[05:58] Jesus was born in the town of Bethlehem, in Judea, during the reign of King Herod.

And at the same time there came wise men from the East to Jerusalem asking, "Where is the newborn King of the Jews. We have seen the star that arose, and we have come to worship him."

Herod was deeply disturbed by the question, as was all Jerusalem. He called a meeting of the leading priests and teachers of religious law.

"Where did the prophet say the Messiah will be born?" he asked.

"In Bethlehem," they said, "For this is what the prophet wrote: 'Oh Bethlehem of Judea, you are not just a lowly village of Judah, for a ruler will come to you who will be the shepherd for my people Israel.'"

This prophecy is found in Micah 5, in verse 2, and II Samuel, chapter 5, verse 2. Both were written 700 years before Jesus was born.
