Employees who learn a trade from experienced staff

Paid and paid holidays

Gain a recognised qualification

Who Can Apply?

Anyone over 16

But can't be in full time education

Doesn't matter if you have been registered unemployed or had a different career

Types Of Apprenticeships



x

Training

Carried out on the job

By experienced staff

Minimum 30 hours per week

Remainder of time spent at a local college working toward a work based qualification

x

- Explain what type of training will be given
- Work based training will be carried out on the job by experienced staff.
- This will be topped up by time at a local college which will go towards a transferrable qualification.
- This might be on day release or night school.
- At least 30 hours per week will be spent training
- You might be expected to do more in your own time.



Benefits

Pay - £4.15 per hour minimum if under 19 or in first year otherwise minimum wage

Paid holidays

Qualification at the end

x

Explain first year apprentice gets just £4.15 an hour

At least minimum wage after this
Although holidays are paid it might only be 2 weeks a year.

No guarantee of a job at the end although usually one is offered.



Different Levels

Intermediate (5 good GCSE passes equivalent) -
Level 2 qualification and functional skills

Advanced (2 A level passes equivalent) -
Level 3 qualification and functional skills

Higher (NVQ4 or foundation degree) -
Level 4, 5 qualification and functional skills

Degree (M.A. or B.A.) -
Level 6, 7 qualification and functional skills

Qualifications are transferable

•Show that there are different level apprenticeships all of which have different equivalents.

•Explain functional skills means English and Maths.

•Explain that any qualifications are transferrable and may 'short cut' a higher level qualification.



Different Times





393,000 apprenticeship starts in 2018/19
561,000 applied for university in 2018/19

- Get a view on whether students think there are more apprenticeships now than there were 5 years ago
- Most will say yes
- Truth is there are less apprenticeships but more higher level apprenticeships
- More people apply for university still although the proportion is changing
