#### **BYC Facility Update**

#### **Covering the BYC Lower Deck**

How many BYC members does it take to cover a deck? By the time it was done almost 50 members either worked on the deck or contributed to it. It took a lot of hours and weekends and trial and error over the last two years to get where we are today, but it is a story of how folks working together can make things happen.

We started out with the COVID mandate to only serve food



outdoors. To enable us to stay open, we had an emergency meeting and the following week put up our own tents. That didn't help much during the rain but at least kept us open for a few weeks. One of our members bought a larger tent which we used pieces of up until a few weeks ago. Next a scheme was developed to construct a wooden structure from the top deck to cover the lower deck. Initially it was a bit of a challenge to drain the upper deck since it sloped to the middle but one of the members figured out that one too. Then the fire marshal came and offered some "advice" on what it would take to comply with regulations. We got some new fire-resistant tarps and made it through the winter.

This Fall we took what worked last year and expanded on it. C-clamps were replaced with permanent attachments. The wood structure was replaced with a galvanized frame. We got some new members and



one couple, expert at making canvas boat enclosures, showed us how we could put clear vinyl windows on the outside. The materials were expensive and not in our budget, but a single appeal to the membership raised enough money overnight. We even got a very generous donation of twist studs for the fasteners from a former member of the Club. On the First Saturday Workday in December, three sewing machines and a dozen or so people got together, made custom vinyl windows and hung

them in place. The deck now has a cover that should last through the winter. The windows can be taken down and stored in the summer while the deck cover can become shade. The cover looks a bit like a boat

but that is OK because the navigation lights are on the upper deck anyway.

## A MATTER OF BALANCE

In the next couple of months the 2022 BYC Racing Season will begin. This is also the time of year that a boat owner needs to have a serious discussion with his vessel, and both the vessel and the boat owner need to come to an understanding about what is expected this season. I am committing that I will keep all of her systems in good order, and keep her bottom clean because the *Playpen2* doesn't like it when she is sporting growth. She also does not like being ignored and is prone to act up if she doesn't get frequent attention. In return she promises me asylum and if I am willing to engage with her, moments of complete balance with the world.

I remember one magic afternoon when Terri and I were tacking through Raccoon Strait heading to Richardson's Bay to spend an evening on the hook. We had been sailing around the Richmond Yacht Club and when coming into Raccoon Strait if you enter in the right spot you can catch the wind as it funnels through the Strait and have one long tack until you clear Angel Island. That afternoon we hit it just perfect, and as we snapped into our tack all the telltales were streaming aft. To add to the experience, there were about a dozen other boats on the same tack, and for about 10 minutes it felt like the boats were stationary and the world was moving around us. The fresh Pacific winds were warm, currents were steady, and the surrounding views could not have been more beautiful. For that period, everything was perfect and there was nothing else in the universe, only the glide of the *Playpen2*.

When you hit that perfect tack, there is a balance as sharp as a knife's edge. A degree one way or the other can make a big difference. The helmsman becomes one with the vessel, and she tells you exactly what she needs if you are willing to listen. She is constantly speaking to you—just a little bit further dear, head up just a degree my darling, just one more boat length my love. She beckons you for just a little bit more, until you are forced to break into reality because you have either passed the lay line or are facing imminent collision. You tack quickly and seek that special balance again, and continue this process seeking that perfect balance with the wind, water and vessel until you reach your destination. It is one of the few times that I feel that all is as it should be, which is why I find it so intoxicating.

I am anticipating much will change as the pandemic comes to a close, and I, like so many others, am seeking the perfect balance in my quest in other parts of my life. My Thursday evenings with my team provide me a weekly experience to seek a moment of perfect balance. Many Thursday afternoons when the winds are howling, or the weather is less than perfect,I ask myself—do I really want to do this? The fact is, just the experience with the team makes is worthwhile and I never regret the experience.

So for yet another season I will promise uncompromising devotion the *Playpen2*, and in return—if she truly loves me—she will grant me those perfect moments that I crave now more than ever. —Stephen W. Dale, Skipper of the *Playpen2*

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## **2022 Boaters Safety Recommendations and Check-Up**

1. Make sure you have your new registration on the boat and have put your new decals on the front of your boat; it should say 2022. If you are a documented boat, you should have up-to-date Coast Guard documentation paper on board and know where it is.

2. Check all shore power cords and ends to see that there is not any corrosion on the connections, then put Noalox dielectric grease on the ends after cleaning them. Corrosion on the ends can start a fire.

3. Check batteries to see there is not any corrosion on the terminals, and that the batteries have the proper level of water.

4. Check oil and oil filters and fuel filters—they should be changed once a year or at 100 hours engine running time.

5. Check engine valve covers and oil pans to be sure you do not have any oil leaks. Be sure the area around the engine is clean without any oil or grease in the bilge.

6. Inspect and check oil level on transmissions.

7. Check to see if stuffing boxes on shafts are dripping at proper rate.

8. Be sure the bilge is clean without any oil or dirty water sitting there.

9. Keep track of when zincs were changed on the engine and running gear; this can be very important to the life of the equipment.

10. Check to see that all systems are working—horn, navigation lights, and all fire extinguishers—to be sure they are in the green.

11. Check the batteries on all smoke and carbon monoxide units to make sure they are working.

12. Check dates on visual distress signals for day and night use. They now have a Strobe light that takes three C batteries so you would not have to buy flares every three years.

**13.** Check on Personal Flotation Devices (PFD) or life jackets. Be sure they are readily available and are in good shape. That means clean without holes or mildew from the winter rains. If you want to count the inflatable jackets they must be worn at all times. They should be checked to see they are in the green. They are not legal if the person wearing the jacket is under 16 years of age. There must be one (PFD) for each person on the boat and they must be the right size for the person wearing the jacket. It is always a good idea to buy a small strobe light to have on every (PFD).

14. This is the time to check your VHS radio out. Call the Benicia Marina on channel 16 and they will tell you what channel to go to, and ask them how they are hearing you. <u>Do not ask for a radio check on channel 16</u>. <u>Channel 16 is only used for hailing other vessels</u> or calling the Coast Guard for Emergencies.

15. Check all motors and anchor windless, radar and GPS systems. Many times things just happen over the winter rains.

16. Check your fresh water system out. If you can change all the water, do it. It would be a good idea to put a couple of capfuls of bleach in the tank. Keep tank full so you will have water for any emergencies.

17. You should have a copy of your insurance papers on board; many marinas make you show them.

18. If you are one of the old timers you should know the government has done away with The Loran System. This system was used for navigation before GPS.

**19.** If your boat uses gasoline you should put in a small bottle of dry gas. You can get it at any automotive store. Because they are putting Ethanol in the gas, it will attract water and condensation in the tank of your boat.

20. If you put white vinegar in the sinks and heads it will clean them and help keep them in working order.

21. It is a good idea to keep your holding tank empty, and your water tanks full due to where we live (ie, in case of earthquakes and other emergencies).

22. It is recommended you get a Vessel Safety Check done by The Coast Guard Auxiliary or The US Power Squadrons. You can call Paul Brighton (cell 707-373-1077) or James Minkel (cell 707-208-5191) to set a time and date for the Vessel Safety Check. <u>IT IS FREE</u>.

23. It is a good time to check your anchor line and/or chain. Check all docking lines that have been exposed to weather.

24. If by any chance you have mice or other varmints buy some liquid peppermint—they won't stay around long.
