## **Board Updates**

#### Life Membership

When our Constitution and Bylaws were updated, one of the newest additions was the Life Membership. Life Members are members of the Quander Family who have served on the Board of Directors or committees, participated in family events and gatherings regularly, and have reached the age of 70 years. Read CONSTITUTION ARTICLE III, Section 4 to learn more about Life Membership.

Life Membership had been paused until the Board agreed on a process, which has since passed. Interested, eligible members must submit a request. You can submit a request via email or snail mail between June 1 and September 1 each year. Example: It's 2024. You must apply (if you fit the criteria) between June 1, 2024, and September 1, 2024. If accepted, the member would start their Life Membership on February 1, 2025. If one's Life Membership application is not accepted, they may reapply during the submission period the following year. Example: If you apply in 2024 for a 2025 Life Membership, you will not be able to reapply until June 1, 2025.

#### **Application Requirements**

Submit a formal request via email, online form, or snail mail. Members may also nominate other members for Life Membership via the same methods. Items to be included in the formal request: full name, birthdate, contact information for the candidate, and a list of their contributions to Quanders United. This information will be an important part of the review by the Board of Directors. If the applicant has documented proof of the items listed in their request, they are welcome to send them via attachment to their email or USPS to Quanders United.



## A Brief History of Quander Place (Street/Alley), c. 1890 A Southeast Washington, D.C. Historic Site (The first Quander Street location) Submitted by Rohulamin Quander



The sustained presence and historical contributions of the Quander family have been collectively and individually recognized on local, national, and international levels. Presently, there are four streets named "Quander," namely, Quander Street in Washington, D.C. (c. 1890); Quander Road in Fairfax County (c. 1926); Quander Court in Prince William County (2011), both in Virginia; and Quander Promise Lane (c. 2005) in Prince George's County, Maryland.

From about 1890, until 1942, Julia Quander, a grocer and laundress, lived at 109 Quander Place, along with Frank and Harry Quander and other family members The site occupied a portion of Square 743, Lot 23, bounded on the north by M Street, on the south by N Street, on the west by

First Street, and on the east by New Jersey Avenue. It was located in the historic district that is immediately adjacent to the old Washington Navy Yard.

Variously referred to in the records as "Street," "Place," and "Alley," the original site of Quander Street is historically significant for several reasons. First, there is a likelihood that a portion of Square 743 served as a Nacochtanke Native American village.

Second, at its southeast corner, Square 743 bordered on the famous Washington Canal, erected between 1809 and 1815, by Thomas Law (the Law House) and Daniel Carroll, the first commissioner for the newly created District of Columbia and owner of Carrollsburg Square, and others.

Third, it is on this site of the August 1814 Battle of Washington, during the latter part of the War of 1812, where British naval vessels penetrated American defenses and sailed into the Eastern Branch (the Anacostia River), just south of where Quander Place was later located. Afterward, British troops took up temporary residence, including on the later-to-be-named Quander site.

## History "Quanders Sold South" Submitted by Shakhan King

We have identified 8 Quander ancestors who were "Sold South" from Alexandria to New Orleans between 1829 and 1845.

Ancestor Lawrence Quander would obtain his freedom by 1850. In December 1864, Lawrence was acknowledged by President Abraham Lincoln for his Emancipation efforts in New Orleans. Attached are 2 Lawrence Quander newspaper articles.

### African American Advisory Council Established Submitted by Rohulamin Quander

On July 4, 2026, our nation will observe its 250th anniversary, a semi-quincentennial. In 2020, the Virginia General Assembly created <u>The Virginia</u> American Revolution 250 Commission (VA250) and charged it with the responsibility of planning and executing a Virginia statewide commemoration of the creation of the state that will be both meaningful and significant to all Virginians. Recognizing that the Colony of Virginia, later one of the major original states from the nation's founding in 1776, among the stated purposes for the creation of the Commission is for the state to become integral in this national milestone and opportunity to come together as a more unified United States of America. in reflection and dedication to the ongoing work to form a more perfect union.

To assist VA250 in focusing on the African American role and input into Virginia history, an African American Advisory Council has been established. Among the appointed Advisory Council members is Rohulamin Quander who, although not a resident of the State of Virginia, is noted for his work in documenting the extensive and unique history of the Quander Family in the Greater Washington, DC area. The family's historical sustained presence lends credibility and value to the stated purpose for creating the Council. Commitment to planning and executing a commemoration that offers multiple perspectives and acknowledgment of Virginia's history is a complex undertaking.

The Honorable Mamie E. Locke, Senate of Virginia, District 2, has taken the lead to

### A Brief History of Quander Place (Street/Alley), c. 1890 A Southeast Washington, D.C. Historic Site (Continued)

In April 1942, Square 743 was acquired by the U.S. Navy to expand the Washington Navy Yard during the World War II effort. Quander Place and Van Street were abolished without fanfare or any consideration for retaining the Quander name at a nearby location. All of the buildings were razed to make space to construct the initial Building 213, the National Cartographic Center, which was completed on the site in 1944, which building was subsequently torn down, in part for Metro construction and likewise for new development.

The archaeological excavation of the site in the 1980s revealed the types of foods that the Quander Place residents ate, as distinguished from their more affluent white neighbors on the facing streets, and, when compared with other excavation results from in and about the facing streets, demonstrated differences in eating habits between the races.

In the historic value Eligibility Report, written at the time of the excavation, it was stated: The archaeological resources at the Quander Alley site are significant primarily because they can provide information about the quality of life that existed in an urban alley environment in the District of Columbia during the later 19th and early 20th centuries. Historical information indicates that the deposits on the site are reflective of black, working-class households.

Helen Douglas Hawkins (b. 1918) and Betty Douglas Anderson (b. 1920), sisters, and former residents of 158 and 133 Quander Place were interviewed by Rohulamin Quander concerning the history of Quander Place. They provided details of their family life on Quander Place between 1932 and 1942, including the physical appearance of the houses in the block; the lack of indoor plumbing, central heating, or electricity the entire time they resided in their two houses; unpaved streets and sidewalks; economic, education, and employment status of the residents; religious and community life; low crime; mostly white owners and all black residents. They recalled Julia Quander, who resided in the only brick house in the block, collecting the rent for several of the white owners, and the sense of family shared among all of the residents of the block.

convene and chair the VA250 African American Advisory Council, comprised of a select group of thought leaders and advisors to serve with her and work to capture their vast knowledge and produce a commemoration that resonates throughout the Commonwealth and in which all Virginians will find a place.

The first meeting of the Advisory Council convened on January 5, 2024, in the General Assembly Building, Richmond, Virginia, to initiate planning many large-scale events and exhibitions over the next three years and beyond. The issues discussed and included were: 1) What lessons can we learn from previous commemorations?;

2) How do we make the celebration meaningful to all Virginians?; 3) What would we like to see occur during the commemoration to highlight African American history and culture as an integral component of Virginia history at every stage of the state's existence?; and 4) What under-told and likewise under-known stories of African American history should be highlighted state-wide?

As an appointed member of the Advisory Council, Cousin Rohulamin solicits inquiries and input from Quander Family members, so that he can present it to the Council for consideration and possible inclusion in the forthcoming celebration
