The Purpose of the Title VI Program to ensure that American Indian, Native Hawaiian and Alaska Native students meet challenging state academic content and student academic achievement standards, as well as meet the unique culturally related needs.

What is offered to our students?



Community Liaison – The Role of the liaison is to work with families, teachers, administrators, and community programs to provide resources available that will help student achievement and advancement. Tutors are available to help students as young as Pre-Kinder through 12th Grade Advanced Math and Science. The liaison also works with Registrars, Counselors and Teachers to recruit families that are not aware of the Program, or that need help turning in the 506 Form.



Drop Out Prevention/Intervention – Depending on the need of the student, the Liaison works with school administrators, students, and their families to provide the necessary tools to keep the students in the classroom. This may include providing the student/s with access to other available transportation information, Social Workers, Counselors and other support.



Parent/Student Advocacy – Attend IEP meetings, speak to teachers and counselors on needs a student may have. Attend district and state meetings to receive updates and collaborate with other districts throughout the state.



Academic Support Assistance – Tutors are provided based on request. Payment for fees to use the school's electronics that is required for class. Fees to attend SAT and ACT prep classes are also covered.



Cultural Engagement – The Liaison works with the American Indian Parent Committee (AIPC) to plan cultural events and to make sure all students and families are invited.
