## Justin Dunning:Trillium Hibbersonii, Vancouver Island's Hidden Gem

Justin Dunning grew up in Haliburton, Ontario surrounded by Trilliums every spring. Trillium grandiflorum is so prevalent that the county uses it as its emblem and it carpets the deciduous forest floors so thickly that hills can appear white at a distance. Justin's main focus is on carnivorous plants and orchids but has always had a soft spot for the genus Trillium. After learning about the existence of a dwarf
 Trillium endemic to "inaccessible cliffs" on the west coast it became an obsession to see these plants and document them. Over the past three years, Justin has visited every documented site of Trillium Hibbersonii and is excited to share the history of Vancouver Island's most charismatic endemic plant. Justin has lived on Vancouver Island for 12 years with his wife Tiffany. They spend their weekends hiking and exploring with their rescue pup, Nootka.

## Gardening Tips for May by Barb Kohlman

- June in the Northwest is ideal (necessary ??!!) for continued garden weeding. Since many seedlings may still be small, this is imperative to prevent overcrowding or competition.
- Those who have planted cool season annual crops may also
 find this to be the ideal time to begin or continue harvesting. Both lettuce and snap peas flourish in early-season cool temperatures.
- As the weather begins to warm, many areas of the Northwest will see that gardening in June is the time to transplant tender vegetables into the garden or begin direct sowing.
- Regional gardening often includes the preparation and maintenance of drip irrigation lines. Irrigation will be key to plant health during the driest portions of the growing season. Since we will frequently receive hot temperatures and dry weather in June, as well as the rest of summer, growers will need to make certain that their drip irrigation is started and continued for the growing season.
- June garden chores in the West also mark an ideal time to begin fertilizing perennial flowers and shrubs, as well as fruit trees.
- Gardeners can also continue to direct sow/transplant frost tender plants such as tomatoes, peppers, beans, and corn.
- Throughout June, gardeners will need to continue routine maintenance of xeriscape lawns and hardscapes to ensure that spaces are waterwise.

Kitchen: Judy passed around a sign up sheet for treats for the next meeting in May. The May meeting will have a sign up sheet for the September and October meetings.

Barb Kohlman also pointed out erythronium grandiflora (Glacier Lily), a bonsai azalea, Anemone coronaria (Blue poppy) and several colourful tulips.

Fran Benton brought a hellebore root that she had split She also brought several packets of giant marigold seeds to give away.

The meeting broke for refreshment at 7:45 and reconvened at 8:00 PM.
The raffle table items this evening included a ceramic pot, a flowering plant and bottles of fertilizer.
Richard Nelson introduced our speaker, a horticultural therapist, Sheila Bailes who practices the use of horticulture to help people get well. She is originally from Manitoba. Connecting with nature particularly in a forest can improve our physical and emotional health. We seek in many ways to incorporate nature into urban networks with nature based mindfulness, ecopsychology and ecotherapy. Horticultural therapy can benefit all kinds of illnesses and can contribute to the recovery process of persons in prisons, care facilities, schools and for treatment of Alzheimer's disease. Horticultural therapists are trained professionals who usually have a bachelor's degree and have interned under a registered horticultural therapist.
