This is a story about a girl named Mary.	A long time ago a girl named Mary lived in Nazareth in Northern Israel, near the Sea of Galilee. We do not know a lot about Mary's childhood, but we do know that she was Jewish, and that Jews were under Roman rule at that time. The Romans had occupied their land. At that time, the ruler was King Herod.  Mary was probably about 14-years-old. She was unmarried and a virgin. This is important to know because of what I am about to tell you in just a moment. Mary was also engaged to be married to a man named Joseph. Joseph was also Jewish, and his family came from the lineage of King David. Several centuries before this story takes place, King David ruled as a beloved king of the Jewish people. Several prophecies were made that a king would come from the ancestral line of David and that new king would be bring a reign of justice and peace. For the Jewish people who were under occupation and Roman rule, this was a hope to which they clung.

Mary must have felt overwhelmed, terrified, and in awe. Then Mary said something humble, powerful and beautiful, all at the same time. Mary said, "Yes."


Mary said, "I am a servant of God."

on those who are in awe before him.


The starving poor will sit down to a banquet; but

Another gift from this story is that God tells us "Do not be afraid." When God is with us, we also know that God is whispering to us, "No matter what, do not be afraid. I am with you."

This is the story that changes everything about everything. Since Jesus was born, we know that the kingdom of God will reign in the end of time. Love, peace, and justice will come to earth. Jesus started that kingdom all those years ago. We now wait in expectancy for the kingdom of God to be fully revealed.

The gift of Christmas is that God loves you so much that He sent His son to rescue you and bring you into the kingdom of heaven and God will set all things right. God will bring justice and peace. But that here and now, today--God is with you.



Over these days of Christmas, if you are willing, ask God to open your eyes to His presence in your life. My prayer for you and your family is that you will know that you are not alone, and that God is with you. I also pray that you experience the deep love of Jesus this Christmas.

Look for the Christmas star. Not necessarily a star in the sky. What I mean is—look for signs that God is with you.
