
Earl Denbo Art Show


The family of Earl A. Denbo is honored by the Historical society that is hosting this impressive art show. Earls talent grew from a little boy in common school drawing on the







































Dog Cruk School Dog Guck school was the name of the first log school on Dog Creek. It stood about a quarter mile to the East. The community needed a church and new school so this building was brieft and named Bocks Springs. When the old log school could no longer hold school due to its deteriorating condition, school resumed in the Bocks springs church where it functioned, school and church. as the community grew the building was to small to accommodate the congration, so a new church was built, named Bocks Springs Church which is about 1/2 mile E. on Dog Creek Board. again, this building became was Cruk School Today it stands at the Mathers Cimentary When moved in 1957 it was remodeled inside and a fazer added. Bell From First Courthouse At Mount Sterling.

Luther Dean and Gloria Beals Belcher, who lived in Kansas, donated this bell in January 2013 to the CCHGS. Gloria is the daughter of Winfred and Elva Brown Beals. Gloria had one brother, Ivan Ray, who died on January 2, 2013. Her husband Dean died on November 2, 2016 in Wichita, Kansas. Gloria still resides in Kansas.

No Meeting in January

CCHGS Meeting, February 13, 2018

The CCHGS met at 6:30 p.m. at their English building. President Bill Piper led the Pledge of Allegiance after a moment of silence.

Bill presented a program on Roman coins. Since the Roman Empire was so vast, these coins are still being discovered in many parts of the world. He passed around bronze coins dating from 337-361 AD during Emperor Constantius II reign. He also had coins from Emperors Licinius, Commodus, and Constantine I reigns. Constantine I was emperor from 306-337 AD, who converted the empire to Christianity.

Business Meeting

Minutes - were reviewed. No corrections so Roberta made a motion to accept them, 2nd by Louie, and the motion passed.

President's Report - Thinks the newsletter should go full digital this summer, except for a few local members without access to a computer. Would print some for them. Advantages - the newsletter could be much larger in scope and less costly. He announced the art show featuring Earl Denbo's paintings (a local artist now deceased) is March 27 from 5 to 8 p.m. at this location. It will also be our Grand Opening. Virginia Watson (daughter of Earl Denbo) and her daughter Lacey will provide the paintings and help set up the display. Light refreshments will be served. Financial Report - Beginning balance as of Jan.9 was \$8,555.70. No deposits. Disbursements included Indiana Natural Gas, \$76.82. English Water Works, \$43.38, and Jeff Roll \$142.00 totaling \$262.20. Ending balance as of Feb.13 is \$8,293.50.

County Historian, Archives, and Veterans Memorial Reports - given by Roberta. She continues to help people with their research. There will be a Museum Boot Camp training session at New Albany on March 5 for those interested. Cost is \$30.00. She deposited \$217 for Dec. – Jan. She also gave \$15 in cash to Sharon, our treasurer, to deposit. No Veterans report as there haven't been any meetings.

Proctorville Report - Was a water leak in the line between the meter and the shelter house so the water has been turned off until it can be repaired. The Grant process - all of the bids received were over budget so had to be rebid. Notices were published twice. New bids to be picked up at the Courthouse on Feb. 22., and brought here at our building to be opened at 3 p.m. Bill and Carol will be there and anyone else who is interested. The Proctor House account has \$3,234.12 plus our matching funds for the grant.

New Business - Becky H. Stetter has updated/expanded her history book for 4th graders. She's requesting that we partner with the DAR to publish it as a joint Bi-centennial project and to split the proceeds from any sales. The book will be given to every 4th grader (123 plus 5 teachers) in the county to take home. The DAR is requesting a grant from the CFCC to help with the cost of publishing. After some discussion, a suggestion was made to wait until the grant was obtained. Roberta will let Becky know.

Fund Raising - Roberta suggested a yard sale in April or May to be held at the VFW building. Will cost \$50 to rent. She will check with Clayton East for available dates.

Donations - Marc and Cathy Trueb from Oregon City, Oregon, gave some copies of the Marengo Observer dated 1905, 1908, and 1909. They are very brittle and need to be laminated.

No bills were presented.

Elaine Stephenson shared her concerns about Leavenworth, particularly Old Town. She has made a map listing all the historic places there. She would like to see more people coming to Leavenworth to live and work.

The meeting adjourned. Next meeting is March 13, 2018.

CCHGS Meeting, March 13, 2018

The CCHGS met at 6:30 p.m. at their English building. President Bill Piper led the Pledge of Allegiance after a moment of silence.

Lisa Gehlhausen gave an update on the status of the Proctor House Restoration project. The project was rebid due to the first bids coming in way over budget. The second time, the lowest bid was close enough to the budget so that the Society was able to obtain the necessary funds for the difference. The contractor has close ties to this county and really wants to do the restoration for us. After the release of the funds, there will be a construction meeting around April 3 or 4th.

David Wilkins who has been in charge of the Leavenworth Cemeteries since the 1980's talked about the Cedar Cemetery. He asked us to correct the name on our records as it is sometimes referred to as the "Cedar Hill" cemetery. He thought we may find records that say Cedar Hill starting around 1940. This is confusing as there is a Cedar Hill Cemetery in Corydon that sometimes gets mail meant for the cemetery in Leavenworth. He remarked that David Cole was the first to be buried in Cedar in 1846. He has also got about 30 graves marked in Old Town Cemetery in Leavenworth.

Jim Kaiser informed us that histories of all the Methodist churches in our district are being collected for a book. He had written a history of the Wickliffe Methodist Church which he shared with us. He thought we might be interested in writing a history of the Riddle Methodist Church to be included in the book. This church was established in 1838 and services were held continually until a couple of months ago when it was closed.

Business Meeting

Minutes - were reviewed. Roberta made a motion to accept them as written. It was 2nd by Ruth, and the motion passed.

President's Report - Bill will be helping Jenny Watson this week to set up her father's (Earl Denbo) art work for our grand opening and art show. He showed us a proof of the history book developed by Becky Stetter for 4th graders. It was lovely, but the printing costs were more than he anticipated. However, we have a donor who will pay for 200 copies.

Financial Report - Beginning balance as of Feb. 14 was \$8,293.50. Deposits from book sales, 2 memberships, and copies totaled \$187.00 which brought the balance to \$8,480.50. Disbursements included utilities, Jeff Roll and the Postmaster. It also included a transfer of \$4,000 to the Proctor House account to help with the funds needed for the Proctor House restoration. This total is \$4,551.11. Ending balance is \$3,929.39. Membership is 73.

The Veterans Memorial Assoc. will be meeting at 7 p.m. on March 26, 2018, at the CASA building in English. Roberta will be attending an Historian Roundtable March 28 in Indianapolis. Jason Froman contacted her at the Archives as he is interested in genealogy. She is helping him with research.

Proctorville Report - The contents of the Proctor House need to be moved out soon due to the restoration. The purchase of a battery-powered lawn mower was discussed as Bill and sons plan to mow it this year. It was felt that it would save us money and so would soon pay for itself. Roscoe made a motion to purchase the mower. It was 2nd by Judy, and the motion passed.

The Proctor House account had a beginning balance of \$3,234.12 as of Feb. 14. Disbursements for utilities and O'Bannon Publishing Co. came to \$497.55. Ending balance is \$2,736.57.

Fund Raising Report - Our yard sale at the VFW building will be April 21. The Backyards Market event will be May 11 and 12. It features crafts, bands, etc. Tents can be rented and we might rent one to sell our books, etc.

Donations - Pictures of Luther and Aileen Jones who are buried in English were donated by Timothy Luff.

Old Business - Judy made a motion to purchase the 4th grade history books developed by Becky Stetter. It was

2nd by Ruth, and the motion passed. The books will be distributed to all 4th graders. We are partnering with the DAR for this project.



Crawford County Veteran's Spotlight:

William Morgan

William was enrolled on the 1st day of April, 1865 to Company A, as a recruit. He was 42 years old. William was recruited late in the war to help increase the number of soldiers in the 49th, after sickness, death, and the first term of enlistment was up for the men. Most of the unit did not re-enlist. Only about one hundred or so men did, so men were recruited to bring up the numbers. William was one of these men. William served with the 49th Indiana until it was mustered out in September 13, 1865. William lived in Riceville, Crawford county, Indiana, before and after the war, where he resided with his wife, Margaret Morgan. Unfortunately for William, during a night of guard duty in July, 1865, he contracted a "Heavy Cold" during and because of a "Violent Rain Storm". This cold caused him to cough, severely, which led to two hernias. He was forced to wear a truss for the remainder of his life. Even so, he could do little, if any work, William spent the remainder of his life trying to get a pension. He is described as being a fine upstanding, honest man, by several of his peers.


History Books for 4th Graders
