Holy Cow, we had frost at our house this morning! Tom had to be at the airport for 6AM, and when we left the house at 5:15, the temperature was -1! A late season frost can be devastating to flowering fruit trees, magnolias, and any tender annuals you may have already set out during our mild early spring. Check for damage and replace annuals like impatiens and early tomatoes as they may well be stunted for the season now.

Plans for the bus tour have mostly been finalized and tickets will be available at our April 23rd meeting. Look for full information in this issue of the newsletter, and if any plans change we will let you know.

In anticipation of our Community Flower and Garden Show on June 14th and 15th, we are posting judging guidelines here in the newsletter and on the website. Every year we see an increase in the number of entrants in the flower show, last year we had 27 people who exhibited in flower, plant, veggie and floral design classes. Look for Joy Story and whatever extravaganza she will produce for one of the design classes!

We will be taking a few minutes at each of our meetings prior to the show date to go over procedures and answer questions you may have about entering the show. We will buddy up new exhibitors with more experienced members for submissions on June 14th. Entering the show is fun and educational and once you've done it, you'll want to do it every year. Please try not to be intimidated by the process, it's really pretty easy and we'll walk you through each step. Janice also has copies of judging standards handbooks in the library for you to check out.

We will again be circulating a sign-up sheet at our April 23rd meeting for volunteers to help with the Flower and Garden Show. If you are unable to attend the meeting and would like to sign up, contact Heather Gibbins directly, either by phone or email. It promises to be a huge show again this year and none of it is possible without your help.

Remember to mark your calendar for our AGM on Tuesday June 25th. Festivities include our Potluck buffet dinner starting at 6:00PM, the traditional Garden hat competition, special prizes and raffles and of course, the changing of the Guard! Plan on arriving between 5 and 5:30PM to set your table. Dinner service will begin at 6PM followed by annual reports and nominations to the Executive and Committee, awarding of prizes and the special raffle draw. Spouses and families are always welcome too.

Annual Bus Tour

Plans have been mostly finalized for the Sooke Secret Garden bus tour on Saturday June 2nd, and they are as follows: Two buses, one holding 20 people, the other 24, will leave Kerry Park at 8:15AM, this time could change, but we'll keep you posted. The buses will first gather up the Cowichan Valley club participants in Duncan and then head down to pick us up. We will visit 6 or 7 of the gardens.

Two buses will be used because Sooke has advised us that one large bus would not be able to get to most of the gardens, so two smaller buses were booked. Seating on the buses will be mixed half and half with each club's members to achieve our goal of cross participation.

Upon arrival in Sooke, the two buses will take different routes so as to not overwhelm any one garden with 44 people arriving all at once. The gardens sound wonderful, there is a plant sale as part of the tour, and there will be collector cars and musicians at some of the locations. We will meet up again between noon and 1PM for a group brown bag lunch gathering at the Sooke Region Museum where covered outdoor banquet seating will be set up for us, and washrooms will be available.

At the end of the day, the buses will (tentatively) meet up at Westburn Landscape and Garden Centre for a shopping spree and door prizes before heading back to Mill Bay. We will plan on arriving back at Kerry Park at 5:30-6:00PM (tentative).

The cost per ticket will be \$60. This includes your ticket to the Sooke Secret Gardens Tour, transportation to and from Sooke on deluxe coaches and the lunch stop at the Sooke Region Museum. Please bring along snacks, plenty of liquids (lots of walking that day!) a brown bag lunch and sun protection (we're optimistic people here).

Tickets will be available at our April 23rd meeting through club member Bobbie Burns. Please have cash or cheque (made payable to the Mill Bay Garden Club) ready at that time. In the event of overselling our share of tickets (22) a lottery will be held for the 22 available seats.



MILL BAY GARDEN CLUB MASTER GARDENER TALK/TIPS APRIL 2013

- 1. Plan your space before you start to plant if possible
- 2. Soils are the most important consideration
- 3. Look at native plants and pick cultivars or plants that tolerate the same conditions
- 4. Wander around your neighborhood to see what other gardeners are growing to get a good idea of what to plant but also experiment.
- 5. Try to have a good selection of berries and tree fruits in your garden.
- 6. Plant most plants, trees, shrubs in the Fall so that their roots can take advantage of the damp soil in preparation for dry summers. Water conservation hints as well.
- 7. When growing vegetables, draw a plan of your vegetable garden and use that to help you plan your crop rotation. Write on the plan what you have planted where, label the plan for the correct year and keep the annual plans as a record.
- 8. Try to use open pollinated vegetables where possible as you can then collect the seeds and use them the next year. This will help you to develop strong healthy plants for your own site.
- 9. Plant flowers among your vegetables to entice the bees and beneficial insects and to deter the nasties e.g. sweet alyssum, rosemary, marigolds, chives, candytuft.
- 10. Use local resources e.g. MBGC to help make your decisions



GARDEN CLUB ANNUAL PLANT SALE



Your plant sale committee would like to remind you that the annual Mill Bay Garden Club Plant Sale will take place during the Community Flower and Garden Show at the Cobble Hill Farmer's Institute Hall on Saturday June 15, 2013. The money that the Club makes from the plant sale helps to support our contributions to projects ongoing in our Community. Our Club is very community minded, and therefore, the plant sale is important to us.

Please remember to pot up plants for the sale. If each of us only gave five plants each (and many members give far more than that) just imagine the variety and number of plants we would have for sale. We would kindly ask that you refrain from donating invasive plants and the Committee does have the prerogative to remove, from the sale, those plants that it considers to be invasive. It is important that we continue to be good stewards of our environment.

How to display flowers for the Community Flower and Garden Show on June 14th and 15th

Submitting entries is an easy process. We will have extra assistance on hand to help you fill out entry forms correctly, identify the proper classes for your entries and display your selections in the right way. Don't be afraid to give it a try, you'll discover that it's fun.

For **Rhododendrons**, there are several different class descriptions: a truss is the flower cluster from a single bud. A spray is a branch of stem with a number of trusses attached. Trusses with a straight stem are more highly rated then those that are not upright and both trusses and sprays need the foliage attached, which is also judged.



There are many factors that flower show judges consider when assigning points to each flower or leaf/ frond that is displayed. This quick review will give you a few guidelines, but for a full understanding please refer to the BC Council of Garden Clubs Judging Standards handbooks that Janice Rose has in our library.

These 5 judging categories differ by class and group. For example, Delphiniums are judged on a greater number of categories including but not limited to spike length, flower spike symmetry, foliage, and general perfection.

Flowers with a scent are judged on that basis as well. Roses are judged on balance and proportion, stem and foliage. Violets and pansies on belting (margins) and blotch. In general, choose the best looking flowers with a good healthy stem, uniform and well formed freshly opened flower with vibrant color.

Foliage (ferns, Hosta, Heuchera) will be judged on the three leaves per entry being as close to identical as possible (uniformity). Markings the same, size of leaf, length of stem, thickness of stem. Color, condition, and form also are taken into consideration, though a truly spectacular Hosta that's less uniform could take the lead over another entry that is perfectly uniform but not as special.

Vegetables and fruits have a different point score system, with a wide range of maximum points. Taken into consideration though are condition, size and firmness, color and uniformity.

How to display in Garden Show cont'd:

Cut **herbs** are judged on again a different range of categories including selection, rarity, and labeling. Potted herbs on number of specimens, neatness of display and naming.

Floral arrangements will be considered under balance, dominance, contrast, rhythm, proportion and scale, also color, suitable relationship of material, distinction, originality and condition.

Don't be afraid of all the technical aspects of judging. Just follow the descriptions on each of the classes on your show schedule. Pick your best looking flowers and plants, leaves, vegetables, herbs and personal design style and display them to their best advantage. When in doubt, ask the volunteers who are working the show for advice, many will know the answer you're looking for. Give yourself plenty of time to prepare your entries at the hall when you arrive, plan on at least a half hour for 4 to six entries, some of us with numerous class entries may take several hours to groom and display and fill out entry forms. Have fun with it and you'll see that each year you'll feel compelled to enter more and more classes.

SHOW RULES & REGULATIONS

- Entries are open to all members of the public, subject to individual class restrictions. An entry fee of .50¢ per exhibit will be charged. Exhibitors will be given an Exhibitor's Wristband, which will allow them to attend the show without charge.
- 2. Entries will be accepted at the Cobble Hill Hall on Friday, June 14th, 2013 between the hours of noon and 7:00pm. The Hall will be closed for judging at 7:00pm sharp on Friday, June 14th, 2013 and will be open, with the rest of the exhibition grounds, from 9am - 2pm on Saturday, June 15, 2013. Unauthorized persons will not be allowed in the hall during the judging.
- The exhibitor, with the exception of the Design Division, must grow all plant material. Artificial plant material is not allowed. The exhibitor must have grown potted plants for a minimum of three months.
- 4. The committee reserves the right to reclassify any entry before judging. Classes may be subdivided when necessary. Judges have the right to withhold prizes to any unworthy exhibits and the decisions will be final.
- No entry may be removed before 2:00pm on Saturday, June 15, 2013. The committee will not be held responsible for exhibits left after 3:00 pm.

 Buds showing colour shall be counted as a bloom.
- 10. Please do not include stem when measuring hostas. Leaf only, base to tip.
- 11. Judging will be by the B.C. Council of Garden Clubs Judging Standards for Non-Specialty Shows.
- 12. Prize money will be given out at the show. Special awards will he presented at 1:30pm.

SECTION A - Cut Flowers

- 1) Azalea, one spray.
- 2) Annual, Biennial, Perennial, three stems, e.g. Calendula.
- 3) Clematis, three stems, flower less than 10cm (4") diameter.
- 4) Clematis, three stems, flower more than 10cm (4") diameter.
- 5) Columbine, three stems.
- 6) Delphinium, one spike, lateral shoots removed.
- 7) Foxglove, one stem, lateral shoots removed.
- 8) Geranium (Cranesbill), three stems.
- 9) Heather, three flowering sprays in one vase.
- 10) Iris, bearded, one stalk.
- 11) Iris, beardless, one stalk e.g. Siberian, Japanese.
- 12) Iris, bulbous, one stalk e.g. English, Dutch, Spanish.
- 13) Pansy, five blooms displayed in moss, Blossoms 5cm (2") & over.
- 14) Peony, one bloom.
- 15) Poppies, three blooms.
- 16) Any other perennial or biennial, three stems, grown from a bulbous root e.g. Lilies.

- 30) Sweet Pea, minimum of three stems, any colour
- 31) Vine, flowering other than clematis. Three stems of one variety.

The themes this year should reflect this and create a "feast for the eyes".

- 68) Kid's Design Theme: Egg Salad A shallow bowl filled with fresh flowers, herbs, greenery and some vegetables and/or fruit.
- 69) Theme: Gone Fishing Arrange fresh and dried material to reflect the title. Can be TALL, up to 60cm (24").
 70) Theme: Cowichan Still Life We've all seen still life paintings. Now create a still life that can be painted. Used fresh materials and no more than two accessories allowed. Size is to 51cm (20") maximum in any direction.
- 71) Theme: To Nana with Love A bouquet of flowers that you would give to "Nana". All fresh and size to a maximum of 51cm (20") in any direction.
- 72) Theme: Sunset Sailing The colours and design must reflect the title. Size to be no bigger than 60cm (24"). Accessories allowed.
- 73) Theme: Hummingbird Nest -Arrangement in a thimble. All fresh material and no bigger than 7.5cm (3") in any direction.
- 74) Theme: Incredible Edibles In any unconventional container. Must contain at least 50% edible vegetables/flowers. Not to exceed 91cm by 91cm (36" by 36") in size.
