




1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc

This four-year action plan sets course for successfully achieving the intended expansion, thereby civically engaging 1000 high school girls per calendar year in New York State, and laying framework for expansion into bordering states (VT, PA, MA,CT, OH) by 2030 and nationally to remaining states, thereafter.



PURPOSE and STUDENT OBJECTIVES

1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc is the unique, non-partisan seminar and conference opportunity for high school girls to imagine themselves engaged in the political process as leaders and candidates for elected office in their adulthood.

THE PROBLEM: Women are 51% of the US population and occupy approximately only 25% of publicly-elected seats in our representative democracy at the local, state and national levels. Men are over-represented as government leaders (74.5% male to 25.5% female) creating a 24.5% gender gap in elected office in the US.

1st A-1st V students will imagine themselves in elected office and/or in professional government-related positions, and they will:

- Know and appreciate historic significance of Indigenous Women to the American Democracy
- Know and appreciate historic significance of Women of Color to the American Democracy
- Understand "sense of place" historic Seneca Falls, NY holds regarding women's rights movement in America
- Understand the connection/pathways between 1st and 19th Amendments of US Constitution
- Recognize need and history of work necessary for passage of proposed 28th Amendment to the US Constitution, the EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT (ERA)
- Learn process of HOW and WHEN to register to vote and cast informed ballots
- Deeply value free, fair, and safe elections
- Become aware of voter suppression in America and methods used to suppress the vote; become aware of laws and efforts to overcome voter suppression

- Become aware of fundamentals necessary to mount a political campaign on the local level, including campaign financing
- Hold the vision for gender parity in elected office as reason to continue with program throughout their high school years; plan to participate in related programs in college and/or in their community
- Articulate and plan a CHANGE ACTION at their high school to benefit the school community. Implementation: some time between 1stA-1stV SEMINAR and October LEADERSHIP ACTION SUMMIT
- Engage in focused discussions with women who are current and/or former elected officials on the local, state and national levels

 Secure an internship/civic engagement experience in/near their local community, e.g., in a local government office; for a local election campaign; on a communityaction / grassroots endeavor for which she has a passion; on a local LWV and/or local GOTV effort.

HOW CULTURE CHANGE HAPPENS

Culture is made up of customs, attitudes, and beliefs unique to each group of people. In US institutions, male leadership has been dominant since the inception of our democratic experiment, and efforts to elevate the status of women in American society has been ongoing since this "experiment" began. We need only to embrace the leadership example of Haudenosaunee women for the last 1000 years and be reminded of Abigail Adams' earnest protest to her husband... "remember the ladies," in a letter to him and other members of the Continental Congress in March, 1776. In more recent times, the aboltionist movement and the subsequent persistence of women's rights movements resulted in the passage of Amendment XIX in 1920; and active second wave feminist women and men have realized significant social strides since the 1960s. Yet, the struggle continues today to embed the ERA into the US Constitution, 97 years after it was introduced to our nation in Seneca Falls, NY by Alice Paul in 1923.

Processes of Change

"All Cultures are inherently predisposed to change and, at the same time, to resist change. There are dynamic processes operating that encourage the acceptance of new ideas and things while there are others that encourage changeless stability...there are three general sources of influence or pressure that are responsible for both change and resistance to it:

- 1. forces at work within a society
- 2. contact between societies
- 3. changes in the natural environment

Within a society, processes leading to change include invention and culture loss. Inventions may be either technological or ideological...Culture loss is an inevitable result of old cultural patterns being replaced by new ones...Within a society, processes that result in the resistance to change include habit and the integration of culture traits. Older people, in particular, are often reticent to replace their comfortable, long familiar cultural patterns. Habitual behavior provides emotional security in a threatening world of change. Religion also often provides strong moral justification and support for maintaining traditional ways...Male and female roles do not exist independent of each other. This sort of integration of cultural traits inevitably slows down and modifies cultural changes. Needless to say, it is a source of frustration for both those who want to change and those who do not."

The process of change, when intentional, requires persistence and patience with the understanding that desired change usually occurs in small increments over a longer period of time than initially expected. 1st A-1st V aligns with **Kurt Lewin's Change Theory...Unfreezing, Changing, Refreezing:**

- Creating the perception that change is needed (Unfreezing)

(1st A-1stV works with teen girls at the time they begin to lose confidence in themselves as leaders/change-makers; the program encourages teen girls to imagine themselves as teen leaders and in elected office, their rightful place, as adults)

Moving toward the new and desired behaviors (Changing)

(1st A-1stV requires each student to work with classmates and designated teacher-mentors to craft and implement a plan for desired change at their respective high school, including a presentation of findings to the school community)

Solidifying the new behaviors as the norm (Refreezing)

(1st A-1stV requires participants to commit to follow-up action/s in their home school and community to visibly demonstrate their leadership skills)



MEASURING SOLUTIONS ON WOMEN'S POWER AND INFLUENCE

1st A-1st V, through its collaborative relationship with participating high schools, is changing the *institutional culture* within the school building. By establishing a non-partisan, actively connected cohort of students who participate during one or more of their high school years, the very culture of the school is positively impacted; 1st A-1st V becomes part of the school's mission and legacy.

- 1. <u>Obstacles to power and influence</u>: Under-representation of women as government leaders is addressed through core competency attainment and experiential learning opportunities thereby creating a path for access and full participation in the political process.
- 2. <u>Solution</u>: Create a "pipeline" of diverse young women prepared to have their voices heard and to fully participate in the political process from registering to vote, to casting informed ballots, to running for office, to leading/serving as publicly elected officials. At the end of their program experience, teens who identify as girls, have been "coached" in the very processes of campaign development, running for office, government-career choices, and governance.
- 3. <u>Unique</u>: 1st A-1st V offers 14-17 year-old students opportunities to interact and learn directly from current and former elected officials who are women and participate in workshops, internships,* and related conference/capacity-building opportunities. 1st A-1st V combines an accurate history of women's suffrage and social movements in the US with information and initial skills-prep needed to campaign, lead, and take a seat at the governance table. 1st A-1st V builds social and cultural capital by offering various opportunities for students to imagine themselves as leaders in government. Over the years, 1st A-1st V cohorts, themselves, become a unique network of opportunity to reduce overrepresentation of males in US elected offices at all levels.

PROGRAM

1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc creates experiential learning opportunities for high school teens, who identify as girls, to be active leaders engaged in the American political process and it provides students with a foundational tool kit to run for elected office.

MISSION: 1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc is a non-partisan seminar and conference opportunity for high school girls to imagine themselves engaged in the political process as government leaders and candidates for elected office.

VISION: Gender parity in US elected office at the local, state and national levels.

VALUES/ECOSYSTEM: 1st Amendment-1st Vote honors and encourages...

- Diverse Student Voices
- Prepared Young Woman Voters as Candidates for Elected Office and Government Leadership

STRENGTHS:

We are a unique entry point into the "pipeline" of diverse young women imagining themselves in/preparing for government leadership at the municipal level, in the Statehouse, in Congress, and as POTUS. Our program is rooted in inclusion and valuing diversity in all forms, and we consistently encourage each student to share her voice at every opportunity. Each year, we welcome students to enjoy program participation with a widely diverse group of girls from various high schools in their geographic region and throughout NYS state. Fact-based program content and experiential learning activities are annually updated and informed by Humanities experts, student evaluations, and current and former women in elected public office. 1st A-1st V enjoys wide-spread acclaim among participating school districts, specifically because the program aligns with and enhances required NYS Social Studies Standards. The program is consistently viewed by educational leaders as an important and necessary extra-curricular opportunity for teen girls to explore and deepen their understanding of community leadership for change via the political process in a democracy, and for teen girls to know and believe that political leadership is their rightful and equal place in American society.

OPPORTUNITIES:

- As an effective and sustainable "early-term" organization, 1st A-1st V can reasonably expect to build on early success to achieve mid-term and long-term goals for expansion, deliver service to every region in NYS by 2025, and reach every region of the US by 2035.
- 2. Program components and administration are easily replicable throughout NYS as evidenced by initial program expansion from two to five regions within the first two years of program implementation. This informs successful replication from state-to-state over a 10-year period (2025-2035).
- 3. In 2019, 1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc affiliated as a program provider with Erie 1 and Erie 2 BOCES (Board of Cooperative Educational Services) in Western New York, thereby allowing school districts across NYS to cross-contract via their local BOCES organization for program fee reimbursement (when implemented by 1st A-1st V) for participation.
- 4. Cultural shift toward funding diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) initiatives positions 1st A-1st V to apply for major grants from organizations and foundations holding gender parity in public leadership/decision-making as an imperative for the 21st century.
- 5. Increased affiliation/partnerships with individuals and organizations dedicated to youth leadership development and grounded in DEI.



CHALLENGES:

- 1. Funding support for professional staff salary & benefits
- 2. Gender balance on Board of Directors
- 3. Instituting program fees to participating school districts
- 4. Expansion to one additional NYS region per year (2021-2025)

EXPECTED STRATEGIC OUTCOMES and ACTIONS

- 75% of participating school districts remain on-board for at least three consecutive years.
- 100% of participating districts pay up to half of program cost per student.
- 50% of NYS participating school districts take advantage of BOCES Coser program reimbursements.
- 80% of participants report a positive experience and recruit 1 new student for the following year.
- 90% of participating school districts report a positive planning experience with effective/efficient communication from 1st A-1st V organizers.
- 50% of students pursue a related course of study in college.
- 25% of students continue participation in a related civic engagement program in college.
- 100% of participants commit to and complete follow-up activities.
- On-going viable "pipeline" of diverse young women ready, willing and able to participate in democracy as a candidate for elected office and/or in a professional government-related career/position.
- Students engage in internships as a result of program participation.
- Effective track participants through high school, college and beyond.
- At least 10% of participants who complete the program run for office in adulthood.



FINANCES

Budget Rationale 2025 (1000 students served):

1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc is an evolving organization initially composed of committed volunteers. In its third year of operation (2021), 175 students were served and the Board began to build a sustainable organization to meet future demands of an organization serving the entire New York State. 1stA-1stV now provides its service to all 10 regions of New York State offering programming to 100 students in each of the 10 regions.

We are an organization with an annual budget of \$576,000 to serve 1000 students, at a per-student cost of \$576; 70% of our budget expense is directed to deliver student programming; 30% consists of general and administrative expenses. The \$576,000 budget for FY2025 provides for a skeleton organization to sustain and grow. But, to fulfill our national vision, we must sustain an annual projected budget beyond 2025 of as much as \$2M.

1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc has a 21-person volunteer board of directors with a lean staff consisting of CEO, Program Manager, and Office Manager/Accountant.

We charge a program fee of \$250 per student to participating school districts (10-12 students/school district) and secure grants and donations to complete our budget.

Objective: To secure sufficient assets and renewable revenue sources to allow 1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc to fund the annual action plan.

Strategy:

- 1. Hire a development consultant to secure annual grants of at least \$30K to support agency infrastructure and \$50K to execute program objectives.
- 2. Negotiate with state and federal legislators to acquire a "member item" for budget sustainability, to champion our cause with NYSED, and to establish a renewable annual consulting contract to support the mission.
- 3. Apply for grant funding outlining financial sustainability to underwrite school districts for a portion of 1st A-1st V program fees.
- 4. Maintain vendor status with NYS BOCES organizations for fee reimbursements directly to participating school districts.

RELATED MARKET RESEARCH

Rutgers University's Eagleton Institute of Politics and its Center for American Women and Politics maintains a comprehensive database of leadership programs for girls and historical sites related to women's history in the U.S. The listing includes over 200 programs with varying missions and sponsored by nonprofit organizations, such as Hope Community, American Legion Auxiliary, historical centers and sites, Girl Scouts of America, and educational institutions for elementary, middle, high school and college-aged girls. Only 17 programs are listed for high school girls with a civic-leadership focus, while almost 40 programs are centered on general leadership training for girls. The list also includes seven (7) listings for civic-leadership training that is gender-neutral. The majority of the listings consist of field trips, exhibits, and/or available documents and materials for training.

Of the 17 programs for high school girls focused on civics and the development of future public and/or political leaders, only two (2) are located in New York State: Bella Abzug Leadership Institute (9th-college) and Eleanor Roosevelt Center at Val Kill (9th-12th). The Abzug Institute serves NYC and the tri-state area with in-school and after-school programs, summer programs, and a one-day debate training program (abzuginstitute.org), and the Roosevelt Center runs a nine-day summer leadership institute for girls from the U.S. and around the world (ervk.org).

The non-profit IGNiTE National, is noted several times (different state locations) on the database; we view 1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc as a "pipeline feeder" to IGNiTE and other like-organizations focused on girls and young women, such as I KNOW POLITICS-Running Starts joint program with International IDEA, UN Development Programme, Inter-parliamentary Union, and US Entity for Gender Equality and Empowerment of Women.

Given the information available through Rutgers University's Center for American Women and Politics, it appears that 1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc is uniquely positioned to fill the civic education gap in NYS public education regarding the type of embedded civic-leadership training it provides.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHY is 1st AMENDMENT-1st VOTE for GIRLS ONLY?

Research shows at the current pace women are elected to public office in America, it will take decades to reach gender parity on the local, state and national levels. This timeline is unacceptable as females currently represent 50.8% of the US population.

For 2021, 394 males (73.6%) and 141 females (26.4%) serve the US Congress in the House of Representatives (117) and Senate (24). When gender parity in elected office is reached (50% female to 50% male), the program will open to high school boys, as well. Culturally and politically, we believe elected office is a rightful place for women at the same rate as men.

Describe the most recent student cohort (2020).

Total Students: 120

- New York State regions served: CNY, Rochester-area, Southern Tier, WNY (24 districts)
- Priority: 10th and 11th graders representing a diverse student population

How many students can participate from each high school?

• 5-8 girls per high school

What does the program cost per student (2021)?

- NO COST to school district or students
- \$410/student covered by 1st A-1st V, Inc

Starting in 2022, what is the cost to school districts for participation?

- Each school district is responsible for partial payment of program cost/student (est: up to \$250/student)
- If participating via BOCES Coser:
 - o depends on each district's reimbursement aid ratio
 - half (50%) of any cost gap incurred by a district is covered by 1st A-1st V, Inc.
- Student transportation to/from program venues
- Staff: per diem substitute for chaperone release time, if necessary

How are students recruited for program participation?

- Each high school recruits and selects students who identify as girls
- 1st A-1st V requires a diverse group of girls from each high school
- Individual students must demonstrate leadership, in some way, and demonstrate positive, personal characteristics representative of their high school

What are required program dates & components for students and chaperones?

- Program covers a calendar year (January-October)
- 45-minute in-school orientation meeting with program facilitator (Jan, Feb or March)
- Full-day instructional SEMINAR (off-site / Feb, March or April)
- FIELD TRIP to Historic Seneca Falls, Birthplace of Women's Rights in America (Sept)
- Two-day LEADERSHIP ACTION SUMMIT (venue TBD; overnight stay / October)

Does student participation require time away from school?

YES.

- One (1) full-instructional day for SEMINAR (February, March, April or May);
- One (1) full day for FIELD TRIP visit to Historic Seneca Falls (September)
- Two (2) full days for LEADERSHIP ACTION SUMMIT, includes overnight stay (October)

Does 1st A-1st V align with NYS Standards/Themes/Participation-In-Government course?

YES.

- NYS Social Studies Standards address: Foundations of American Democracy; Civil Rights and Civil Liberties; Rights, Responsibilities and Duties of Citizenship; Political and Civic Participation; and Public Policy....all are built into 1st Amendment-1st Vote's program content
- Program content is presented via the instructional SEMINAR, FIELD TRIP visit to Historic Seneca Falls, and LEADERSHIP ACTION SUMMIT where students finalize and present their school-level Action Plan for Real Change
- ACTION SUMMIT: students engage in a simulation addressing strategic campaign roles for a local elected office including the "candidate's" 3-minute stump speech focusing on a local environmental or community "hot button" issue

Are there follow-up opportunities for participants?

YES. Opportunities may vary from year-to-year, such as:

- Serve on 1st Amendment-1st Vote, Inc Board of Directors as student member
- Serve a volunteer internship at Women's Rights National Historical Park, Erie County Commission on the Status of Women, or other related affiliation
- Recruit one classmate for the following year's program; and/or serve as a program presenter at her school
- Volunteer in her community on a presidential, Congressional or local candidate's campaign for elected office
- Represent 1st A-1st V as a PROGRAM AMBASSADOR at educational conferences, public events, video tapings, interviews, webinars, etc
- Cite program participation on college and work applications
