## President's Message: April 2025

I came to Shawnigan Lake in 1957; my mother engineered the move of our family from a Northern Alberta farm - a move from rich but short season farming country to the gardening paradise of Southeastern Vancouver Island where the growing season was seemingly never ending. I have a fond memory from then of going with my mother to the 'Flower Show' at the old Shawnigan Lake Community Hall. This Flower Show, an early precursor to the current Community Flower and Garden Show, made a strong impression on me. To be in that large hall with row upon row of display tables filled with vases of vibrant blossoms, verdant foliage and succulent vegetables epitomized the possibilities offered by taking advantage of sun, soil, rain and a little sweat. Visiting the Flower Show at an early age contributed significantly to my engagement in the gardening life. I hope to see lots of youngsters out to this year's Community Flower and Garden Show falling under the spell of the magical possibilities inherent in the pursuit of gardening.

We are just over a month away from the 76th Community Flower and Garden Show at the end of May. A large contingent of volunteers have been working for several months to plan all the fine detail essential to making the Show a success. Entry categories are organized, plants for the sale are

growing on, silent auction offerings are accumulating, vendors are lined up and a Strawberry Tea is brewing. We continue accepting volunteers to join in staging this event which promises to be a kick off into summer.

On the day of the Fair one of the biggest contributors to success will be the participation of exhibitors. There is so wide a range of categories to enter exhibits that anyone can find something to suit their style. Pretty much anything you have growing in or near your yard is fair game to enter in a category. I am considering entering bouquet of Dandelion, Plantain, Dead nettle, Oxeve daisy and Buttercup in the native flower and/or foliage category though only the Buttercup is truly native - the rest are naturalized introductions. The fun is in entering and sharing what you grow. Winning is optional, it is not reserved for the competitive because every entry has a chance and the more entries the more chances. The cost is only \$0.50 per entry and exhibitors get free admission to the Show.

Get yourselves involved, invite your friends and neighbours to join in and by all means lets get the kids involved. See you at the Community Flower and Garden Show.

#### **Bernie Dinter on Dwarf Conifers**

Bernie grew up on the campus of Shawnigan Lake School, where his father was a gardener from 1952 to 1972. He graduated from Shawnigan Lake School in 1969 and in 1976 graduated from UBC with a degree in Plant Science.

Bernie's father began Dinter's Nursery in 1973 and Bernie has been managing nursery operations since 1976. Bernie's daughter Tamara is now the general manager. The nursery has been supporting gardeners in the Cowichan Valley for over 50 years and now attracts customers from all over Vancouver Island.

Bernie is a member of the 'Cowichan Valley Rhododendron Society', Duncan Rotary Club and a member of the 'BC Institute of Agrologists'.

Dwarf Conifer – A Journey into the Miniature

Dwarf conifers allow the creation of gardens that fit your actual space. Gardens are shrinking as modern residences are built on smaller lots. Many species that we know as large trees are available in dwarf forms with their hardiness, interesting colours, textures and range of shapes. All the major conifer genera will be reviewed to show what is available to create a beautiful, small-scale garden.



### Gardening Tips for April 2025 by Barb Kohlman

Take cuttings of over-wintered Pelargoniums (tender geraniums) and Fuchsias, and pot them up to encourage rooting. Pot them on to their summer locations when well-rooted.





#### Plant those cool-season veggies now

UBC garden instructor Egan Davies says any vegetable where you're eating the leaves, such as spinach, arugula or kale, are considered cool-season plants. They can be planted outdoors now. "Then anything you eat the fruit from, like tomato or any of the squashes, those plants are warm season," he said in an interview with *North By Northwest*'s Sheryl MacKay.

"Even if you're starting them inside, those plants need heat and it won't warm up in most parts of the province until later this April or May, so you might start them off in April, and plant them out in May."

Dolomite lime spread over root area of lilac, mock orange, deutzia would be a good thing to do now.

Place supports for tall or floppy flowers before plants are fully grown and it is too late.

Divide and transplant (or pot up for the Flower and Garden Show plant sale) summer and fall bloomers.

Peach trees – grow better here with a cover, 'Frost' is a peach leaf curl resistant variety...

Celery: Tango grows well. Water with a drip line, grow in blocks, cover with leaves.

Ivy – do I have to get rid of it? Easier to cut it back to where you can live with it. Mow it. Shear it. Cut it off trees!

Morning glory: get rid of it.

Oregon Grape berries: not a major rat attraction.
