We welcome chapters that are narrative, reflexive, and contextually grounded. Contributors are encouraged to include pedagogical or methodological examples where relevant (e.g. classroom activities, ethical reflections, community tools, frameworks in use).

Please submit a 100–150-word abstract that articulates the central theme of your chapter and its application of decolonial methods in practice by **July 2, 2025**. We will notify you by **July 16, 2025**, regarding the inclusion of your abstract in the book proposal. Routledge has invited us to submit a proposal on this topic, and selected abstracts will form part of the submission package. If the proposal is approved, contributors will be asked to develop full chapters (5,000–7,000 words) within 3–6 months. We hope you will consider contributing to this collective effort to transform how decolonial research is taught and practiced.
