# **Test Structure**

- Multiple-Choice Questions (40%) Grammar, sentence structure, and writing conventions.
- Essay (60%) One written response (either argumentative or expository).
- I. Multiple-Choice Section (Key Topics)

1. Grammar & Usage

- Subject-Verb Agreement
  - Singular subjects take singular verbs; plural subjects take plural verbs.
  - *Example:* "The **team is** ready" (correct) vs. "The **team are** ready" (incorrect).
- Pronoun-Antecedent Agreement
  - Pronouns must match their antecedents in number and gender.
  - Example: "Every student must bring his or her book" (not "their").

# • Verb Tense Consistency

- Maintain the same tense unless indicating a time shift.
- Example: "She walks to school and opens her locker."

# • Modifiers & Parallel Structure

- Misplaced/Dangling Modifiers:
  - Incorrect: "Running down the street, the tree scared me."
  - Correct: "Running down the street, I was scared by the tree."
- Parallelism:
  - Incorrect: "She likes hiking, swimming, and to ride bikes."
  - Correct: "She likes hiking, swimming, and riding bikes."

## 2. Sentence Structure & Syntax

# • Run-on Sentences & Fragments

- *Run-on:* "I love reading it is fun."  $\rightarrow$  Fix with a period or conjunction.
- Fragment: "Because I was tired."  $\rightarrow$  Needs an independent clause.
- Comma Usage
  - Use after introductory phrases: "After the game, we celebrated."
  - Use in lists: "I bought apples, oranges, and bananas."
  - $\circ$  Do **not** use between two independent clauses without a conjunction (comma splice).
- Apostrophes & Possessives
  - Singular possessive: "The **student's** book."
  - Plural possessive: "The **students'** books."

## 3. Word Choice & Clarity

- Commonly Confused Words
  - Their/There/They're, Your/You're, Its/It's, Affect/Effect
- Redundancy & Wordiness
  - Wordy: "Due to the fact that" → Better: "Because"

## **II. Essay Section**

# Types of Essays

- 1. Argumentative Essay
  - **Task:** Take a position on an issue and support it with evidence.
  - Structure:
    - Introduction (hook, thesis statement)
    - Body Paragraphs (reasons + evidence)
    - Counterargument & Rebuttal (optional but strengthens the essay)
    - Conclusion (restate thesis, final thought)
- 2. Expository Essay

- Task: Explain or inform (no opinion needed).
- Structure:
  - Introduction (topic overview)
  - Body Paragraphs (facts, examples, clear explanations)
  - Conclusion (summary)

Essay Grading Criteria (Scored 0-6 by two raters; total 12)

- Focus & Organization (clear thesis, logical flow)
- Support & Development (evidence, examples)
- Grammar & Mechanics (proper sentence structure, spelling)
