



<u>IT'S BYC</u> <u>ELECTION TIME!</u>








BYC Facility Renovation Update





I am proud of our Club and how we have increased our membership numbers from a lowest low of 155 during the worst of the Covid pandemic to its current count which is way over the highest level of the last 15 years—252 memberSHIPS!

E Ticket and BYC Finally Win Jazz Cup 2022! Written by the Captain of E-Ticket Noble Griswold

It has been 7 years since BYC has won this race. It has been 24 years since myself and crew has won this race. This race is between South Beach YC in SF and BYC in Benicia. The fastest corrected boat between the two clubs wins the coveted Jazz Cup.

The Jazz Cup Race is a great time for BYC to be open to the public and the local community to embrace boating, the downtown and waterfronts of Benicia. Live music was provided at BYC from the afternoon into the evening.

E Ticket started at 11:30 a.m. in the fifth starting fleet of approximately 76 racers overall. The slowest fleets had started at 11 a.m. and every 5 minutes after, another fleet would start. After our start, several other faster fleets started behind us.

The winds were 10-15 mph and the current was a dying ebb with 1-2 hours of ebb time left. The starting area was just North of Treasure Island. The race course is approximately 25 miles long. There is 1 mile upwind leg to Alcatraz and then downhill (downwind) all the way to Benicia.

We started on Starboard tack, close hauled on the pin side of the starting line. After the start we were very close in boat speeds to our competitors and we were not far enough ahead to be clear to tack. (When we tack, we need enough room to clear all boats on starboard tack since they have right of way.)

Our first mark is upwind and near Alcatraz Island. We have reached the lay line. The other boats behind us haven't tacked and we are pinned out until they tack.

Finally, they tack, and we tack and head to the upwind mark. We can easily make the weather mark since we overstood the mark a bit due to being held out. As we reach the Windward mark, we ease sails and adjust our leads for optimum speed. We are now on a broad reach. The wind is stiff and we are moving around 7-8 kts of boat speed and are in 3rd position in our fleet.

Now the big tactical decision is ahead: do we go left or right on the race course?

Left (West) will take you into the dreaded Angel Island wind shadow, with the hope of getting the early breeze through Racoon Straits.

Right (East) will bring you quickly into the shallows and current relief on the East side. We have decided based on the conditions that staying to the East side and in the wind is our best tactical strategy.

After the Windward mark, we are running with the top of the fleet and are watching all lead boats from all the earlier fleets for information on winds and current. The wind deepens and we set our red and black spinnaker on a reach.

We can see all the boats on the Left / West are dying in a growing wind hole. Their sails are hanging limply without wind to fill them. On the Right / East side, the wind (and we know the current relief) is better. We head further to the East side of the course. There are still boats even further to the East of us that are moving fast.

We see a significant wind / tide line in front of us, and we make sure to keep on the East side of this line. This proves to be a big gainer. The boats to the West have no wind AND the current is in their face ... the worst of conditions. The East side is now strongly favored.

We stay on the East side and the wind starts dying across the course affecting all the boats. Essentially, the dreaded Angel Island shadow is extended all the way across the course to Richmond. All boats are now struggling and looking to find wind.

We position *E Ticket* to a broad reach, which is our fastest point of sail in light wind. We drift, ghost through the 100 meter wind shadow at approximately 2 kts of boat speed and about 2 kts of wind. We can see the darker windier water ahead ... Finally we reach it and quickly pick up to 5 kts of boat speed.

As we focus on optimum speed, we look back and boats that were on both sides of us are still wallering in the enlarging wind hole behind us. Now we have a pep in our step and realize that we have passed most of the boats that started ahead of us!

We are in the lead for our fleet and there are only 3-5 boats left ahead of us overall! Approximately 40 slower boats had started ahead of us. We realize, we are with the top lead boats and we will have an outstanding race if we can hold this lead.

We go under the Richmond Bridge on the East side of the course. We are still seeing some ebb current (in our face) and we stay on the East side shallows to get relief. We have to watch for wind shadows, since there is land topography that is affecting the wind near the shore.

The East side boats include Gordie Nash and other great racers who often win their fleet. We are ahead of Gordie (*Arcadia*) and we watch all their moves and counter them to keep them from gaining advantage.

We are in San Pablo Bay on the East side close to the Brothers Islands. This strategy minimizes any remaining ebb and positions us for the soon-to-come, much-desired flood current, which will start in the shallows and back eddies.

As we looked ahead we see the few remaining lead boats taking down their spinnakers and going to head sails. This means that the wind has shifted forward and we need to transition as fast as possible to the head sail and take down our spinnaker. We quickly make the call, crew executes flawlessly and we set our #1 (largest) head sail. The wind has softened to 4-9 kts.

We are going strong with our head sail and approaching Pinole Pt. which is about 1/2 way across San Pablo Bay. We watched the current lines and check each side of them to find the most favorable current. We keep finding the East side is still paying.

We trim our sails attentively and rotate trimmers to stay fresh. The heat kicks in ... it is in the 90's. We watch out for each other. We pass around cold towels and make sure we are hydrated. We eat and drink to make sure we are properly nourished.

The wind deepens and it is now time to set our spinnaker again. We decide to fly our asymmetrical teal spinnaker since it performs very well with the wind more forward. We set and the carry this spinnaker well. We stay disciplined and keep a hotter angle into the wind and stay in the shallows on the East to continue to get ebb current relief. The faster boast don't pass us since they are more out in the ebb current.

As we approached the North end of San Pablo Bay, we can see the Carquinez Bridge and the challenging Carquinez Strait ahead. We stay to the East and look for wind to cross over to the North side of the Straits. The North side of the Straits are typically favored when the wind is SW. We find a wind river and ride it to the North tower of the bridge. We go under Carquinez Bridge and enter our local Carquinez Strait waterways. Now we were on our home turf where we are the most experienced sailing and racing.

After Dillon Pt. we stay to the North into the shallows for the flood current. We can see the boats in the middle are still feeling adverse ebb current and quickly pay a price by moving back compared to boats on North side.

We pass 1st Street Benicia Pier with favorable current and sail towards the Leeward turning mark. After this mark, we go to a reach, then harden up to a upwind finish.

We finished around 3:38 p.m. with only a few boats ahead of us and several dozen spinnakers behind us reaching into the distance. Total racing time just over 4 hours.

We start processing how well we really did. Several of us had some form of heat exhaustion and many of us jump into the bay water to cool off. OMG the water feels so good after a few hours in the burning sun!

Our crew of 10 was simply amazing. We had our regular Thursday night racing crew who is experienced and work very well together. Some of our newer crew don't have many years under their belts ... but they were great. The new and old became seamless and we performed at an optimum level. Our teamwork, intensity and focus were excellent!

This year we came to win it ... as we have many other years ... however this year it finally paid off ... we did have what it takes ... and later in the evening we confirmed we had indeed won Jazz Cup! *E Ticket* finished 1st in fleet, 1st for Benicia racers and 1st for Jazz Cup.

Thank you, Benicia Yacht Club and South Beach YC, for co-hosting such a great event. The after party and hospitality were excellent. We appreciate a Yacht Club and community that supports sailing and boating in our local waters!

CHASE THE MOON RACE 2022 – FLIRTING WITH DISASTER ON THE SAN PABLO BAY

August 12 was the Chase the Moon Race, most challenging race of the year in the BYC Beer Can Series. This is a 22-mile round trip race, from the Benicia Marina, to marker "r8" in the middle of the San Pablo Bay and back again. The race is timed to round the mark about sunset, and then return home in the dark. There were 5 boats in the competition this year, including Captain Dan with *Sail la Vie*, Chuck Hooper with *Warhoop*, Greg Spenser with *Black Swan*, and Noble Griswold with *E-Ticket*. The start was a reverse start, and start times depended on your



rating. The first boat was Sail la Vie at 6 p.m., followed by us at 6:19 p.m.

Dan took off like a rocket, and we never could close the gap. I had been watching all the different weather apps all week, and I will confess I tend to focus on the ones that give me the result that I wanted. Unfortunately the San Pablo Bay does not subscribe to the same apps and the winds and swells were a little bit more challenging than I had anticipated, and because we were sailing in a building ebb, the winds were going the opposite of the current, which tends to create some pretty challenging chop. Fred piloted the boat for much of the San Pablo Bay, and Gary congratulated him for not missing any of the big swells. Even so, we plowed through the chop, overpowered as usual, baptizing us all with a wave over the bow from time to time.

As we finally rounded marker "r8", we went from 20 mph apparent wind on our nose, to less than 10 mph for the return home. To compound this, the ebb current that helped push us to the mark, now was against us for the return, so our speed over ground was 2-4 mph. Doing the math, with 11 miles to home, there was a good chance we would not finish until after midnight, WAYyyy past my bedtime.

For anyone who has ever sailed at night, especially in a body of water surrounded by city and nautical lights, it is easy to get disoriented. There were certainly a lot of distractions, not the least of which was a steady stream of commercial ships coming and going. After we passed the sea wall, I turned the wheel over to Andy, who did a great job staying on course with an ever-changing set of challenges.

About the time we passed back under the Carquinez Bridge, *Black Swan* was right behind us, so at least we had another boat to visually compete against. To add to the challenge, a Car Carrier was right behind him. By that time the current reversed, and the challenge was to try to stay in the middle of the channel where the currents would help push us home, without getting run over by a 7-story ship. If that wasn't enough, as we came to Benicia Point, the winds dropped to 3-4 mph, barely enough to keep the boat in control and another Car Carrier was leaving the Benicia Port. So here we were with one Car Carrier going one direction, a 2nd going the other direction, with *Black Swan* and *Playpen2* in the channel trying not to become roadkill. I will say—when you are right next to the behemoths, they are a lot larger up close.

We managed to survive that challenge and literally drifted over the finish line at 11:49 p.m., just behind *Black Swan*. We then went through the routine of putting the sails away with Andy at the helm. I was on the foredeck with Randy, and we were focused on trying to find the red and green lights at the mouth of the marina. We were puzzled about why we could not find them until we saw the sea wall to the marina entrance right in front of us. We all started yelling "go left—go left!" and Andy promptly responded, averting yet another potential disaster.

Even though our evening flirted with a number of near disasters, and in the end, we finished last of those that finished, I love sharing these experiences with the crew, who apparently have no more common sense than myself. As I like to say, any time we don't sink or die, is a good day.

In this case, it was good night.
