In August 2018 at the Annual Quander Family reunion in Alexandria, Virginia, a very important decision was voted on. It is understood that this is a big undertaking and a break from the norm of the last many years, but we recognize that we are stronger together and want to move forward in history as ONE.

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
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Honoring an Outstanding Family Member – Rohulamin Quander, Educator, Genealogist, Lawyer, Judge

I was born in Washington, D.C. on October 8, 1924, one of three siblings, to John Edward and Helen Orena Stewart Quander. My youth was pleasant and included memories shared with many Quander cousins, friends and neighbors who also attended St. Cyprian's Catholic Church, then located on 13th and South Carolina Avenue, S.E. Despite segregation, and the racially charged atmosphere of the time, life was good. As a young child, I was insulated from the hurts and stings that happened daily to my grandparents and parents. My summers were spent in Upper Marlboro, Maryland where I passed many pleasant moments in the loving and comfortable arms of my grandparents, William Dominic and Mary Greenfield Quander. As I grew older, I began to realize that being a Quander meant, no one referred to our family's historic past, and we had not received any particular honor or recognition as a family.

No one made reference to an ancestral connection to George Washington, to the fact that we had many cousins who lived on the other side of the Potomac River, or on the other side of the Atlantic for that matter, in Africa. Perhaps they did not know, because our forbearers did not preserve the legacy connections of which there were many; or perhaps the legacy of enslavement was so painful that they chose to intentionally "forget." In addition, I grew up during the dramatic economic crisis called the Great Depression, a time when my elders were focused on day-to-day survival, and not on the "luxury" of researching and knowing our history and genealogy.



Luckily for us, someone in the family was committed to that cause and worked hard to make it happen. My decision to write this article is because that person, Cousin Rohulamin Quander, deserves proper recognition for his consistent sustained efforts that have unlocked our history and genealogy, and established what it means To Be a Quander. This accolade is long overdue. His efforts have enabled us to document our rightful place in American history, including being featured three times in Smithsonian museums and programs, as well as in other local, national, and international exhibits and news media presentations. Because of his historical retracing and outreach, the significance of the Quander name has been firmly established. Remember how alorious the Quander Tricentennial Celebration was in June 1984.

While we all worked together to make it happen and that success resulted from the efforts of more than one person, it was Rohulamin's research, and his efforts to publicize what he

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found, that laid the groundwork on which our 300-year celebration was built, as well as much of the recognition we have received since.

Ro said recently that his interest in our family history and genealogy began in the late 1960's when he was a student at the Howard University Law School. He said, "Interacting with West African students at Howard, I realized that there was much about our family's history that I didn't know. That's when I decided to find out what I could. I never expected that there was so much to be learned. Just look at us now!"

That desire to learn more about our family was also shared by James W. Quander, Rohulamin's dad. James often stated that he too always wanted to know our history. He confided to me, "I know that there is a lot more to who we are and where we came from."

As a law student Cousin Rohulamin mastered the art of research and public presentation of findings, and put that to good use uncovering the story of our family. Single-handedly, he made the research of Quander family history a personal journey. For 50 years, through the Quander Historical and Educational Society, Inc., he has researched, documented, preserved, shared, and stored our history, and family documents, which are held by the Moorland-Spingarn Collection at Howard University. What he has uncovered belongs to all of us, creating a shared family legacy – a legacy that we can all be proud of.

I was impressed that much of what was found does not necessarily make us great or famous, as many of his discoveries establish that as ordinary citizens, we demanded our rights and just due, despite our race, as guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. The uncovering and revelation of our strengths, accomplishments, and the spirit and determination exhibited by our ancestors is what makes us who we are today. In fact, it is the knowing who we are and where we came from that makes us special, as so many families of African descent cannot trace their lineage, and know very little of their past.

Ro's efforts have raised our visibility to the point where other families look to us as role models. To some, the Quanders are the standard by which others measure themselves. For instance, the Quander family name is emblazoned on signs for Quander Road in Alexandria, Virginia; Quander Street in Prince William County, Virginia; Quander's Promise Lane in Bowie, Maryland; and the restoration of Quander Street in Southeast Washington, D.C. Where else in a major metropolitan area will you find four streets named for one African American family?

I am so grateful to our cousin, Rohulamin Quander, for these many accomplishments and for working tirelessly in countless ways to distinguish the family name. We have so much to thank him for, which is why I want the family to give Ro the recognition that he deserves for all the time and work he and his family have so generously donated to our benefit. Ro says he could not have done all he's done to uplift the family name without the support and teamwork of his wife, Carmen Torruella Quander, who designed our Quander coat of arms, and created sketches depicting our early history. She also accompanied Ro to Ghana, West Africa to conduct research and meet family members.

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Were it not for Cousin Rohulamin and his family, the knowledge and appreciation of what it means TO BE A QUANDER would most probably still be unknown and lost. Quander family members, let us consider how we can express our gratitude, to honor and thank them, to whom we owe so much.
