What Is a Good Translation?

When you go into a bookstore looking for a Bible, you will likely find numerous translations on the shelf. Which one should I choose? Which translation is the right one? Unless you can read ancient Hebrew, Aramaic, and koine Greek, you must depend on translations to read biblical texts, but translation is a tricky business. There is no perfect translation. Furthermore, all translation involves interpretation on some level or other; and no translation can claim to be authoritative for all time, since our own language is always changing.

The translation many people know the best, commonly known as the King James Version, was commissioned by King James of England in 1604. Though other translations preceded it, this Bible translation project drew on the finest scholarship of the time, reflecting new developments in knowledge about biblical languages and culture. It was completed in 1611. It soon became the Bible for English-speaking Protestants. And it continues, centuries after its introduction, to have unparalleled authority.

By the end of the 19th century, the original KJV's English had become quite archaic, and biblical scholarship had undergone a revolution of its own. Since that time, various translations have been produced, reflecting modern conventions of English and discoveries of older manuscripts, including the Dead Sea Scrolls found hidden in caves in Qumran in 1947 (dating from the 3rd

century BC to the 1st century AD). Meanwhile, biblical scholarship continued to blossom.

The KJV informed several revisions, including the Revised Standard Version (RSV), which was completed in 1957, and was the Bible I received in my sixth grade Sunday school class. Since that time other translations have been produced, such as the New American Standard Bible (NASB), which is much more literal and theologically conservative than in the RSV. Translations have exploded over the last three decades, including the New Revised Standard Version in 1990. The NRSV has been updated recently, and is referred to as the NRSV Updated Edition (NRSVue).

In the more than thirty years since the first publication of the NRSV, hundreds of ancient manuscripts have been studied in exacting detail. The NRSVue is informed by the results of this research. Laboring through this material has deepened scholarly insight into Jewish and Christian sacred texts and advanced understanding of ancient languages. With new textual evidence, historical insights, and language understandings (which include exploring the meanings of ancient texts in light of the cultures that produced them), the NRSVue brings greater precision in interpreting Scripture today.

A member of our congregation here at Glovier Church has generously offered to donate copies of this new translation for use in our worship services. We plan to place these Bibles in the pews in August, with the goal of having a "Blessing of the Bibles" during our 76th

Anniversary Worship Service on August 17th. We are deeply grateful for this gift and God's wisdom we will receive through the reading and understanding of God's holy word.

Though there is no perfect translation, I believe the NRSVue is a good translation for Christians in our time and will be a valuable tool in further helping us to discern God's will as the people of God in the 21st century.

We must always remember that Christian faith is not in the book but in the God we learn to know in it. It is God, not the Bible, who rules and judges, helps and saves, in whom we trust. I am reminded of the words of my favorite teacher of preachers Dr. Fred Craddock: "It's possible to get an 'A' in Bible and still flunk Christianity."

Making Sense of Revelation: Its Controversies and Meaning

The book of Revelation, this most wonderful and puzzling of biblical books, has inspired great works of art and music, and has also fed social upheaval and speculation about the coming end of the world. I have been studying this last book of the Bible since I first led a Bible Study, while a student pastor at Arcola-Ryan UMC in 1978, using The Vision of Patmos, a United Methodist Women mission study. It has fascinated me ever since.

In this study, I propose to explore an overview of the book of Revelation as both prophecy and a pastoral letter - the context in which the book was composed. Along the way we will look at the images that have fascinated and bewildered Christians. We will ask what such images as the four horsemen, the red dragon, and the sevenheaded beast might mean. As we follow the plot, with its vivid sense of struggle among God and evil and outcome in a world made new, I believe we can see more clearly that this book offers a compelling vision of hope. We will also look at topics that include disputes about the antichrist idea and whether time would culminate in a 1,000 year period of peace on earth. We will ask why some religious groups have used Revelation to set the dates for the end of the world, while others have seen the book as a call for a better society. This study begins on Wednesday, September 3rd, from 6 to 7 pm in the JOY classroom. You are welcome to join us In-Person or on Zoom.

Just a reminder: The United Methodist Men and the United Women of Faith will not meet during the month of August.


CASA de Amistad needs your help!
