## Gardening Tips for December 2025 by Barb Kohlman

#### I. Harvest Winter Greens, Berries, Cones, and More

Spend some time in your garden harvesting winter greens, berries, pinecones, grasses, and other seasonal cuttings for winter displays

#### 2. Clean Bird Feeders & Refill Them

Ideally, you set out bird feeders earlier in fall. By December, it's time to check them to make sure they are clean and full of seed. You should clean bird feeders roughly every two weeks to prevent

buildup of bird droppings and other contaminants that can make birds sick.



#### 3. Prepare Soil Now for Spring

Late fall and early winter are good times to prepare soil because many of the annuals and perennials have either been removed or have died back. This means you can more easily access soil around plants. Adding 2 to 4 inches of compost this time of year also provides ample time for the nutrients to begin to work their way into existing soil before you begin planting in spring. Use organic compost from your compost bin or a local nursery.

#### 4. Try Your Hand at Plant Propagation

Plant propagation isn't as difficult as it sounds, especially if you start with plants that you can propagate by cutting such as evergreen trees, shrubs, and many succulents. It can help to dip the end of the root in a rooting hormone to stimulate roots before placing it in water. Put the cuttings and water near a sunny window. Roots will form in around 2 weeks. Once the root system develops lateral roots, you can move them to a pot with soil.

#### 5. Avoid De-Icing Salts

De-icing salts can be harmful to many plants and soil in your garden, so it's best to just avoid the use of salts in your garden if possible. Instead, use a cordless snow blower to remove heavier snow along walkways, driveways, or patios (if we get any). Then apply traction granules that will help prevent slipping on icy surfaces.

#### 6. Prepare for Deer

Deer are often more active during the late fall and winter months when food is most scarce. They go to great lengths to munch on plants during winter. Prepare for deer by checking your deer fencing to make sure nothing is broken. You can also use motion-activated deer sprinklers to help deter deer. Another option is to just accept deer and adjust your planting design to include deer-resistant plants. Winter is a good time to learn more about deer-resistant gardening so you can start adjusting your garden plans. Read Karen Chapman's book Deer-Resistant Design to get more information on planning a deer-resistant garden.

#### 7. Get Your Plant Catalogs & Start Shopping

December is a perfect time to sit by the fire with a warm cup of coffee or a glass of wine, browse plant catalogs, and think about next year's garden

#### 8. Plan Redesigns to Your Garden

With less going on in the garden during the winter, begin thinking about areas of your garden that you want to redesign, expand, or change.

## Mill Bay Garden Club General Meeting October 28, 2025

President Richard Nelson called the meeting to order at 7 PM in Mill Bay Community Hall.

Janice Rose moved acceptance of the agenda; seconded by Jim Wisnia. Passed. The President will add one item to the agenda tonight.

Gillian Keir moved acceptance of the minutes of the general meeting of September 23, 2015; seconded by Cliff Stainsby. Passed.

President: Richard explained that Bylaw #7 deals with charitable donations and how they should be dealt with. The bylaw says that the Executive should draw up a list of potential charitable organizations with the recommended donation and bring it to the AGM where it will be discussed and passed. That did not happen this year. The list of charitable donations was presented at the September General meeting and passed. The list was printed in the Newsletter. In accordance with the bylaw President Richard Nelson made a motion that the General Meeting approve the donations as presented by the Executive which are as follows:

Randy Bouchard seconded the motion. Passed.

The Christmas party will be on December 2.

Vice President Kathy Code said that we have two speakers tonight, elder Ken Elliott and Genevieve Singleton.

Past President Gillian Keir reminded us that there will be elections for executive positions in June. Since she will be away at that time, she would like to put together a committee of three seasoned club members to find people to fill positions. Please consider helping out.

Membership: Tonight we have one new member Kathy Haire. Alicia also introduced Toni Handy who is here tonight. Membership cards are available to anyone who has paid and does not have one.

Sunshine: Janice has sent out two cards to members who are ill. If you know of anyone

who needs a card please let her know.

Memorial Garden: There was a good crew out a couple of weeks ago who quickly cleaned up the garden.

Media: The Facebook page is up and running. Please check it out.

Library: Nancy Bonner reminded us that books are available for self checkout before the meeting and during the break.

Raffle: Charlene is helping out tonight. Tickets are available at break.

Plant table: Carrie pointed out some interesting plants on the table tonight; grapes and 5 pots of bamboo. The bamboo are clumping and slow to grow. The preordered dahlias are here-- \$5 per bag.

Kitchen: Gill passed around the sign up sheet for goodies. We need help for November and January.

Car Pooling: Last year Sally Emory identified 12 people who were willing to drive but had no takers. If you know someone who needs a ride to the meeting please let Sally know and she will arrange a lift. She will also send out an email.

Brag Table: Orange is the New Black. Fran Benton and Dustin Carlson did the honours tonight. Dustin brought in several types of pumpkins and a tomatillo plant. Tomatillos grow quickly and are quite nice when they are ripe. There were also some ground cherries and a large red and green hydrangea flower. The very healthy fluffy ruffle fern was almost lost until the owner changed the soil and location. Small green tomatoes will ripen if they are shiny; if they are dull they will not. Blue green dead men's fingers (Decaisnea fargesii) are pods with several seeds. Dustin said this was a bad year for mushrooms but he brought in a tray of them He showed us an elfin saddle, an angel wing which grows on hemlock and chanterelles which grow under red cedar. He also had some lobster mushrooms which are russulas that have been taken over by a parasite and turned red.

The meeting broke for coffee at 7:35 and reconvened at 7:55.

Prizes from the raffle tonight included a gardening book, a pair of secateurs, a packet of bulbs with a tea towel and oven gloves and an art piece of driftwood with birds.

Kathy Code introduced the speakers Genevieve Singleton, an ethnobotanist and nature interpreter, and her friend and colleague, Ken Elliott an elder who owns a native plant nursery and has a great deal of plant knowledge. Ken spoke about his personal experiences and how important it is to approach plants with respect, to introduce yourself and explain your intentions. He grew up eating wild food which is no longer possible because of the changes to our world. He went through the public school system in Duncan which earned him grief both from the whites in the school and from members of his own Cowichan community. He got rid of any negative emotions by participating in sports.

Unfortunately at the behest of his parents he let go of his language and is striving to relearn it.

Genevieve dedicated this presentation to her husband Dave Polster who is a plant ecologist and restoration expert. The photographs were all taken by Genevieve, of flowers in the Cowichan Valley. Ken explained how his people used the plants as food and for healing. He also explained how they would take wood from a Big Leaf Maple to make paddles but would leave the tree intact so that it would heal and continue its life in the forest.
