The time away from our daily work here allowed for wonderful visits with partner congregations, quality time with family and friends, and needed rest. Your prayers sustained us throughout these travels and lifted up those who carried on the work in Japan. For this we are grateful.

Our goal is to visit partner congregations in America every two to three years. We seek to offer gratitude for prayers and financial gifts and also share about how God is at work in Japan. Though social media helps to ease the divide, this gap in our physical presence leaves us with snapshots in our minds of people and places from our most recent meetings. Yet, as we all know, life moves on and, for us, the memories we hold are not the realities we witness upon our return.

On the bright side of things, there is the excitement of newness when we return. Family introduce us to babies, friends share about developments in their careers and family lives, foodies take us out to try the next culinary delight, and congregations enthusiastically tell us about ways they are engaging their communities in discipleship and mission service.

However, there are also struggles and losses that occur in our time away. Aging loved ones leave us with questions about our roles in supporting them from afar in the years ahead, health issues restrict the abilities of people who have poured their lives into us and the work they have been called to, and there are more empty pews in many churches than the last time we visited.

When we step into these snapshots, reality looks different than the picture we hold in our memories. However, after the challenges of gathering during the pandemic, we give thanks that we get to experience these moments at all. A proverb associated with Japanese tea ceremony is "ichigo ichie" meaning "one time, one meeting" or "for this time only". It calls us to live with intention and treasure each moment because the current moment can never be replicated in exactly the same way. These moments that we get with loved ones will never look the same. They are once in a lifetime.

It is our prayer that we all live with anticipation of the holy encounters that the Lord provides as we walk together as fellow pilgrims on the journey of faith.


