These findings hold especially true for Black and Latino young men during their middle and high school years. Any solution to this crisis has elude communities across the country for decades. The Eagle Academy movement was created in 2004 to address this current epidemic. Conceived by Hundred Black Men, Inc., the Eagle Academy for Young Men is a symbol of positive change and hope for young men of color in our communities.

Eagle Ocean Hill History

From an early vision, detailed in an eighty-paged document, the Eagle Academy for Young Men at Ocean Hill would emerge. It was 2008, a time when the notion of a single gender public school was unfamiliar to most, and one specific to address the needs of young men of color in New York City was especially inconceivable. While this was good in theory, earning the trust of prospective families and convincing them that we were designed for their sons was an immense task. That September, fourteen educators rose to the occasion as our doors officially opened to sixty-five black and brown sixth-grade boys.

At the time, we did not fathom that our approach would transform urban education. Instead, we did what needed to be done. We had to be dynamic. We knew the strategy that worked on a given day may never work again. Our efforts would not always mirror what was outlined in the new school proposal, or what was prescribed protocol from Tweed. A scholar's unique circumstance had to be met with an equally unique response. This is the work! Sixteen years later, we are continuing the charge.

Over these years, we have grown from just a middle school into a 6-12, and graduated ten cohorts of young men into adulthood. Our young men have earned millions of dollars in college scholarships. They have designed community gardens and have traveled across this hemisphere for service projects. They've had internships at TV studios, investment banks, and construction sites. They have won PSAL championships. They have performed at the DNC. They have worked together to help their Eagle brothers through difficult classes and difficult moments.

At the advent of the 2025-2026 school year, we continue to reflect on a journey that has included successes and challenges, highs and lows, and caused its share of blood, sweat and tears. The challenges of Covid-19 have tested the strength of our community in ways we could have never imagined. But one thing has not changed. The enthusiasm of raising our boys to men still motivates us as it did when Eagle was merely a concept.

A structure is only as good as its foundation. At our core are committed educators, who share in the belief that a supportive school family and access to opportunity will inspire change. We are upheld by parents who believe in us as our first parents did. We are comprised of young men who identify themselves as brothers.

Eagle Ocean Hill is not confined to the building in which we operate. We are more than our mantras, more than our Five Pillars, more than our six Houses. We are a family. And we are a Brooklyn institution!



The goal of Parent Teacher Association is to enrich the experience of Eagle families through events and workshops. The PTA serves as the liaison between parents and the school, fundraises for the school, organizes educational workshops, celebrates the successes of scholars and educators, and much more.







Attendance

GOAL: Attendance will increase from 89% to 92%. Chronic absenteeism will decrease from 36% to 25%.

All scholars are expected to attend all classes on time, in full uniform, prepared with the necessary materials and ready to participate.

Attendance is a fundamental pillar of academic success and overall school achievement. Regular attendance is crucial because it ensures that scholars are consistently exposed to the curriculum and participate in the daily learning experiences that build foundational knowledge and skills. Good attendance provides opportunities for scholars to interact with educators, collaborate with peers, and receive timely feedback, all of which reinforce learning and help scholars stay on track. Furthermore, consistent attendance helps students build essential skills such as punctuality and responsibility, which are valuable both in school and in their post Eagle lives. Absences can create gaps in learning, making it harder for students to catch up, which can lead to lower academic performance and increased disengagement.

Entry procedures:

Middle school scholars begin at 8:00AM in the cafeteria. High school scholars begin at 8:00AM in the auditorium.

All scholars should enter through the Herkimer entrance doors. Scholars who get to the building before their designated start time will need to go to the auditorium.

Absences/ Check out Procedures:

Scholars must bring documentation (doctor's note, parent note) to the main office for any absences. Scholars who are absent without documentation are marked for an unexcused absence. It is the responsibility of the scholar (and his parent/guardian) to bring documentation AND get any assignments missed from all educators.

- Educators will contact parent when a scholar misses class or is tardy more than once in a week.
- Grade level counselors and scholar coordinators will reach out to families if a scholar continues to be late or absent, or if there is a pattern of frequent tardiness or absences.

Scholars who need to check out of school may only do so with documentation from a parent/ guardian and only at the appointed time. Scholars should bring the note to the office in the morning so that office staff can alert their educators.

If a scholar needs to leave school without prior documentation, their parent/guardian will need to pick them up.

Scholars are not allowed to leave campus until the end of the school day!





The Eagle uniform symbolizes the Eagle Scholar's commitment to living the Five Pillars and becoming Globally Conscious and Globally Competitive. When in proper uniform, a scholar's appearance will reflect the characteristics of a professional, motivated, and focused young man. The Eagle uniform sets the Eagle Scholar apart from students in other schools.

Families will have several options consisting of school approved uniform items. Approved uniform vendors have been designated and parents have been informed.

- Scholars are not allowed to wear cargo pants or jeans for any reason.
- Scholars are not allowed to wear hats or hoodies.

High School Uniform

Uniform Monday-Thursday: Grade-appropriate tie, School Approved Grey Slacks, Blue Oxford Shirt, Navy Blue Vest/Sweater/Half Zip.

Uniform for all scholars on Fridays: Any Eagle t-shirt, polo, jersey, hoodie, etc. Grey or khaki pants.

Middle School Uniform

Uniform Monday-Thursday: Grade-appropriate tie, School Approved Grey Slacks, Blue Oxford Shirt, Royal Blue Vest/Sweater. Scholars may earn the right to wear half zips. ALL Black Sneaker/Shoes.

Eagle Non-Negotiable Classroom Policies

To show our Commitment to Excellence and create a focused learning environment with high expectations, it is imperative that we present a united front on the top five school-wide, non-negotiable classroom policies.

The Big 5

#1 - Scholars will demonstrate confidence in their academic ability by being PRESENT EVERY DAY, ON TIME.

Scholars absent more than twice a week are considered chronically absent and will be monitored by a Guidance Counselor.

#2- Scholars will maintain a professional tone in the classroom through the use of academic language at all times.

Scholars not using professional language need to demonstrate resilience and will be redirected by scholar success team on positive reinforcement systems in a professional manner.

#3 - Scholars will show a commitment to excellence by being in full uniform at all times. If a scholar does not have his full uniform, he will be sent to 136, be given a written documentation tardy slip, and his family will be called by the end of the academic school day.

#4 - Scholars will demonstrate leadership by always positively supporting their Eagle Brothers. Scholars who make choices that tarnish our brotherhood will be sent to a grade-level scholar success team leader, depending on the situation.

#5 - Scholars will show full effort by following instructions about technology.

Scholars must lock up their phones with their House Leader or Scholar Coordinator Team when they arrive in the morning. Scholars who violate this New York State rule will have their phones confiscated.







Eagle Academy For Young Men at Ocean Hill

School Cell Phone & Electronic Device Policy

Purpose

To create an environment conducive to learning by minimizing distractions caused by cell phones and other personal internet-enabled electronic devices, ensure the safety and focus of all students during school the school day, and follow Education Law §2803, effective August 1, 2025, all New York State schools are required to adopt a policy that prohibits the use of personal internet-enabled devices during the school day on school grounds. An "internet-enabled electronic device" is defined as an electronic device capable of connecting to the internet and enabling the user to access content on the internet. Examples of such devices include cell phones, smartphones, smartwatches, laptops, tablets, iPads, and portable music and entertainment systems.

Policy Statement

Students will not be permitted to use or access their personal internet-enabled electronic devices upon arrival at school until the end of the school day. The school day is defined as the period from the moment students enter the school building until the last class of the day ends, including during lunch.

Middle School

The school day starts at **8:30am** and ends at **2:50pm**. Students will be able to use school/NYCPS-issued devices during the school day.

High School

The school day starts at **8:45am** and ends at **3:06pm**. Students will be able to use school/NYCPS-issued devices during the school day.

COLLECTION/STORAGE- MIDDLE SCHOOL

- 1. Upon arrival, students must power off their devices.
 - a. During breakfast, the grade leader/ scholar coordinator will collect the phones from their specific grade. Starting at 8:45am, grade level scholar coordinators will go to each classroom to collect them from late arrival scholars. Cell phones will be stored in the grade leader's room.
 - b. At the end of the school day, devices will be distributed by house leaders to their house scholars between **2:40pm-3:00pm**.





c. Students with approved early dismissal will retrieve their devices from their grade leader.

COLLECTION/STORAGE - HIGH SCHOOL

- 1. Upon arrival, students must power off their devices.
 - a. A designated collection point, supervised by staff members, will be set up by Room 140 and 136 and the entrance to the building, between 8:00am and 9:35am. If students arrive after this window, they will turn in the devices in Room 136.
 - b. At the end of the school day, devices will be distributed by school staff in **Room 136** between times **3:06pm and 3:30pm**.
 - c. Students with approved early dismissal will retrieve their devices in Room 136.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS

- In case of emergency or exigent circumstances, parents or guardians can call Ms.
 Chanel / Ms. Erica/ Ms. Lucy at 718-495-0863 to reach their child.
- In case of emergency or exigent circumstances, students may access phones in the **Main Office (Rm 135)** to reach their parents or guardians.
- In case of emergency or exigent circumstances, the school will use DOE Messenger to communicate information to parents or guardians.

EXCEPTIONS

- Students are allowed to use their device if they have an individualized education program (IEP) or 504 Plan that includes use of an internet-enabled device and do not have a DOE-issued device for such purpose.
- Parents/guardians must contact Ms. Chanel / Ms. Erica/ Ms. Lucy at 718-495-0863 if a student requires an exception for reasons such as: medical monitoring/treatments (for example to monitor blood sugar or other similar circumstances), if student is a caregiver, for approved language purposes (such as translation or interpretation services if no other means are available), or where otherwise required by law.
- The principal/designee may authorize use for an educational purpose.
- Exceptions will be processed and approved within 5-7 academic school days.

DISCIPLINE

Students who use electronic devices in violation of the NYCPS <u>Discipline Code</u>, the school's policy, Chancellor's Regulation A-413, and/or the NYCPS <u>Internet Acceptable Use and Safety Policy</u> ("IAUSP") will be subject to progressive discipline. This means that the disciplinary responses will escalate based on the nature and frequency of the violation. As provided in the State law, a student may not be suspended solely on the grounds that the student accessed a personal internet-enabled device in violation of





school policy. Repeated incidents of insubordination (i.e. refusal to surrender or store devices) **may** result in a suspension **if approved** by the Office of Safety and Youth Development.

Eagle School-Wide Grading Policy

Educators are expected to update grades weekly. Each week, there should be 3-5 new assignments added to **Jupiter Grades**. The grades should be an accurate record of scholars' work.

It is crucial that grades are updated and accurate so scholars, parents, guidance counselors, scholar coordinators, House leaders, coaches, etc. can track scholars' progress.

For specific dates Report card are given at the end of each Marking Period (approximately 6 weeks). Progress Report will be site out mid-Marking Period. Grades for these will be pulled from Jupiter Grades. for report cards and progress reports, please see our Report Card Page.

ASSESSMENTS & EXTENDED WRITING ASSIGNMENTS







The <u>Career & Technical Arc</u> is designed for scholars to take full advantage of the career and technical training we offer. On top of completing the necessary Regents and credit requirements, scholars on this arc are expected to complete the requirements for the CDOS Commencement Credential, which means choice. Scholars on this arc are still provided with all the same college preparation afforded to scholars on our other tracks and are expected to apply to at least SUNY and CUNY schools. they will complete work-based learning, sit for work-readiness assessments in their field, and graduate ready for entry-level positions in the field of their



They have the opportunity to engage in all our CTE programs and External Learning Opportunities. They are required to meet the college-ready scores of at least 75% on both the English and Algebra I Regents. The Scholar-Athlete Arc is designed to ensure that scholars who want to play sports in college are fulfilling the NCAA requirements during high school in order to be eligible to play Division 1, 2, or 3. Scholars are given the all the same college and career opportunities as those on the Early College Arc.

High School-Wide Academic Policies

We must be a united front to support our scholars in meeting the high expectations we hold for them. To that end, it is expected that every Eagle Educator enforce the same academic policies with all scholars.

Course Syllabus

On the first day of class, educators will provide scholars with a course syllabus, containing the following information:

- Contact information and office hours
- · Course description, course objectives, and essential questions
- Unit Sequence
- Eagle Common Grading criteria & Late-Work Policy (see grading policy)
- Required materials
- Classroom rules and expectations
- Any other course-specific information

Google Classroom & Late Work Policy

Educators are expected to give scholars plenty of warning about assignments and quizzes by posting them on Jupiter Grades with the due date at least 1 week in advance. This will allow scholars to plan ahead with their work. Following that, here is the updated late work policy.

*Exception: If a scholar is absent on the due date but demonstrates COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE and turns in the assignment with documentation of the absence (i.e. doctor/parent note, PSAL game schedule, trip slip, etc.) the the assignment will be accepted for full credit.

Eagle Success Tracker (Academic Probation)

If scholar is failing **two or more classes** on his report card, he will be assigned an Eagle Success Tracker through his counselor. The counselor will provide the scholar his Success Tracker in the morning and touch base/debrief the day with the scholar periodically during the day. The next morning, the counselor will collect the previous day's tracker (signed by the parent) and provide a new one for the day.

Cheating/ Academic Integrity

Academic Integrity is a value that represents our Commitment to Excellence. Turning in work that is NOT your own goes against the values of Eagle Academy. Scholars that do not uphold our policy of academic integrity and instead engage in cheating, plagiarizing, submitting work that is not their own, utilizing AI to get answers, ignoring exam protocols, etc. will receive NO CREDIT for the assignment in question and their parent will be notified.

High School AP and Honors Class Admission Policy

We have created clear policies around admission into advanced placement and honors classes, so scholars understand what is expected of them in these more challenging courses.



CDOS Work-Based Learning

High School Scholars who want to demonstrate that they are ready to enter the Workforce can earn a CDOS credential during high school. To earn the CDOS credential, scholars must take at least 3 CTE courses and have 54 hours of work-based learning.

Scholars in the second semester of 12th grade complete an internship for their work-based learning. Typically they work 5-10 hours per week. To qualify, scholars must commit to following through, learning from their boss, and reflecting on their growth as a worker. Some examples of Eagle CDOS Internships include working with Turner Construction, the Campaign Against Hunger, the YMCA, the Fresh Air Fund, etc.

Mr. Holman is the point of contact and supervisor of our CDOS program.

Employability Profile

High School Scholars complete their 54 hours of work-based learning in the form of an internship. They are rated by their Employer on the Employability Profile. The Profile rates scholars in the following areas. Scholars must show growth in all 3 areas.

Extended Learning Opportunities or ELOs have been essential to getting our young men to go beyond the classroom and see the real world. Some go on trips abroad to experience life in another country, some have mentors from multi-billion dollar firms, and some get a glimpse at a different part of New York City.

College Now (Ms. Lesane/ Mr. Holman) is CUNY's largest collaborative program with the New York City secondary public school system. The program offers dual enrollment and college-readiness programs in more than 400 NYC high schools and enrolls over 20,000 students annually. In all, there are seventeen campus-based College Now programs, which are overseen by a central office.

Summer Search (Mr. Holman)- Our young men, or Summer Searchers as they are often referred, speak with their mentors on a weekly basis to discuss issues ranging from family dynamics to post-secondary academic and career goals. The Summer Search model is to promote self-awareness, self-advocacy, self-respect, preparation and confidence.

Global Glimpse (Mr. Pal) has continued providing our young men with opportunity to travel abroad to see various cultures. In the summer of 2016, our Eagle young men went to the Dominican Republic and Ecuador, where they provided assistance in impoverished communities. The 3-week trip also included a cultural component, where they guys learned about specific customs. Over 90% percent of the participants in Global Glimpse wrote their college personal statement on their experience abroad!

The Blackstone Group (Ms. Harris) is a multi-billion dollar global investment, investment banking, and private equity firm, which has partnered with the Eagle Academy since 2008. Through this partnership, Eagle Scholars have participated in student work programs, exclusive trips and events, as well as countless other opportunities. Since 2011, Blackstone staff has provided monthly college and career mentorship to Eagle scholars. At present, 25 juniors and seniors received guidance on the college and career opportunities they will pursue after leaving Eagle. Blackstone has also supported Eagle through their assistance with the expansion of our music and lacrosse programs. Furthermore, Blackstone donated \$20,000 for the purpose of creating our first computer lab.

Turner Construction (Mr. Holman) is a leading global construction firm specializing in large scale commercial projects. Since 2013, they have partnered with the Eagle Academies in Brooklyn and the Bronx to provide on-to-one and group mentorship to juniors and seniors. They have provided paid internships to a number of eligible Ocean Hill scholars over the past four years.

In conjunction with **Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America (Mr. Holman)**, our scholars participated in Moody's mentorship program to increase networking and interviewing strategies. Our young men learned the necessary soft skills in order to compete in the corporate sector. 35 account executives visited our school and to conduct interviews to determine if our guys were up to dealing with corporate life. They all did an amazing job, and are now on the radar for internships after completing one year of college.

Kings Against Violence Initiative, Inc. (KAVI) (Mr. Holman), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that has been conducting youth violence intervention and prevention programs in school, community, and hospital settings for over 13 years, is submitting an application for the NYC Enhancing School Capacity to Reduce Youth Violence Project (NYC Reduce School Violence Project) in response to the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Program (OJJDP) Request for Applications for Enhancing School Capacity to Address Youth Violence.

Brownsville In, Violence Out (Mr. Holman) is an anti-gun violence initiative serving the 73rd police precinct of Brownsville Brooklyn and is a part of The Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice Crisis Management System. BIVO provides participants with a variety of supportive services, including job training programs and access to employment, legal and therapeutic services, as well as school conflict mediation.

PSAL Athletic Policy

Scholastic Eligibility has 2 parts.

Part 1: The 5+1 Rule

- A student must pass FIVE credit-bearing subjects plus physical education, if taken, on the most recent Report Card (October, January, March, June) in order to be eligible.
- At least three of the five subjects passed must be core subjects (English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Foreign Language or Science).
- A student who is ineligible may become scholastically eligible by passing five credit-bearing subjects plus physical education on the next report card.
- The date all report cards are issued in a school at the end of a marking period shall be the official date for determining eligibility.

Part 2: The 10 Credit Rule

A student must accumulate a minimum of ten credits (not including physical education) for the two semesters prior to the
eligibility period. Night School and Summer School are included in this calculation. This rule will be in effect beginning
with a student's third semester in high school.

General Scholastic Guidelines

- 1. GPA must be 65%.
- 2. A scholastically ineligible student may practice with the team as an incentive for him/her to establish eligibility.
- Any student who is scholastically ineligible at the start of the season, or becomes scholastically ineligible, may practice
 with the team provided the student is on the roster as "Inactive."
- If a student cannot reestablish eligibility by the end of the season, the student is not permitted to practice with the team.
- All athletes listed on the roster as Inactive may not participate in scrimmages, non-league games or regularly scheduled games.

Attendance Eligibility

- At the end of each marking period, a student must achieve, at a minimum, 90% attendance in order to be considered
 for athletic eligibility for the next marking period.
- A student must be present in school and must attend all assigned classes in order to participate in any team practice, scrimmage, league or non-league game, meet, contest or try-out on that day (unless excused and approved as a bona fide absence).
- A student with less than 90% attendance at the end of any marking period is ineligible, but can establish attendance eligibility when the next report card is issued.
- A student who has been declared ineligible for failure to meet the 90% minimum attendance requirement and who reestablishes eligibility when the next report card is issued must maintain a minimum of 90% attendance for every
 consecutive ten-day period for the duration of the term. When a student fails to meet this requirement, he/she
 immediately becomes ineligible for the remainder of the term.
- Suspended students are not eligible to participate in any team practice, scrimmage, league or non-league game, meet, contest or try-out during the period of their suspension.

Ineligible Student Penalties

- For team sports, if an ineligible student is listed on the roster as active, and/or participates in any interscholastic contest, the team with the ineligible player shall forfeit the contest.
- If the offending team has gone on to compete in the playoffs, they will **forfeit** their **last** playoff contest (including the championship).

Eagle Academy Athletic Conduct Cards and Communication

The athletic program at Eagle Ocean Hill is designed to enhance each scholar's athleticism and self-esteem by emphasizing skill development and physical conditioning. The athletic program provides a value-building experience in which students strive for physical and mental excellence. Athletics are an excellent means of bringing together home, school, and community, and are considered an integral part of our school experience.

This system of accountability has been revised to more accurately assess a scholar's daily academic and behavioral performance. Each educator must initial and place a check in the designated space if a scholar athlete met the standard in each of the identified indicators. If a scholar athlete does meet the standard, the letter "COACH" must be written in the slot. Below, you will find the conduct card that needs to be completed by educators daily.

Uniform Consequence

If a scholar athlete fails to wear his uniform, he will be required to do extra drills. If this is a consistent infraction, he will also not be allowed to play in the next game; he will be required to attend the game and be benched.

Additional Policy Information

- If a scholar athlete loses his conduct card, he will sit during practice that day and will receive other consequences depending on the situation.
- If a scholar athlete is absent from school, he may not participate in any practice or game that day.

Disrespect/Behavior Consequence If a scholar athlete is disrespectful or misbehaves in any way, an educator should write "COACH" instead of their initials. The educator should contact the scholar's coach before end of day to explain the situation. Both coach and educator will decide the corrective action. If necessary, the coach will discuss with admin to determine what further disciplinary action will take place.

HW/CW Consequences

If a scholar athlete does not complete 100% of their HW or CW, the educator should write the letter "X" in the designated space. If this space is marked, the scholar athlete will sit during practice time and make up the assignment. After completing the missed assignment he will be cleared to join practice. If a scholar athlete fails to follow this process, he will risk suspension or removal from the team.

Communication

Communication between coach, athlete and parent is key to success.
