And in today's reading Jesus said: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbour as yourself."

Prayer:

Father God, lovingly you rescue the weak and urge justice for all. You stand with the poor in the gutters where they have been left hurting.

Jesus Christ, son of the Father, you will not pass us by, but stoop to lift us up and carry us out of our pain. Your stories shatter our complacency and send us forth to serve and love others.

Holy Spirit, bringer of hope, you take us by the hand, leading us out of the ditches we have dug for ourselves, into the brightly lit streets of God's kingdom. Father, Son and Holy Spirit we worship and adore you.

Reading: Luke 10: 25-37 The Good Samaritan

Message: In this parable Jesus answers the question: Who is our neighbour? These days when, throughout the world, populism seems to thrive when foreigners and immigrants are viewed with suspicion if not outright hostility, it is a timely message for Christians.

The battered, victim of crime in Jesus' story would probably have seen the Samaritan coming towards him as a threat, might have expected people like the Samaritan to be the perpetrator, rather than the rescuer. Jesus make it clear that such prejudice is wrong and, even more than that calls us to be like the Samaritan, a good neighbour to everyone, even people we are tempted to consider our enemies or

economic competitors. Had the roles been reversed, had the Samaritan been the one wounded, he might too have viewed the Jew approaching him with fear, expecting the worst. .

These days in our Health and Care services, it is often left to foreigners, like the Samaritan to pick us up. In your local hospital or health centre, in care homes you may have seen them, you may even be one yourself, a so-called "foreigner" or "immigrant" working in Health and Social care, giving and contributing to the healing of [sometimes] suspicious citizens who have fallen down or fallen ill or just got old. This parable is worth remembering when today in newspapers, television and social media, unscrupulous politicians, seeking cheap popularity, rail against foreigners and immigrants. As Christians we know better, they are the neighbor's we are commanded to love.

Luke portrays Jesus as the divine foreigner, from heaven, who comes to visit human beings where they live, on earth. In this interpretation of the parable Jesus sees us lying on the roadside and full of compassion, bends over, comes close and pours oil and wine into our wounds. Oil symbolizes the healing power of Jesus; the wine is an image of his love. Just as Adam was created from the dust, we can be raised from the dust and created anew. In this parable Jesus painted a wonderful self- portrait, so if we say we follow Jesus we must do as He did. We too must act for the stranger, our neighbour, and as Jesus commanded love them as we love ourselves. Go and do likewise.
