Reading: Luke 14: 7-14

#### Message:

EDI, Equality Diversity and Inclusion. That's a bit controversial in today's polarised world. Yet in our bible reading Jesus introduces inclusion as a basic for his people. Today governments, councils, hospitals and schools are trained in EDI and required to show how their facilities and practices are available for EVERYONE, despite any differences people might have, be they physical, financial or intellectual. The Methodist Church has a mandatory training module all about it, for its staff and stewards. It recognises that the Bible is not specific on matters of equality, and contains stories of discrimination against people, of enslavement, sexual violence against women, and the equating of disability with sin. But the Church's collective understanding of God's purpose and truth has changed over time. Today we are required to be inclusive, but outside church, it's sneered at by some, called woke by others. Many people resent the idea that we should make allowances for, accept and care for everyone, especially the lowest earners.. Newspapers and politicians attack what they call benefit culture and woke culture.

Equally in this parable of the banquet Jesus shocks his listeners at the idea that societies' cripples [a word we would not use today], lame and blind should be invited to a feast. His was a culture which had strict hierarchies and ideas of honour based on status. The people Jesus said we should be inviting to a banquet were the economically inactive, who couldn't earn a living and therefore be poor, dependant on hand-outs. At the bottom of the hierarchy, they would not be able to contribute with a reciprocal meal for their host. But this is the way of God's kingdom. This is God's grace. Free and unconditional.

None of us can pay God back for what he has done. We have done nothing to deserve his grace, love and hospitality, but it is freely given us. What we can do is follow Jesus and ensure that our worship is inclusive, that our hospitality truly welcomes all and that in our lives, words and behaviour we do not discriminate, but show love and kindness to our neighbours, whoever they are. .

#### Prayer:

Lord we thank you for your generous hospitality and love. Lord, we lift to you all those who need a particular touch from you at this time. We ask you to make yourself known to them through us.

But there are other places where you are at work and living... we think of our workplaces, our homes, our schools, our communities – all places where you can be found, living and active.

When we leave this worship, open our eyes and ears to see where you are at work and impel us to follow and serve you there. Lord, thank you that we have a place at your table: show us how to welcome everyone in your name. Let's say The Lord's Prayer. **Our father....**
