January's Speaker:

Amy Luck-MacGregor on Soil Food Web Organisms

Amy from Spring Hill Soil Lab will lead an exploration into the soil food web organisms that are critical for nutrient cycling, plant pest and disease control, and soil structure. Supporting these organisms means we can grow without the need for artificial inputs. The focus will be on:

- what soil food web organisms look like under the microscope
- how to recognise if they might be missing from your garden
- practical strategies to restore microbial diversity and support living soil

It's a bit chilly to look at soil at this time of year but if anyone wants to bring in some compost or worm bin samples, feel free and we can put your new microbe identification skills to the test! If you are bringing in a sample, please collect it on the day of the talk. Take 5 separate tablespoons of material from 5 different areas and depths of your worm or composting system. Place in a clean ziplock bag and leave the top open for the microbes to breathe.

Bio:

Amy Luck-MacGregor is the owner/operator of Spring Hill Soil Laboratory in Duncan, providing biological analyses of soil and compost to support regenerative agriculture in B.C and beyond. She is at her happiest with her hands in the soil and is passionate about sharing the wonders of the soil food web and the connection between soil health, ecosystem health and human health with people of all ages. She is a Certified Soil Food Web Laboratory Technician and Soil Biology Consultant in-training at Dr Elaine Ingham's Soil Food Web School. You can find her at www.springhillsoil-lab.ca.


Memorial Garden Clean Up

From the Plant Sales Table by Carrie Nelson

In spite of the cold, we were able to raise \$132 from plant, garlic, and glove sales at the January meeting. Thanks for your donations!

At this month's meeting, we might see a few spring delights and starts, but for the most part, we are looking forward to March, a busy month for starting veggie, herb, and flower seeds.

Given the threat of tariffs & the need to increase island food security, this is a good year to share your expertise on how to grow a garden and save seed. Growing root crops, onions, garlic, and squash will give you comfort come winter (but these are not usually started in Mar!)

Buy seed early for the best selection from retailers or Seedy Saturday, March 15, at CH hall.

Please consider starting a few extra plants to be shared with members at our general meetings or to donate to the MBGC sales table at the Community Flower & Garden Show in May. Ensure plants are labelled & their containers wiped clean when bringing them to the hall.

Below is a list of some plants you can start in March but there is **no great rush for direct sowing** if the weather is cold and wet. Check out the West Coast Seed catalogue or on-line for specifics.

NOTE: If you are game, try starting a few carrot & beet seeds indoors for transplanting out in April. I have not done this but I understand they transplant just fine.

Gardening Tips for Feb-March 2025 by Barb Kohlman

When your forsythia is blooming it is time to prune your roses!

Hellebores are looking good even though they were covered in snow, Hope you have *trimmed* off all the leaves of the *Helloborus* x *hybridus* by now so that you can enjoy the beautiful blooms, and so there is space for new leaves to grow.

The single hellebores are best for offering nectar to the bees. In double flowers the nectarines have evolved to be 'petals' and so less nectar is produced.



As always get after those pop weeds. Don't put them in your compost as they have enough stored energy to mature and form seeds. Put them in a black plastic bag to rot and then put them into your compost.

The most pressing chore, at this time, is to clean up after the winter. I do not remove leaves from my beds where they do not interfere with plants that are emerging, but do take them away from bulbs that are growing and off of primulas etc.

If you have not planted wind flowers – Anemone blanda in your garden there should be 4" pots available at the garden centers now. They are such cheery little daisy-like flowers blooming in my garden and in just a few years they will seed themselves into a nice patch.

For a tree that shows good now try Magnolia stellata— buds will start to break with star like flowers in white of pale pink in some cultivars. A small tree useful for a smallish space. And water well the first year to establish, I have not tried one in my current garden but may find a space soon.

Hope you are out enjoying the finish of the snow, are managing to get out in the garden between the rain squalls, and are planning at least one new space---small even counts cheers barb k



GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Bernie Juurlink announced that the CERCA (Cowichan Estuary Restoration and Conservation Association) needs volunteers for a bat survey. The volunteer will get one of 4 microphones which record bat calls. The volunteer will record for 2 nights a week for 2 weeks each month, from April to November. The volunteer will have downloaded software which gives tentative identification of the bat from the recorded call. Then the volunteer will enter the identification information, and the first bat and the last bat recorded into an EXCEL program. The information will be collected and tabulated. Kitchen. Judy needs one more volunteer for goodies for next month and she passed the sheet around for March.

Ouestions for Master Gardeners:

- How can I get my witch hazel to bloom. It is healthy and well fertilized. Put wood ash around it. Also use organic Bordon's fertilizer.
- It is too cold to prune roses now. Wait until it starts to rain. The same goes for fruit trees.

The meeting broke for refreshment at 7:42 and reconvened at 8:00 PM.

Kathy Code spoke on Lessons from my Ecological Garden. In 2012 she bought a piece of land in Cobble Hill that has a lovely variety of ecosystems including forest, wetland, flat land and some scrub. On the flat land she has built an orchard, large raised vegetable beds and a greenhouse. The beds are raised 12 inches because the soil underneath is clay. One of the joys is listening to and observing the birds, the trees and the wind. She loves to watch the many pollinators at work. She does a lot of mulching and uses tarps to control the weeds. The tarps are fun because they harbour a variety of snakes. She also has colonies of ants, spiders, frogs, African lizards and worms. Golden crab spiders are white with red markings. They lurk in daisies to catch their prey. She is striving to keep the grass down, to preserve the bounty from the garden and to develop a root cellar.
