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



EXHIBITOR RULES & AWARDS

Rules & Regulations

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Middletown Grange Fair.

2. Each exhibitor is required to have a unique, computer generated, exhibitor number.

3. QR Coded Entry Tags are required for each exhibited item and must be obtained from the Grange Fair Entry Center, Building 3A before any item is submitted for entry in any department. Old tags will not be accepted. Entries should be made online. However, entry tags can also be obtained at the Fair Entry Office.

4.Exhibits are accepted on Monday, August 14 only.

5. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from injury and damage but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss. Any person detected tampering with the exhibits will be dealt with according to the law.

6. Entries will be made according to classification, determined by the Exhibitor.

7. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.

8. All entries will be grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the exhibitor.

9. Chairmen of departments reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the Chairmen reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.

10. Entry tags will NOT be printed after 7:45 on Monday. This will allow our Department chairman time to accept entries BEFORE the 8:00 P.M. Deadline.

11. Entries must NOT BE REMOVED before 4:00 P.M. Sunday, the last day of the Fair, in order to participate in the payment of premiums or awards.

12. Only items (CLASSES) listed in this catalog will be accepted and judged.

13. If proper conduct is NOT displayed by exhibitors, they will

be asked to leave and will be disqualified from further showing.

14. Items not picked up Sunday are typically discarded after a 'reasonable' time, unless prior arrangements have been made.

15. As participation in our event is by invitation, any exhibitors and their related parties who engage in behavior that is deemed offensive, violent, disruptive, or otherwise objectionable to the Directors of the Middletown Grange Fair are subject to immediate dismissal and expulsion from all current and all future Fair events. Situations may be decided on an individual, case-by-case basis by the Directors of the Middletown Grange Fair.

16. The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to the rules & regulations.

Awards & Premiums

Ribbons are awarded for 1st, 2nd, 3rd places, unless otherwise designated. In cases where there is not competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. The same rule applies when there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves. The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries will be accepted from an exhibitor in the same class or in the case of livestock, the same breed. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. The Chairman of the Fair, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision.

Unless otherwise noted in the Department listing, all premiums are:

1st Place: \$5.00 2nd Place: \$3.00 3rd Place: \$2.00

Award checks should be picked up in the Grange Fair Entry Center,

Building 3A, on Sunday, the last day of the Fair, between 4:00 and

6:00 P.M. You may also drop off a self-addressed stamped #10 envelope (4" X 9 1/2") during the Fair and your check will be mailed to you. Checks will not be mailed unless a SASE envelope has been provided

or previous arrangements have been made. Any checks not picked up Sunday and without providing the self-addressed envelope will be donated back to the Grange Fair.

Premium award checks must be cashed within 90 days after the last day of the fair. After 90 days, uncashed premiums will revert back to the Grange Fair's general fund.

THE BASICS FOR ENTERING

Entries are accepted for check-in at the Departments on MONDAY ONLY between 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., except wine and beer entries

- All Classes are open to the public.
- Note entry deadlines for each department.
- Exhibitors do NOT have to be Grange Members.
- Only ONE entry per Class, per person will be accepted.
- Items previously entered will NOT be accepted.
- All entries must be checked in and out by Fair Department personnel.

Each person entering an exhibit in the Middletown Grange Fair MUST have an Exhibitor's Identification Number and a computer generated tag for every item they are entering in the Fair. These tags are required prior to submitting your items at the Department Buildings.

Entering Online

Entries can be made online at www.middletowngrangefair.org.

The system will walk you through the process. Please note that you will be selecting your specific classes for each item during the entry process instead of at the Department building on Monday. This should make dropping off your entries much quicker.

If you enter online more than once, please do not repeat your entries. The system remembers all previous entries.

Fees for online entries will be paid at the Fair Office upon pickup of your entry tags. Your Online Entry Registration will NOT show your entry fee. (It will show

\$0.00 owed). By entering online, you will avoid long lines at the Fair Office and you can pick up your tags and pay your fee. Changes or additions to your entries can be made at this time. If you can't pre-enter online, entry tags can be obtained at the Fair Entry Office.

Health Rules

 No entries showing clinical evidence of infectious or contagious or parasitic disease or under quarantine for any disease shall be admitted to a show. All cattle entries must be identified by an official ear tag. An official health certificate prepared by the Bureau of Animal Industry, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, is optional.

 It is highly recommended that all animals entering the show be immunized against IBR, PI3 and BVD. It is strongly recommended that at least one vaccination against IBR, PI3, BRSV, and BVD be given not less than 30 days and not more than 6 months before the opening date of the show. RABIES VACCINATION IS REQUIRED.

3. All animals shall be owned by exhibitor. An official will check registration papers. No animal can be unloaded which does not conform to the regulations. If you have not received registration papers, be sure to have a confirmation of application for registry.

4. Only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals are permitted when fitting animals for show. No product with ingredients that result in residues in meat or milk are allowed or permitted. If you are not sure a product is residue safe, do not use it.

General Rules

 Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the Chairmen; to accept the stall assigned without controversy; to keep their animals in attractive appearance, and to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.

2. Exhibitors of livestock are responsible for verifying the time when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing.

 Decorations with ribbons or omaments previously won by animals at shows shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judges.

4. Exhibitors must have all non-lactating animals listed for competition on the grounds not later than 10:00 AM on Wednesday. All such animals shall remain on the premises until 4:00 PM on Sunday, unless released by the Chairmen. Lactating animals must be on the grounds no later than 10:00 AM the morning of their respective show and are excused immediately following their show.

5. The exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.

2. Substitutes will not be accepted after midnight, August 16, 2023.

3. Entry fee is \$5.00 per head for Open Show breeders and must be paid at the time of entry. Entry fees will not be refunded. Make checks payable to 'Middletown Grange Fair"

4. All entered animals must be owned by the exhibitor at least 30 days before the Show, AND MUST BE MARKED WITH PER-MANENT PENNSYLVANIA DESIGNATED SCRAPIE EAR TAG.

5. All animals must be in place by 10:00 A.M., Wednesday, the first day of the Fair, and remain at the Fair Grounds until 5:00 P.M., Sunday, the last day of the Fair. The only exception will be those exhibitors who have permission from the Fair Chairman to attend another Sheep Show. Violators will automatically forfeit their premiums.

4-H Club members must have passed their eighth birthday but not have passed their nineteenth birthday by January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors must be 4-H members carrying a project in the field in which they wish to make an entry, and be under the supervision of the Pennsylvania State University Cooperative Extension Service by the project deadline date preceding the Fair. All exhibits must have the approval of the 4H leader and the Extension Educator.

There is a \$5/animal entry fee for all 4-H animals.

About 4-H



4-H is a community of young people across America learning leadership,citizenship and life skills. 4-H enable kids to have fun, meet new people, learn new skills, build self-confidence, learn responsibility, and set and achieve goals. Kids learn by doing cool things! If you've heard that 4-H is only for farm

families, think again. 4-H reaches youngsters in cities, suburbs, and rural areas. In fact, 4-H is the largest youth organization in the world. Anyone aged eight to 18 may participate in the 4-H Youth Development Programs in Pennsylvania.

4-H is the youth development education program administered through Penn State Cooperative Extension offices in all of Pennsylvania's 67 counties. 

1. All recipes **FOR DIVISION 1511** must be typewritten no hand printed or written. Recipes not needed for DIVISION 1510.

2. All products must have been made by the exhibitor. No commercial products or entrants are allowed.

3. Baked products will be judged on flavor, texture and general appearance. Pies are to be judged on texture of crust and on the flavor and consistency of the filling. Foods may not be judged at the discretion of the judges.

4. All products must be made from scratch. No mini loaves or miniature cakes will be accepted.

5. All entries should be entered on a sturdy disposable plate and wrapped in clear plastic. Cake or pie plates will NOT be returned.

6. Complete baked goods (whole cakes) must be entered in order to be judged. After judging, a portion of the product will be displayed and the remainder becomes the property of the Middletown Grange Fair and will be disposed of in accordance to the regulations established by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

7. Judges reserve the right to not judge any entry they believe could contain contamination or spoilage.

8. Note that all leftover baked goods are donated to a food pantry.

IMPORTANT: NO REFRIGERATION IS AVAILABLE

Therefore, no cream, custard, or highly perishable entries will be accepted. Any item within this department that needs refrigeration will NOT be judged.

Canned Goods

Canned Foods are judged on quality, general appearance, and container and proper canning method. Use standard mason-type, clear quart / pint jars for preserving and exhibiting fruits and vegetables. Use two-piece,

All food not in standard jars or NOT sealed with self-sealing lids will be disqualified by the Judge. Jars will be opened and tasted.

Butters, Jams, Jellies, Marmalades and Preserves

Exhibits will be opened, tasted and judged on color, textures and flavors. Use two-piece, self-sealing lids -(flat discs and metal screw bands) for sealing all jars of food. Please leave metal screw bands on all jars. Entries should be in standard sized 1/2 pint or 8 oz jelly glass jars. NO paraffin will be accepted.

Food items that require refrigeration **WILL NOT be accepted.** All food not in standard jars or not sealed with self-sealing lids will be disqualified by the Judge. Jars will be opened and tasted. Definition of terms:

a. Butters: Sugar fruit or nut Butters only. Refrigeration is unavailable. b. Jelly: is clear and sparkling and has a fresh flavor of the fruit it is made from. It is tender enough to quiver when moved, but holds angles when cut.

c. Jams: are usually made from the pulp and juice from one fruit, rather than from several fruits. Berries and other small fruits are most frequently used, though larger fruits such as peaches cut into small pieces or crushed are also used. Good jam has a soft, even consistency without distinct pieces of fruit; a bright color, a good fruit flavor and a semi-jellied texture that is easy to spread but has no free liquid.

d. Marmalades: are usually made from fruits which have jelly – making properties. They have a clear jelly in which thin slices or small pieces of fruit are suspended.

e. Preserves: are whole fruits or pieces of fruits cooked in heavy sugar syrup. A special effort is made to keep the fruit as whole and well-shaped as possible. Good preserves are plump and tender with natural color and flavor.

Rules

- 1. All specimens and arrangements will be placed BY THE COMMITTEE.
- 2. The show will adhere to all conservation rules.
- 3. All specimen entries must be grown by the exhibitor.
- Accessories are permitted in all arrangement classes. However, the committee reserves the right to refuse antique or otherwise valuable accessories.
- It is the responsibility of entrants to claim their entries. All entries must be picked up from 4:00 P.M. until 6:00 P.M. on Sunday the last day of the Fair.
- It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified, but the judge will mark the correct name on the entry to benefit the exhibitor.
- 7. Use of artificial flowers is PROHIBITED.
- 8. The show will be closed to the public during the judging!

Specimen Flowers — Annuals and Perennials

Must be cut flowers grown by the exhibitor and must conform to the number of blooms, spikes, stems, or sprays (a main stem with blooms on all side branches) specified in each class. Remove buds showing color to maintain correct numbers of flowers. Leave some foliage on stems. Flowers in each entry must be of one color and variety unless otherwise stated. Identify variety. Use specimens nearing maturity — but not in full bloom.

Container Grown Plants

All exhibits in this class must be planted by exhibitors no less than 30 days prior to fair.

How to condition flowers for the show:

Cut flowers with a sharp knife early or late in the day, plunging immediately in WARM water - let stand in cool place for several hours before arranging. Try using FLORA-Life or 12 ounces of Sprite (soda) in 1 gallon of water in arrangement container. In advance you may groom side buds to create larger blooms.

8. Beer and Wine production must follow any regulations mandated by the State of PA.

9. Entries in divisions 3200 and 3220 must be amateur wine/beer, home produced.

10. Beer bottles submitted must be 7 to 32 ounces in volume, brown or green glass, free of raised glass or inked brand name lettering. All bottles must be crown capped. No swing tops. Corked bottles are acceptable if they are crown capped over the cork.

11. Homebrew beer must NOT have been brewed at any place that brews beverages for commercial purposes, including brew-on premises locations.

The Illustrious History Of The Middletown Grange Fair



he Middletown Grange Fair began in 1948 as a project of Middletown Grange to participate in a national contest sponsored by *Farm Journal Magazine*. The goal was to raise 300 bushels of corn to an acre. Grange members planted the corn on Heston Manor Farm near Yardley. In October the crop was hand harvested with a yield of 105 bushels per acre. At that first fair, there were exhibits of farm machinery, supplies, automotive and household goods, and the public attended.

The Fair grew quickly. By the early 1950s, it featured cattle shows, tractor driving, fashion shows, machinery parades, square dancing, high school bands, television personalities and 4-H activities. The famous chicken barbecue dinners were introduced in 1954 when the Fair extended to a three-day event including evenings. A Horse Show was added in 1965.

In 1966, the Middletown Grange purchased a tract of land in Wrightstown which became the site for the Fairs. Two permanent buildings were built in 1976 to house the multiple Grange Fair exhibits, flowers, vegetables, hay and grain, needlework, arts and crafts, and the many displays of 4-H members. From a Grange family's contribution, a Judging Arena was built in 1991. In 1993 and 2020 the Middletown Grange Fair was awarded the winner in Zone IV for overall excellence in production of a quality Fair by the Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. In 1997, it was extended from a three to a five-day fair.

Today, the Middletown Grange Fair attracts hundreds of exhibitors and thousands of attendees from near and far. Producing a Fair on this scale is no small feat, and we could not do it without the generosity, time and energy of our volunteers, exhibitors, sponsors, community partners and YOU. Your support allows us to carry on the great traditions of those who founded our Fair 75 years ago. With your continued support, we will ensure that it goes strong for many years to come!
