# BA Study Guide: Matthew 9-12

### Overview

Matthew 9–12 shows Jesus *in motion*—healing, calling, teaching, rebuking, and casting out. But underneath the miracles and confrontations, there's a deeper message: **Jesus has absolute** authority, and to follow Him means surrender, sacrifice, and soul-level obedience.

Jesus doesn't offer comfort.

He offers truth.

And truth *cuts*—before it heals.

## Chapter Breakdown

#### Matthew 9 - Power Over Sickness and Sin

- Jesus forgives a paralyzed man's sin *before* healing his body.
- He calls Matthew—a tax collector and societal traitor—to follow Him.
- He's criticized for eating with sinners but says, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice."

### Key Truth

Your past doesn't disqualify you from following Jesus—your refusal to surrender does.

### **Reflection Question**

Where are you asking Jesus to fix your circumstances but ignoring what He wants to heal in your heart?

#### Matthew 10 - Discipleship Isn't Safe

- Jesus sends out the Twelve with no money, no backup, and no illusions.
- He warns they'll be hated, persecuted, and rejected—even by family.
- He says, "Take up your cross." Not as a metaphor—as a mindset.

### Key Truth

Following Jesus won't make your life easier. It will make it worth it.

#### Challenge

What's one area in your life where comfort has replaced obedience?

#### Matthew 11 – Doubt, Rest, and Response

- John the Baptist, in prison, starts to question if Jesus is the One.
- Jesus responds by pointing to the fruit—healing, life, and truth.

- He calls out cities who saw miracles but didn't repent.
- He offers rest—but only for the weary who will come to Him.

### **Key Truth**

Doubt isn't a sin—but staying in doubt without seeking Jesus is.

### **Confession Prompt**

"Jesus, I've seen You move but still held back parts of my life. I repent of my comfort. I want Your rest on Your terms."

### Matthew 12 - Authority over Religion and Relationship

- The Pharisees accuse Jesus of breaking the Sabbath.
- He heals a man with a withered hand—publicly, purposefully.
- They call Him demonic. Jesus responds with clarity:

• Then He redefines family—not as biology, but as **obedience**.

### **Key Truth**

You don't belong to Jesus because you know His name—you belong to Him when you *obey* His voice.

#### **Check Yourself**

Do your words, actions, and rhythms reveal a heart surrendered to Jesus—or a mouth full of religion?

#### God's Character Revealed

- He is merciful to sinners (Matt. 9)
- He is honest with His followers (Matt. 10)
- He is patient with doubters (Matt. 11)
- He is fearless against hypocrisy (Matt. 12)

God isn't distant. He's decisive. He doesn't beg for loyalty—He commands it.

#### What This Confronts in Me

- My desire to follow Jesus without discomfort
- My fear of rejection when standing for truth

<sup>&</sup>quot;A tree is known by its fruit."

<sup>&</sup>quot;Out of the abundance of the heart, the mouth speaks."

- My tendency to perform instead of surrender
- My habit of religious talk without spiritual fruit

## Memory Verse

#### Matthew 10:38

"Whoever does not take his cross and follow Me is not worthy of Me."

Let that sit. Jesus didn't say "try your best." He said, take up your cross or don't follow Me at all.

### Today's Battle Plan

- Confess where you've chosen comfort over calling.
- Repent of spiritual laziness masked as "waiting on God."
- Memorize Matthew 10:38. Say it. Pray it. Live it.
- Challenge another man to read Matthew 9–12 with you and discuss the cost of real discipleship.

# Evangelism Tip

Don't hide your scars. Share how Jesus met you in your failure and gave you a new start. That's what people actually relate to—not your perfect theology, but your personal transformation.



Ask a brother:

"What's one thing Jesus is asking you to surrender—but you've been ignoring it?" Then don't fix him. Just walk with him. That's real discipleship.

## Final Charge

This isn't about reading Scripture—it's about *being read by it*. Let Jesus confront your comfort. Let Him question your casual faith. Then follow—without flinching.

He didn't call you to safety.

He called you to surrender.
