Clause = a group of words containing a subject and a verb

Two types of clauses:

Independent = a complete sentence

Dependent = not complete; can't stand alone

These AAAWWUBBIS words introduce dependent clauses.

AAAWWUBBIS

A...after

A....although

A....as

W...while

W...when

U....until

B....before

B....because

I.....if

S....since

These FANBOYS words or a semi-colon join two independent clauses.

FANBOYS

For

And

Nor

But

Or

Yet

So

;

COMMA RULES

IC = Independent clause DC = dependent clause

DC, IC.

(After I ate dinner, I watched TV.)

IC+DC = no comma

(I watched TV after I ate dinner.)

IC, and IC.

(I ate dinner, and I watched TV.)

Suggestions:

- 1) Use BE verbs sparingly: is, are, am, was, were
- 2) SHOW don't TELL. That means use details not generalities
- 3) Let the readers of your essays know who you are. Write with feeling, not just facts, and reveal who you are. Show a real person, not just a list of facts.
- 4) Address the question exactly. Don't just give information about the subject.
 - The question asked, "Have you <u>become aware</u> of <u>significant</u> needs . . ." You must SHOW your coming to awareness and how you learned of significant needs.
- 5) Don't think about the readers of these essays and try to impress them. Let them see what a thoughtful, feeling, aware human being you are. They want to KNOW you.
- 6) Be careful of beginning too many sentences with "I". Find more interesting ways to begin your sentences.
- 7) Believe in yourself and that you have so many great traits to offer BYU. Show them.

SUGGESTIONS:

- 1) Begin the essay with a strong first sentence that uses a strong verb.
- 2) Use **DETAILS** about your family: how many kids, how old and where you are in the line up.
- 3) Kill empty words.
- 5) Focus on these words in the essay question:
- "Have <u>YOU</u> BECOME AWARE of SIGNIFICANT NEEDS" and "Explain HOW YOU have WORKED TOWARD meeting these needs."
- 6) Vary your sentence structure so it doesn't become too simple and predictable.
- 7) Show your heart and feelings, not just facts. Remember the committee wants to **KNOW** you, how you think, observe, prove the question. Show your heart, not just your cleverness in writing.
