The Tradition of Ashes and Oil

The tradition of wearing ashes may be traced through many parts of the Bible. The Scriptures describe ashes, often accompanied by wearing sackcloth or fasting, as an outward display of grief, penitence, or remorse. For a few examples take note of Mordecai in Esther 3:12-4:2, Job in Job 42:1-6, and Tamar in 2 Samuel 13:11-19. Furthermore, many of the Prophets adjure listeners to act out their remorse for sin by wearing ashes and fasting. When Jonah preaches repentance to the people of Nineveh, Jonah 3:6 describes the grieved king wearing sackcloth and ashes to display his sorrow for the sins of his people. In the New Testament, the Gospels present ashes as a well-known and accepted symbol of repentance in Jesus' culture. In Luke 10:13-16 and Matthew 11:20-24. Jesus uses the phrase "sackcloth and ashes" to illuminate the depth of penitence about which he teaches.

During this worship service, you will be invited to receive on your forehead or hand the sign of the cross, made from the ashes of our sins that have burned away by God's costly, forgiving grace. The ashes are an ancient symbol of our human frailty and our mortality that contrast God's greatness and power: "I have taken upon me to speak unto the Lord, which am but dust and ashes" (Gen. 18:27, KJV). But the ashes tonight are mixed with oil, which is a Biblical symbol of healing and divine calling. Oil was poured on wounds to heal them and onto the heads of people God was calling into lives of service. The mixing of oil and ashes is a reminder that God often goes to work most powerfully in those places where we need healing, forgiveness and release. Even as a people wounded by our sins and the sins of others, we are anointed to minister and serve by God's grace working in our lives.





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
