendent said she had documentation stating that the inhabitants were actually free Blacks. She contacted the state and after they checked, found she was right. A new sign has now been placed at the site. All of the inhabitants had left the area by 1862. Bill also showed a film about the Underground Railroad in Harrison County. There have been many artifacts found there to verify its existence.

Don read the minutes from the last meeting held at our Christmas Dinner on Dec 9, 2014 at the English Senior Center. Rita made a motion to accept them and Janice seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Sharon gave the financial reports. The Society's account balance stands at \$12,629.69 and the regular Proctor House balance is \$6,187.54. Our membership is currently 85 with 3 free memberships and one life

time member for a total of 89. Rita made a motion to accept the reports as read and Janice seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Don gave the president's report. He read the minutes from the executive board meeting held on Jan. 13, 2015 at the archives. We discussed the Feb. meeting at that time. Also, the March meeting celebrating our county's birthday was discussed. Carol has reserved the Senior Citizens Center at English for March 10. The time is to be 5:00pm. It was decided to have a pitch in dinner after the meeting with the Society providing the meat. The members will bring side dishes, drinks and desserts. Bill, Roberta and Jim will present the program on our county's history. It was suggested we invite the county officials and also the Superintendent of Schools. Rita will make the invitations and send them out or hand deliver them with an R.S.V.P. date.

Don asked the By-Laws committee to meet and start working on any changes to be discussed. He also added Sharon and Henry to the committee. It now consists of Don Standiford, chairman, Bill Piper, Roberta Toby, Sharon Morris and Henry Laswell with Jim Kaiser as parliamentarian. The suggested changes will have to be presented for approval by the members of the Society 30 days prior to our annual meeting held in June. The Bicentennial Celebration was discussed. It was suggested we try to have a float in some of the local festival parades. We'll work on this some more. We discussed contacting Dr. James Madison again. Carol will contact him to see when he might be available. We discussed places to have his program with Hill View Christian Church as a possibility.

There was no Vice-President's report.

Bill read the County Historian's, Veterans and Archives reports as Roberta was out of town.

Rita gave the Proctor House report. The balance in the Restoration Fund account is \$7,565.89. Janice is still working on labeling the items in the house. She brought a tote containing most of the pictures from the house and gave it to Rita. Rita will keep it at her house because it needs to be kept under climate control. Rita also has the large bible from upstairs at her house. All other items that have been removed are in the storage building at English.

There was no website or newsletter report.

Donations and Acquisitions - Bill was contacted again by the lady who wants to sell us the book on Wyandotte Caves. He brought pictures of the book. It appears to be in good shape. The price she asked is \$295. Bill suggested we buy the book, reprint it and sell it with our other books. Rita made a motion to do this and Henry seconded it. The motion carried.

Don mentioned a picture of the Proctor House that was shown at the 4-H Fair and said it might be for sale if we would like to purchase it. He will check further on this.

Janice said Phil Jones had offered the Society hand-made replicas of the Proctor House and the Old Town Church. For some reason the Society turned them down. We asked Janice to see if she could get in touch with Phil and see if the offer still stands. We would love to have them.

The owner of the old Charles and Mareta Taylor house has offered us what was the old milk house that belonged to the Taylors. Rita will contact Bill Breeding to see if it is possible to move it without tearing it up. We would have to decide where to put it at the Proctor House. It can not be put on the part of the property on the National Registry. Mr. Breeding will also hook up the water as soon as weather permits. Fundraising - It was suggested we take our books, ornaments and t-shirts to the March meeting. We have a problem with the Crawford County Bicentennial t-shirts. When they are washed, the printing comes off. Bill will contact Cox T-shirts to see what can be done about this. We may have to refund the money we have acquired from those already sold.

New business - Evelyn made a motion to give Bill Piper \$100 annually for his work on the website and newsletter. Rita seconded the motion. The motion carried. This would be done at our annual meeting.

Henry suggested we set some goals for this year. Pick projects that we might be able to do on our own. Also, he would like to get the sign up listing the Proctor House on the National Registry. He and Roberta will check on this. These things will be discussed further at our next Proctor House board meeting. Janice would like us to see if we can put something in the paper telling of some of the things in our county. Or if this isn't possible, maybe we can at least tell about some of our meetings or programs. Don or Carol will have to check with Chris Adams about this.

Maries asked if she could schedule a date to have Betty - the Native American lady - come and tell some of her stories and sing some of her songs for us. Marie would like to try to get her for April. This was approved.

Our next meeting will be March 10, 2015 at 5:00pm at the Senior Citizens Center in English.

Marie made a motion to adjourn and Sharon seconded it. Meeting adjourned.

FOUNDER'S DAY CELEBRATION

MARCH 10, 2015

The CCHGS met on Tuesday, March 10, 2015, at the English Senior Citizens building to celebrate the establishment or "birthday" of Crawford County. It was established on March 1, 1818, thus marking the 197th year.

The program was presented by four speakers:

Roberta Toby - County Historian

Jim Kaiser - Past President of CCHGS

Dan Crecelius - County Commissioner and Vice-President of the Crawford County Veterans Association

Sharon Wilson - The Welcome Office of Tourism

Dan provided an update on the construction of the new Memorial that will honor all of our veterans. He thanked many people for helping to make this Memorial a reality. He noted that the Veterans Memorial Association and the High School have formed a partnership as the students will be laying the bricks under the guidance and supervision of the Industrial Arts teacher, most likely this fall.

Jim presented information on the history of our county's agricultural organizations and his family's involvement and participation from his early childhood days. He was a member of the 4-H club in 1939. He mentioned the 4-H council with its by-laws, 4-H clubs, and the 4-H County Fair which used to be held at the Marengo Fairgrounds, the old English Community building, and the old English Reunion grounds. It is now held at the 4-H building on State Highway 66. He also gave information on the County Farm Bureau, the Homemakers Clubs, the Soil and Water Conservation program, Service Foresters, Future Farmers of America, and many others.

Jim continued with a history of our CCHGS. It was first formed in 1921 with H.H. Pleasant as the first president. It wasn't always active but became active again in 1974 with Michael Esarey as President and Jack Stephenson the historian. Jim provided us with hand-outs covering the histories of both the agricultural organizations and the CCHGS.

Roberta provided us with a wealth of information on the history of our state and county. We were part of the Indiana territory established in 1800 with Indiana admitted into the union on December 11, 1816, by a congressional resolution signed by President James Madison. Knox was the first county. Two years later Crawford County was established on March 1, 1818, from parts of Harrison, Orange, and Perry counties. The county has had six court houses - the first at Mt. Sterling, followed by Fredonia and Leavenworth. The three latest have been in English. She had an informative hand-out for families. Sharon presented information on Indiana's Bi-Centennial Celebration next year which includes a torch relay through all 92 counties. It begins in Corydon at the site of the first State Capitol and then comes to our county, probably being handed over at Wyandotte Cave and then comes down Highway 62 into Leavenworth. We will be able to nominate candidates to carry the torch and will be deciding how it will be carried.

It will go to Leavenworth, Marengo, English, and Eckerty before proceeding into Perry County. It begins in September, 2016 and will travel 74 miles per day. It will end in Indianapolis with a big ceremony at the State Capitol where it will reside permanently. This is very exciting. Sharon also had hand-outs containing all information about the relay.

Following the presentations, refreshments were served including a huge birthday cake. About 47 people attended including county leaders, the new school superintendent, and our new county agent from the Purdue Extension office.

The next meeting of the Historical Society will be Tuesday, April 14 at 6:30 p.m. at the County Archives Building.

Dr. James Madison, noted historian and author, will be speaking on WWII May 18th at Hillview Christian Church at 6 p.m. The Veterans Memorial Association and CCHGS are co-sponsors.
