Exhibitors are reminded to read the guide carefully and measure and count their entries when required. Any buds showing colour shall be counted as a bloom.
4. Exhibitors are requested to put the cultivar's name on the entry tag wherever possible
5. Design Division entries may include materials not grown by the exhibitor. Artificial plant material is not allowed. All other exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor. The exhibitor must have grown potted plants for a minimum of three months.
6. To classify hostas, measure the leaves only, from base to tip.
7. The committee reserves the right to stage and reclassify any entry before judging. Classes may be subdivided when necessary. Judges have the right to withhold prizes to any unworthy exhibits and their decisions will be final.
8. Prize money will be awarded at the show. Special awards will be announced at 1:45 pm.
9. No entry may be removed before 2:00 pm on Saturday, June 8, 2024 The committee will not be held responsible for exhibits left after 3:00 pm.

## DIVISION I

## All varieties should be named if known.

Containers will be supplied for all classes; with exception of: 20,22 \& 36 .

## SECTION A - Cut Flowers

1. Azalea, one spray.
2. Annual, Biennial, Perennial, three stems, e.g. Calendula.
3. Clematis, three stems, flowers less than 10 cm (4") diameter.
4. Clematis, three stems, flowers more than 10 cm (4") diameter.
5. Columbine, three stems.
6. Delphinium, one spike, lateral shoots removed.
7. Foxglove, one stem, lateral shoots removed.
8. Geranium (Cranesbill), three stems.
9. Iris, bearded, one stalk.
10. Iris, beardless, one stalk e.g., Siberian, Japanese.
11. Peony, one bloom.
12. Poppies, three blooms.
13. Any other perennial or biennial, three stems, grown from a bulbous root e.g., Lilies.
14. Any other perennial or biennial, three stems, grown from a fibrous root, e.g., Penstemon.
15. Rose, hybrid tea, one specimen bloom
16. Rose, floribunda or grandiflora, one spray.
17. Rose, old garden rose. Varieties in existence prior to 1867. One specimen bloom or one spray.
18. Rose, modern shrub. Varieties introduced into the Western World in 1867 or after. One specimen bloom or one spray. David Austin roses excluded.
19. Rose, David Austin - named, one specimen bloom or one spray.
20. Rose, selected for fragrance, one specimen bloom floating in the exhibitor's own snifter glass.
21. Rose Collection, minimum of three different varieties in one container.
22. Rose Bowl, one fully open rose displayed floating in the exhibitor's own rose bowl.
23. Rhododendron, one spray.
24. Sweet Pea, minimum of three stems, any colour.
25. Vine, flowering other than clematis, three stems of one variety.
26. Flowering branch, one branch, any tree or shrub not listed above not to exceed 75 cm (30") in length.
27. Fern, native. Three stems, one variety. 28. Fern, non-native. Three stems, one variety
28. Heuchera, three leaves, one variety.
29. Hosta, three leaves, one variety, single colour. Less than $15 \mathrm{~cm}(6 ")$. Measured from leaf tip to leaf base.
30. Hosta, three leaves, one variety, variegated. Less than $15 \mathrm{~cm}(6 ")$. Measured from leaf tip to leaf base.
31. Hosta, three leaves, one variety, single colour. 15 cm (6") to 30 cm (12"). Measured from leaf tip to leaf base.
32. Hosta, three leaves, one variety, variegated. 15 cm (6") to 30 cm (12"). Measured from leaf tip to leaf base.
33. Hosta, three leaves, one variety, single colour. Over 30 cm (12"), measured from leaf tip to leaf base.
34. Hosta, three leaves, one variety, variegated. Over 30 $\mathrm{cm}(12 \mathrm{\prime})$, measured from leaf tip to leaf base.
35. A collection of cut flowers displayed in exhibitor's own container. Minimum of five varieties

## SECTION B - Potted Plants

All entries must have been owned by exhibitor for a minimum of three months.
37. Mixed plants in a patio container
38. Container planting in a non-traditional container
39. Houseplant, flowering.
40. Houseplant, foliage.
41. Cactus/Succulent, Collection. Minimum of five cultivars in a single pot exhibited on a tray or all in one large container.

SECTION C - Vegetables and Herbs
42. Any pod type of vegetable, three pods, e.g., broad beans, peas.
43. Any Brassica, one head, e.g., broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower.
44. Any one lettuce
45. Radish, six bunched, tops and roots left on.
46. Rhubarb, six stalks, tied, tops cut to 2.5 cm to 5 cm (1" to 2").
47. Collection of four named vegetables, minimum of two of each variety.
48. Collection of five culinary herbs, named, in a single container.
49. Collection of three flowering herbs, named, in a single container.

Arrangement size not greater than 60 cm (20") tall and 45 cm (18") deep and 45 cm (18") wide.

## 51. ROUND AND ROUND AND ROUND SHE GOES:

Have fun and create a fresh flower wreath that you will present vertically.
Maximum outer width of finished wreath to be no more than a 45 cm (18") diameter with a maximum depth of 30 cm (12").

## 52. A ROYAL ARRANGEMENT:

Create a sparkling table centrepiece with candles (unlit of course) fit for a Royal dinner.
Arrangement maximum size is 35 cm (14") long $x$ 30cm (12") wide $x$ 30 cm (12") tall.

## 53. HATS OFF TO YOU

A mix of fresh flowers and greenery highlighting a favourite garden hat. Some ribbon allowed
Any size that fits.

## 54. A SUPRISE PACKAGE:

An arrangement creating a native habitat for pollinators. Don't forget the wild flowers in the ditches and from your garden. Arrangement not greater than 45 cm (18") tall, 30cm (12") deep and 45 cm (18") wide.

Catagory 1. 0 TO 10 YEARS

This arrangement using fresh flowers should also include local driftwood, shells and sea greenery.
