



WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING AS A JUNIOR?

You're likely starting to feel the pressure of the college prep. journey.

Your first SAT attempt is in March, so you should be studying a minimum of six to eight hours a week if you're serious about earning a significant score increase from your PSATs. Working with tutors is optimal.

Be sure that you learn about the psychology of the SAT/ACT and tips on how to navigate it when you need to make quick decisions.

Whether you're taking an SAT/ACT prep. course, are working with tutors, or are part of a study group, your commitment needs to go beyond what you are doing under someone else's guidance and include hours of personal study time. Consider it. . . (cont. to the right)

WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING AS A JUNIOR (CONT.)

. . . training for your more independent college learning process.

You also should have visited your Guidance/College Prep. Office, met with a counselor to see what resources your school offers, and understand what system (e.g., Naviance) they use for submitting letters of reference, transcripts, etc. to schools where you will apply.

As you are using these resources and spending time exploring school websites, March is the ideal time to begin touring college campuses. March through early May campus tours let you see the school in action, acquire a feel for the students and holistic environment, hear about the school from current students (although the student tour guides *are* working off of a script provided by the school), and enjoy fully landscaped campuses in optimal weather.

Keep in mind that most students vacate the campus for the summer a week or two into May, so your next opportunity to see the school this way is late August/September when you want to be finalizing your list.

Reflection: If you don't yet know what you'd like to study, it's fine. Create a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choice list, and then look for schools that offer all of them. Ensure they have a strong Liberal Arts program.



Reflection for Seniors:

As or after you receive your acceptance letters, (re)visit your top choices. Take 15-20 minutes to separate from your tour guide, family, other students, etc. Find a spot on the quad where you can observe the campus in motion. Ask yourself if you feel comfortable and if you can envision spending four years of your life here. Let that feeling help guide your final decisions if it's strong.

WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING AS A SOPHOMORE?

Sophomores starting their college prep. journey are in a great place to position themselves well by doing a diagnostic meeting to identify their strengths and weaknesses and setting up a multi-year game plan to create a well-rounded application.

Two of the biggest myths are that you need to know what you're going to study and should have a clear idea of where you want to do it as a sophomore or junior.

College prep. guidance should help you start identifying what appeals to you and ruling out what doesn't. The vast majority of students will change their intended major once they are in school, so let's begin by helping you decide what feels right. With over two years to navigate this process, start early but take your time.

Our diagnostic session, which includes a survey that helps students consider what they do/don't want and what appeals to them, along with a Roadmap to College, can help. We will update annually the Roadmap, typically complimentary or for a minimal fee, for our ongoing clients as you move through the college prep. process.

Reflection: Which activities you're doing this year are less important than that you are involved in one that's long term, another that's something new, and a third that shows you giving back to the community. 3

WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING AS A SENIOR?

If you're in a strong position then your applications went out in Oct. to Nov. and you're celebrating the arrival of your acceptance letters.

Many private universities began offering spots earlier than usual this year for regular admissions students in the hopes of securing an early commitment.

If you're in this lucky group, then you should be spending March and April:

- (Re-)visiting the campuses in question to see if they simply feel right,
- Meeting with a financial aid counselor to be sure that you understand free aid vs. money you will need to earn/repay and conditions of financial aid, and
- Carefully studying the websites of each school and making a pros and cons list.

Ivy League schools announce their Non-Early Admittance Decisions all at once on a chosen day in late March to April, 2022 date TBD, so some of you are still waiting.

Once you decide which school is best for you, immediately contact that school to accept the spot and make your deposit. If you want to live in residential housing, be sure to complete and submit your application within the next 48 hours as residential housing is not guaranteed at many schools.

PS It's good form to notify other schools that offered you admission that you're going elsewhere so they can open that seat to someone on a waiting list.

HOW OUR SAT/ACT PREP. WORKS

We don't believe in a one-size-fits-all approach to standardized exam preparation. Subsequently, we don't waste your time teaching your student content they mastered. Instead, we focus on helping them understand the psychology behind the exam, how to navigate it including at critical turning points, and developing the skills most likely to significantly increase their score.

We develop a personalized curriculum based upon a review of the student's transcript, detailed PSAT and potentially SAT/ACT scores, and a sample SAT/ACT they complete for us. Their answers are evaluated by their tutor, who is a certified Secondary Ed. teacher in the relevant subject and/or a professor with years of college teaching experience.

Costs are by session, except for an hour of prep. time for each content tutor, and can be purchased in a discounted package.

Families choose the number of sessions the student needs, but be sure to leave students sufficient time to learn, practice, and master outside of the sessions the content we introduce in them. Students who are willing to invest substantial personal study time in addition to meeting with our tutors inevitably score higher than those whose only preparation comes from the tutoring sessions.

We recommend parents show us how the student previously scored, discuss the expectations of the schools where the student wants to apply, set a goal, and then consider how many hours of tutoring and independent study time the student is likely to need to achieve their goals.

This conversation should also include whether the student will benefit more from taking the SAT, the ACT, both exams, or none of them in the context of their application and potential schools.

Our goal is to help our students feel confident about the specific exams and the content on them as they navigate this milestone in the college prep. process.
