### President's Message - October 2025

In celebration of the onset of cooler and damper weather many of us are busily tending to gardening tasks that mark the season. With the autumn colours forming a backdrop there is great weather between the showers to get going on cutting back overgrown vegetation, taking cuttings for propagating favourite perennials and safely stowing those more tender beauties into a frost-free snug. Some blooming stalwarts display a renewed vigour in the shoulder season – many Roses produce a fresh blush of bloom, the Dahlias take on deeper colour presenting the opportunity to arrange bright bouquets to bring cheer into the house against shortening days.

Once the late veggie harvest is complete with the squash, onions, and garlic cured and stowed in the cool room there is just enough warmth through the day to germinate a cover crop of fall rye or hairy vetch that will help nurture the soil ecology through to the spring. These weeks of early fall are prime time for getting next year's garlic in the ground with a bit of bone meal under each clove and a cozy blanket of straw or leaf mulch on top to protect the growing plants from both freezing cold and driving rain, oh the joys of a coastal winter. Speaking of rain there is good book in the Club Library on Rain Gardens in the Pacific Northwest which is both thorough and practical for

anyone keen to take on a serious project in climate change mitigation.

These shortening days lead some of us to reflect on gardens past and to imagine gardens future. The triple whammy of deep drought, high temperatures and severe water restrictions invokes thoughts of xeriscaping, rain water capture and mulch, mulch, mulch. Gardeners are naturally optimistic which is one major reason that they are so great to hang out with; there is usually a patch of blue among the dramatic clouds.

Even though we aren't yet through Hallowe'en it is time to be like the retailers and get prepared for Christmas. The Christmas Party and pot luck dinner is scheduled early this year – December 2 – so save the date for this reliably satisfying and uplifting event.

Asters, Astilbe, Black-eyed Susan, Bleeding heart, Coreopsis, Daylilies, Ferns, Garden Phlox, Hostas, Iris, Peonies, Salvia, Sedum, Shasta daisy and Yarrow.

We are so fortunate to have avid propagators in our group! The benefits are evident at the general meetings and ultimately at the Mill Bay Community Flower and Garden Show. Thank you so much! Besides donations from members, this month we have received a generous donation of approx 60 plants from Glenda, representing the Vic Master Gardeners Association (VMGA). Again, thanks! What does not sell at the Oct meeting will be held until the Spring planting period or the Flower and Garden Show. Members are encouraged to donate healthy, labelled (if possible) plants to the meetings.

Available at this month's meeting:

#### From VMGA:

- Astilbe -pink
- Astrantia 'star of billion,' (Masterwort)
- Achilea millefolium 'Milly Rock' (pink yarrow)
- Beesia deltaphylla ground cover, (evergreen heart shaped glossy leaves, dainty flowers)
- Ceanothus 'Victoria,' 3 from cuttings
- Cranesbill Geranium, 'cinereum,' pink, hardy, single pink, 20 inches tall
- Dendrathema 'Hillside Sheffield Pink'
- Eryngium variifolium (Sea Holly)
- Lychnis, (Rose Campion)
- Scabiosa, 'salmon rose,' (an annual that could be held over in a greenhouse)
- Salvia 'hot lips' 45 cm tall
- hippophae rhomoides dioecious, 'Sea Buckthorn' edible berry bush
- Phygelius 'sensation,' (Cape fuschia, magenta)
- Thalictrum Flavum'Elin,' (lavender meadow rue -8')
- Grapes, green: Vitis 'Interlaken'
- Stachys macrantha 'Rosea,' violet purple flowers
- Nassella tenuissima, (Mex feather grass, .5 1 metre tall)

3 x Streptocarpus, (Cape Primrose), a houseplant you can put outside in late spring.

4 x 3 gal bamboo plants will be outside the hall – pay at plant sale table.

### Gardening Tips for November 2025 by Barb Kohlman

I'm terrible about cleaning up in the garden in the fall; however, have come to learn that there are benefits to leaving some things alone all winter — especially flowers and perennials, as it helps to protect them from the cold as well as provide food and shelter for birds.



So, take this list of tasks as something you can do this month if there's a nice day, and if you'd like to get out in the garden.

I'm here to assure you it will all be there in the spring and nothing awful happens if everything isn't done.

### Vegetable & Fruit Garden

- Cut raspberry canes that fruited and mulch all berries if haven't yet.
- Cover perennial vegetables like rhubarb, asparagus, and artichokes with composted manure and straw.
- Cover any fall/winter vegetables with cold frames, plastic tunnels, or row covers.
- Continue to harvest cool weather greens like kale, chard and turnip greens.
- Check potatoes, onions, carrots if they are in storage.
- Apply chicken manure to any dormant garden beds to produce a soil in spring full of nutrients when time to plant.

### Flower gardens

- Lightly prune roses to protect from wind damage (save hard pruning for late winter/early spring).
- Pull the last weeds and mulch around perennials, if needed.
- There's still time to plant bulbs for spring blooms (tulips, daffodils, etc.) in most areas.
- Cut back chrysanthemums that have bloomed down to 4-6 inches.
- Plant trees and shrubs (great time to see the fall color of tree varieties) or divide and move perennials.
- Wrap tender plants in burlap, if needed.
- Bring in houseplants still outside or any tender plant to overwinter.
- Drain irrigation systems, unhook hoses and store.
- Rake and compost leaves to use as a mulch around tender plants, run a mower over them a couple times.

Ian Letson from Quw'utsun Secondary had planned to study Horticulture and Landscaping at Vancouver Island University but the program was canceled. We are holding the scholarship for him while he searches for another program.

Plant Sale: Carrie has a lot of plants and bulbs for sale tonight. There are also some quince fruit.

Brag Table: Dustin Carlson and Bryan Emory took turns describing the entries tonight. Bryan brought a cork log in which were embedded a number of plants. He took a prize for it at the fall fair. He also brought an Angel Wing hybrid begonia with beautiful hanging pink flowers. Dustin brought a number of squashes and a small orchid in a pot. There were also colourful dahlias in a vase and several orchids from Bryan.

Garden related questions: Why are the quince on the tree beginning to split? They are ready to pick.

Award Ceremony: Long Service Member Awards were presented tonight to two deserving members. Gord Hamilton has been treasurer for many years and has also taken care of the Web site. He has also been treasurer for the Flower and Garden Show. Gillian Keir has been Vice President, President and Past President and has chaired the Flower and Garden Show. Both have been members for many years. Their valuable work is much appreciated by the club. They received Life Member Name Tags.

The meeting broke for refreshment at 7:40 PM and reconvened at 8:03.

The prizes from the raffle table tonight were a watering can, a packet of spring bulbs and an orchid in a pot.

Kathy Code introduced tonight's speaker, Bryan Emory, President of the Victoria Orchid Society. He brought along an tray of orchids for sale. He grows orchids from the highlands of South America. He prefers orchids of bright colours and small size. Bryan has been growing orchids since he was 10 years old. He explained that there are 650 to 750 genera in orchids and at least 30,000 species. Orchids have been hybridized for a very long time and they usually have tiny flowers. There are 23 species on Vancouver Island. Bryan showed photographs and described the properties of the various types of orchids and gave us hints on how to care for them.

Gwen Redcliffe moved adjournment at 9:05 PM.
