BA Commentary: Matthew 5–8

Jesus Isn't Preaching a TED Talk

This section contains the **Sermon on the Mount** (Matthew 5–7) and moves straight into Jesus *proving* His authority in Matthew 8.

Don't read this as a gentle devotional or some idealistic "code of ethics." This is a **kingdom constitution**—Jesus laying down what it *really* looks like to live under His rule.

And let's be clear: it's not about polishing up your life. It's about dying to yourself completely.

Matthew 5 – From Beatitudes to Blades

The chapter opens with what people call the *Beatitudes*, but don't let that soft name fool you. These are the **battle cries of the kingdom**. Jesus blesses what the world despises:

- Poverty of spirit
- Mourning
- Meekness
- Hunger for righteousness
- Mercy
- Purity
- Peacemaking
- Persecution

This isn't a checklist. It's a description of the kind of man who's been wrecked by grace and rebuilt by the Spirit.

Then Jesus says something wild:

"I did not come to abolish the Law or the Prophets but to fulfill them." (5:17)

He raises the bar—not drops it.

- Anger = murder
- Lust = adultery
- Divorce = covenant destruction
- Enemies = objects of sacrificial love

Jesus isn't just after right behavior. He wants right desires.

Matthew 6 – Secret Strength and True Loyalty

Jesus turns the spotlight off of external religion and zeroes in on **secret devotion**. He dismantles three spiritual power moves: giving, praying, and fasting.

"When you do it, don't do it for show. Do it for your Father, who sees in secret." (paraphrased)

God sees the stuff nobody else sees—and that's where your character is built.

Then Jesus attacks another idol we coddle: control.

"Do not be anxious... But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness." (6:25–33)

Anxiety isn't just emotional. It's spiritual.

It's often rooted in misplaced worship. When we chase security, approval, or provision more than God—we're functionally idolatrous.

This chapter is Jesus asking:

"Who's your King—Me or your need for control?"

Matthew 7 – Fake Faith Gets Exposed

Jesus closes His sermon by **confronting the crowd**—not comforting them.

- "Judge not"—yes, but read the rest. It's about hypocrisy, not accountability. (7:1–5)
- "Enter through the narrow gate"—because the easy road leads to destruction. (7:13–14)

He warns about false teachers—those who sound good, look spiritual, but whose fruit is rotten.

Then He says one of the most sobering things in the entire Bible:

"Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom..." (7:21)

Talk is cheap. Obedience is everything.

Jesus is drawing a hard line between professing Him and *following* Him.

And finally, He compares two builders:

- One builds on the **rock** (His words).
- One builds on **sand** (their own wisdom).

The storm comes for both. Only one stands.

Matthew 8 – Jesus Walks, Speaks, and Commands Like a King

Now that Jesus has taught with authority—He demonstrates it.

He heals a leper with a touch.

- He marvels at a Gentile's faith.
- He calms a storm with a word.
- He casts out demons with a sentence.

In every situation, Jesus is **in complete command**. No one else talks like this. No one else moves like this.

The response? Awe and fear.

"What kind of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey Him?" (8:27)

Exactly. That's the point.

Theological Themes

- Kingdom culture always opposes worldly comfort
- Righteousness is internal first, external second
- Obedience reveals identity
- Jesus is not just a teacher—He is the sovereign King

Masculine Implications

- Real men don't just quote Scripture. They obey it.
- Leading your family begins with crucifying your ego.
- Fear of man must be buried at the feet of the One who calms storms.
- You cannot live a kingdom life with a cultural mindset.

Final Application

Ask yourself:

- Am I more concerned with being seen as godly than actually being godly?
- Am I building on the Rock—or still playing in the sand?
- Have I submitted to Jesus' authority—or just admired His teaching?

This isn't casual Christianity. This is the cross-carrying kind.

If you're still holding onto your comfort, control, or casual religion—drop it now. Because storms are coming. And the only thing that will stand is the life built on **obedience to the King.**
