Pray Without Ceasing

Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ~Philippians 4:6

We are asked by God in Philippians not to worry, but rather to pray. Also in 1 Thessalonians 5:17, we are told to "Pray without ceasing." The story that brought these two verses home to me was one told by Greek Orthodox Metropolitan Bishop Anthony Bloom in his classic book *Learning to Pray*. He tells the story of Father Siloan at Mount Athos. There was a time when young Russian peasants who had no land and no prospects for their future would come to Mount Athos to spend time in the workshops trying to earn enough money to go back home to buy a piece of farm land. Many would spend years there working very hard and trying to succeed at this task of saving enough money.

The young men in Father Siloan's workshop always seemed to spend the shortest time at the Monastery. They got more work done and earned their money more quickly than any of the other men in workshops overseen by other monks. This bothered the other monks who couldn't figure out what Father Siloan did differently. They encouraged their young men. They cajoled them. They were sometimes stern with them. However, no matter what the other monks did, it made no difference. Father Siloan's men would come and go faster than theirs.

Finally, one day the other monks went to Father Siloan and asked what it was that he did so that his men could accomplish so much more. Father Siloan replied, "I don't know. I can only tell you what I do. Each morning as the young men arrive, I greet them one by one. I might say, 'Alexi, how are you this morning? Have you heard any news from your family in Russia, how are they?' After I listen to their answer, I'll say, 'May you have a good and productive day, I am praying for you to get home soon.' "The next young man may come in, and again I'll say, 'Good morning Nicoli. What do you hear about your young wife in Russia? Have you gotten a letter?' Then I listen to what he says and respond by say, "May you have a good productive day. I am praying for you to get back to your wife soon.' And so it goes one by one as they arrive. Then as the day goes on, I take each one in my mind's eye and lift him up in my hands to the love of the Divine. I'll pray about what I know of his situation and when I run out of words, I simply hold him up to the love of God. If I lose the image, I again take hold of him and lift him up to God. And so I spend my day.

One after the other I lift each man up time and time again until the day is over. When the day ends, I again greet each man as he is leaving and wish him good night and wish him a restful sleep and good dreams of his family. I tell him that I will be praying for him to return home soon. And that is what I do."

Many of the other monks seemed dubious and skeptical, but the proof was in the happiness and joy on the men's faces, and in the relatively short time they spent working at the monastery before going home with money in their pockets.

Father Siloan knew the power of prayer and knew how to pray without ceasing. As I said earlier, this story had a profound effect on my own prayer life. I'm not sure I had a handle on how to pray without ceasing, or how to make complicated prayer requests known to God, or how to pray for people in situations with details that I didn't know, until I read this story. I pray it is as meaningful to you as it has been to me.

The Epiphany Council wants to keep everyone informed about our financial situation. This month we will take a look at the numbers from August 2020. Epiphany applied for and received a SBA PPP loan of \$12,500 at the end of May. This money will be used for salaries and rent during the pandemic. The PPP loan is included in our revenue.

October Outreach Project - Sock It To Me!



Stories of Faith in Action



We accomplished SO much in the month of September! We planted turnip seed and radish seed tapes; harvested okra, peppers, tomatoes; mowed; worked compost into the beds; weeded; fertilized the sweet corn; and watered a LOT! Our tomatoes, okra and pepper plants continued to flower and produce.

Thank you to all our volunteers, including our "Judge's Club" youth! So far this year we have donated more than 1,400 pounds!!

God Is ...!

(Based on Psalm 46 – called by some a song of holy confidence; also known as "Luther's Psalm" as Martin Luther wrote his hymn *A Mighty Fortress is Our God* as a paraphrase of Psalm 46)

God is - our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble! There are record-setting wildfires and hurricanes. A worldwide pandemic. Widespread social unrest and protests. Institutionalized racism. Violence in the streets – so many guns! A looming election. Voter suppression. Still, God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in <u>these</u> times of trouble!

God, wildfires are ravaging many states on the West Coast. Nearly 700,000 acres in 14 states have been burned and fires are still spreading. Are they due to climate change or poor forest management? Or a combination of both? Lighting strikes, gender-reveal party, arson? God, you are our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in <u>these</u> times of trouble.

God, Sally is moving sooo slowly and dumping sooo much rain in the Gulf Coast. There is flooding from Alabama to the Carolinas. Teddy might strike Bermuda just one week after Paulette. So many named storms this hurricane season, the Greek alphabet will be used to name future storms. God, you are Alpha to Omega the beginning and the end. God you are our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in these times of trouble.

God, this world-wide pandemic! The invisible enemy. Nearly 30 million infected worldwide. Nearly 950 thousand have died worldwide. God, who do we believe – medical experts or politicians? Medical experts and scientists advise a safe and effective vaccine will likely not be available until mid-2021. In the meantime, wear face-coverings! Some politicians say the medical experts are confused – a vaccine will be available very very soon and, no need to wear face coverings unless we want to. Such conflicting messages! Still, God you are our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in <u>these</u> times of trouble.

God, there is violence in the streets. Police brutality with knees on necks. Spit bags on faces. No-knock warrants. Black Lives Matter! God, peaceful protests are being co-opted to push violent agendas. Extremist groups of all kinds – Alt-right. Antifa. White nationalists, anti-gay zealots, racist skin heads, neo-Confederates, United Constitutional Patriots, Proud Boys, Ku Klux Klan - We can't breathe! Protestors, police, federal forces, extremists and provocateurs clashing in the streets. Peaceful protest being co-opted! Vigilante mob mentality – so many guns – on all sides! But, God, you are our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in <u>these</u> times of trouble!

God, there are top-down disinformation campaigns beginning in offices including the Oval Office - sitting behind that desk is the most powerful man in the 'free' world!? A master showman and manipulator with great fondness for strongmen. A reality star. God, has he created an alternative reality? He tweets often! Has millions of followers. And, a critical election fast approaches! Mailboxes removed from communities at a time when record numbers of voters may cast their ballot via mail, as is their right. God, is it reform of the postal system, or is this another example, amongst many, of voter suppression?! Allegations being made there will be violence in the streets if the election is stolen – from the strongman. What is Russia up to, this time? Or China? Or Iran? God, still, you are our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in <u>these</u> times of trouble!

Therefore we will not fear, though the wildfires rage and the hurricanes come. Though we can't gather as we would like because of the invisible enemy. In spite of the divisiveness in the land, and social unrest, and injustice, and structural racism, and violence in the streets, and an upcoming election that is fraught with uncertainty in this time of pandemic and there is great potential for more violence in the streets – still: The Lord Almighty is with us, the God of Jacob is our fortress! God says, "Be still and know that I am God!" God say, "I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth!" God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in <u>all</u> times of trouble. The Lord Almighty is with us! The God of Jacob is our fortress!
