The Great Vallejo Race 2023

This year's Vallejo Race May 6-7 was an epic event for E Ticket.

It is a big commitment of time and effort to do the two-day Vallejo Race from Benicia. We need to take the boat down on Friday, race Saturday, race Sunday, and sail back to Benicia after the race.

It's a big race ... most years there are 100 to 300+ boats participating. This year is smaller with 75 racers.



Saturday Race, we notice that the Port tack and pin are favored. It is tough to start on Port against a fleet of 8. We decide to start on Port. One other boat, *Siren*, starts on Port also and squeezed us out from our barging position. We tack and gibe away to make a clean start.

We start on Port and have to duck 4 to 5 Starboard-tacked boats. When we come back together and round the Weather Mark, we are in 4th place in our fleet. The Port start did pay, but due to getting barged out of the start line and ducking boats, we lose some of the benefits of the Port start.

After the Weather Mark, we bear off and set Spinnaker and work the wind and current to finish 2nd for the day. There were not very many passing lanes in this race.

Saturday night we rafted at Vallejo Yacht Club amongst our fleet. Food was great. Bands were good.

Sunday Race turns out to be very challenging—winds are light and variable coming from the WNW.

Flood begins building in the racers face quickly a few minutes before our start. The start is in MI strait across from Vallejo Yacht Club.

We stay above the start line and watch the fleets starting before us ... we notice how significant the current is in relation to the light wind. Boats that have already started are barely making forward progress.



At 5 min we are at the Right side of the course and decide the Left side is favored. We head deep and slow to the Left side of the course and keep about 50' from the start line. It is slow going ... takes 3-plus minutes to cross the line. We appear to be early to the line.

Meanwhile the rest of our starting fleet is in traditional downwind positions over 100' behind us. The wind continues to lighten.

E Ticket turns towards the start line expecting to be early and run the line, since the other boats are set back so far from the line.

Our competitors set spinnakers to make start line. They have a very hard time carrying with spinnakers up.

We realize that we are not early ... but about the right distance and speed to the start line. We trim boat for speed and start very close to the line at the starting gun sound.

We look back and see the whole fleet considerably behind us ... several hundred feet. We hold off setting our spinnaker while the fleet struggles with theirs. Our lead grows. This may be the best down-bay start we have had over the years. We are easily 200' ahead of all of our starting competitors.

We stay to the Left side of race course for current relief. This pays well. Most of competitors are flying spinnakers and trying to stay up-wind and as a result of this strategy, they are directly in the strongest current.

On our way out of channel several boats start catching us on the Right side of channel as the wind fills in. We head over to cover our competitors on the Right side and manage to just stay ahead of them as we come out of the MI Channel and head into the San Pablo Bay. We lead the fleet from the Start and all the way down the MI Channel! This is very difficult to do.

After exiting the MI Channel, we stay to the Right and run the breakwater wall; the flood is running 1 to 2 kts. The breakwater wall on the right gives us some current relief.

At the end of the wall, we head across the race course to the far Left side to get current relief tucked behind Pinole Pt.

We worked the Left side and are challenged by several of our competitors: *Ahi, Harp* and *Sea Star*. We focus our tactics on our lead competitors and manage to hold and then extend lead by staying more in the Left shallows.

We approach Red Rock which is a Mark of the course and must be Left to Port. We battle with *Harp* to keep ahead and manage to do so.

After rounding Red Rock, Sea Star sets spinnaker early and cuts the corner towards the finish line.



This surprisingly works well and they gain quickly on us.

We deploy our spinnaker and sail to cover the challenge from *Sea Star*. We manage to hold off *Sea Star* and *Harp* and finish 1st in our fleet physically. After handicap corrections are applied, we hold onto the lead and finish 1st for Sunday. We beat the 2nd-place boat, *Harp*, by only 11 seconds corrected.

After the race we sail home and barbecue and relax for the several-hours ride home. We sail at about 8 to 9 kts due to the stiff breeze. Even though there is now an Ebb current against us, the higher boat speeds result in us making good time and we arrive home before sunset.

We are exhausted from our 10 hours on the water Sunday. We are happy with the results from the weekend—2nd on Saturday and 1st on Sunday, resulting in us winning our fleet for the weekend.

Our crew was simply amazing. The effort, focus, great attitude and team spirit obtained these great results!
