This is where biblical theology comes in.

Biblical theology helps us see **how all Scripture points to Christ**, unfolding God's plan from creation to new creation.

Let's break it down.



Biblical theology is the study of the Bible as one unified story.

- ✓ It traces themes and patterns across Scripture.
- ✓ It focuses on how God's redemptive plan unfolds over time.
- ✓ It helps us see Jesus as the central focus of Scripture.

John 5:39

"You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness about Me."

Lesson: The Bible is not just a rulebook—it is **the unfolding story of Jesus.**

The Grand Narrative of the Bible

Biblical theology follows **the storyline of Scripture**, which can be summarized in six key acts:

Creation (Genesis 1-2)

Genesis 1:31

"And God saw everything that He had made, and behold, it was very good."

- God created the world perfect and good.
- ✓ Humanity was made in God's image for relationship with Him.
- Lesson: The Bible begins with God's perfect design.

The Fall (Genesis 3)

Romans 5:12

"Sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin."

- ✓ Adam and Eve's sin brought brokenness, suffering, and death.
- ✓ The world is no longer as it should be.
- ✓ God promises a Savior (Genesis 3:15) who will defeat sin.
- **Lesson:** Every problem in the world **stems from sin.**

The Promise (Genesis 12 – Malachi)

Genesis 12:2-3

"I will bless you... and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

- ✓ God makes a covenant with Abraham, Israel, and David.
- ✓ The Law, sacrifices, and prophecies point forward to Jesus.
- ✓ The Old Testament is filled with shadows of redemption.
- **Lesson:** The Old Testament is not disconnected from the Gospel—it sets the stage for Christ.

Redemption (The Gospels: Matthew – John)

Galatians 4:4-5

"When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth His Son... to redeem those under the law."

- ✓ Jesus is the promised Messiah and Savior of the world.
- ✓ His life, death, and resurrection fulfill the Old Testament.
- ✓ The cross and empty tomb bring salvation to all who believe.
- Lesson: Jesus is the center of the entire biblical story.

The Church (Acts – Revelation 20)

Matthew 28:19-20

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations."

- ✓ The Gospel spreads to all nations.
- ✓ The Church is God's people, living in the already-but-not-yet.
- ✓ Believers are called to live as ambassadors of Christ.
- **Lesson:** The Church continues **God's mission** until Christ returns.

The New Creation (Revelation 21-22)

Revelation 21:4

"He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more."

- ✓ God restores all things—a new heaven and new earth.
- Sin, suffering, and death are forever defeated.
- God's people dwell with Him for eternity.
- Lesson: The Bible ends where it began—in a perfect world with God.

Key Themes in Biblical Theology

Biblical theology connects major themes across Scripture:

Kingdom of God

- ✓ The Bible is about God's reign over creation.
- ✓ Jesus is the King who restores God's rule.

Mark 1:15

"The kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the Gospel."

The Temple & Presence of God

- ✓ In Eden, God dwelled with humanity.
- ✓ The Tabernacle, Temple, and Jesus all reveal God's presence.
- ✓ In the New Creation, God dwells with us forever.

Revelation 21:3

"Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man."

Sacrifice & Atonement

- Animal sacrifices pointed forward to Christ.
- ✓ Jesus is the true Passover Lamb (John 1:29).

Hebrews 10:12

"But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, He sat down at the right hand of God."

Why Biblical Theology Matters

- ✓ 1. It Helps Us Read the Bible Correctly
 - ✓ The Bible is one story, not disconnected lessons.
 - ✓ We must read each passage in light of the whole.
- 2. It Shows How Jesus Is the Fulfillment of Scripture
- **Luke 24:44**

"Everything written about Me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets, and the Psalms must be fulfilled."

- ✓ Jesus is not just in the New Testament—He is the focus of the entire Bible.
- 3. It Strengthens Our Faith in God's Plan
- Romans 8:28

"We know that for those who love God all things work together for good."

Understanding biblical theology deepens our trust in God's sovereignty.

- 1. Read the Bible as One Story
 - ✓ Ask: How does this passage fit into God's redemptive plan?
- 2. Look for Jesus in Every Book
 - Christ is the center of the whole Bible.
- 3. Let Biblical Theology Shape Your Worldview
 - ✓ God is sovereign over history, and His plan is unfolding.
