

Is It time For A New Tradition?

The history of the Mayville Alumni Association is a long one, and that is a fact, at least according to what has been passed down throughout the years. When three alumni decided to meet in 1887, that was the beginning of what has been recognized as the oldest active Alumni Association in the state of Michigan. The state of Michigan even acknowledged the Alumni Association in May of 1997 by adopting House Resolution No. 69 in the House of Representatives. They gave the Alumni Association a copy of the resolution, complete with a gold seal as a “token” of their esteem.

As many Alumni like to say, “*The annual Alumni Banquet Dinner is a tradition!*” No argument there, however, the “tradition” has changed several times over the years – and along with those changes have come the challenge of adapting and keeping the Alumni Association alive and functioning.

Throughout the years the Alumni Association has continued to host a dinner and honor those who worked and graduated from Mayville Schools - teachers, school employees and the 25-year and 50-year graduates. Those long-ago dinners in the very early 1900’s consisted of fancy china plates and dishes along with snowy white linens, as well as music and dancing, and they were said to be very “formal” affairs. Alumni Banquet dinners of the past saw large crowds of 200 and even 300 attendees in some years. A record 600 people turned out to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Alumni Banquet in 1987, and the Mayville Monitor even published front page news of the big event that year.

The venues changed from the Masonic Hall and the Mayville Opera House to the new High School Auditorium in 1935 and in the 1960’s the dinner was moved to the Elementary School, resulting in the music and the dancing portion of the program being dropped. Sometime in the 70’s the Banquet moved to the High School Cafeteria and finally to the High School Gym, where the last Alumni Dinner was held in 2019.

At the 2019 Alumni Dinner the Class of 1969 was honored and there were 29 class members present. The Class of 1994, the 25-year graduates, had three members attending. The years 2020 and 2021

saw the Alumni Dinner cancelled due to the fiasco that resulted from the Covid virus.

The next time the Mayville Alumni Association hosted an event was in June of 2022. Due to cost factors and the unavailability of a catering service, the decision was made to offer cookies and refreshments, outside the old High School auditorium following the program, rather than host a dinner. Approximately 125 people turned out to honor a total of six different years of Mayville Graduates.

The classes of 1970, 1971 and 1972 were recognized as the 50-year graduates and from those three classes there was a combined total of 52 Alumni who received Golden Diplomas. Of the three 25-year graduate classes - 1995, 1996 and 1997, only three members of the Class of 1995 attended.

A record low turnout in 2023 coupled with a few grumblings that reached the ears of the Alumni Association in the later days and weeks, would be a good indication that it is time for a change. When something isn’t working and the results aren’t good, do you continue to do the same thing, or do you look for a better alternative?

There is no question that we can’t go back to sit down dinners in the old gym. There aren’t enough hands to do the work it takes to set up tables and chairs and put out the decorations and then do the clean-up following the dinner. The cost of that scenario isn’t desirable either. Then again, is putting on a program to honor only a handful of Alumni and serving cookies and punch that most people pass up – is that the way to go?

It has been said that the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again, but expecting a different result – do we continue the insanity, or is it time to invent a new tradition?

What do you think?



If you attended Mayville High School in the 1970's anytime through the year 2010, then chances are good that you know Sheila Lambert and Marie Curell.

Sheila was born and raised in Marlette, Michigan and graduated from Marlette High School.

In January of 1970 Sheila was interviewed and hired by the Mayville Community Schools. She hadn't even graduated from Central Michigan University, or done her student teaching at that point. In her own words,

"It was love at first visit!!! I immediately felt at home!!!"



Sheila began teaching at Mayville Schools in the fall of 1970 and retired from Mayville Schools and from teaching in 2000. The subjects she taught were HS Home Economics, HS Chemistry and MS Math.

Sheila and her husband Tom currently reside near Marlette and Sheila is still very busy. She is part of several Marlette Regional Hospital Committees, the Marlette Chamber of Commerce and several of their committees, as well as the General Federation of Women's Clubs in Marlette and at the District level.

Sheila began attending various class reunions with Marie Curell in 2021. She says that she loves seeing her former students at these reunions and has even ran into former students on her travels with husband Tom in Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Missouri and Nevada.

She has a lot of fond memories of her time teaching at Mayville and says that,

"My happiest years were at Mayville!!!"

Marie Curell began her teaching career at Mayville in 1974 and remained with Mayville schools until her retirement in 2010.

During her 36 years at Mayville Schools, Marie taught a variety of subjects: Many: P.E., Health, 1 year Physical Science, Advanced Health, Anatomy & Physiology, Weight Training, Alternative Education, Animal Science (Jr. High Exploratory).

Marie currently resides in the North Branch area and continues to be very busy serving on several committees and working with the 4H club.

She presently serves as the North Branch Township Treasurer, the North Branch Finish Line Livestock Administrative Leader and Swine Project Leader as well as the North Branch Schools Equestrian Team Coach and as a MIHA (Michigan Interscholastic Horsemanship Association) District 14 Chairmen.

Last year Marie received the **Michigan Farm Bureau 4-H Excellence in Agriculture Award** on Sept. 30 during the Michigan 4-H Legacy Awards Celebration. The event was hosted by Michigan State University Extension and the Michigan 4-H Foundation in East Lansing.

Sheila and Marie began attending Class Reunions several years ago and Marie says, that she can recognize names and voices of former students, but not faces so much.



When ask about her time at Mayville Schools, Marie had this to say,

"My entire teaching career was spent at Mayville Schools. It was a major part of my life for 36 years. I am grateful for those years and their memories."

Eight Novels Flowed From One To The Next

I didn't set out to become a novelist and write eight books. They just kind of happened as a natural progression of events in my work life.

Let me explain. I was a journalist for 40 years. It was a great career and a good life. But I saw the end coming for daily newspapers. I knew that part of my life was screeching to a halt. I wasn't worried about making a living. I knew I could find a job and keep working until retirement. That wasn't a concern. But what did worry me was finding a way to remain creative and feed my need to write, something I've been doing for as long as I can remember.

My desire to write goes back to my days as a kid on a farm in Silverwood, a small town seven miles east of Mayville. I absolutely loved the Detroit Tigers. Throughout the season, a radio at our place was regularly tuned into the games. I yearned to write about the Tigers like the sports reporters at the Detroit News and Free Press did. My dad, also a big fan, encouraged me to write about each game and then we'd compare my stories to what appeared in the newspapers the next day. I got really good at it, which prompted me to try my hand at writing about Mayville High School sports events as a teenager.

The Mayville Monitor agreed to give me a try. For each story accepted, I was paid \$5 – a good weekly newspaper free-lance fee for the 1960s. I was ecstatic. The Monitor and the school were supportive. I recall my first interview was with varsity football coach Terry TerBush, who I learned was a stickler for statistics and accurate quotations. I learned as much from Coach TerBush during our interviews as his guys did out on the field.

I was allowed to write about all sports that I did not participate in, which, in my case, ruled out basketball and baseball. In addition to football, I wrote about cross-country and track. It was great fun, and I learned the very basics of reporting.

But my development as a journalist actually advanced in the classrooms of Mayville High School. In the 1960s, we had an array of young, smart teachers who had just come out of universities

where the social issues of the day – civil rights, women's rights, war in Vietnam, the military draft, politics, and drugs – raged on campuses in ways that were not familiar to daily country and farm life in small towns like Mayville.

As young students, we only saw the volatility of the day on TV news broadcasts and in newspapers. We didn't live it or experience it. But many of our high school teachers had been right in the middle of it and they encouraged vigorous discussion of current events, including those sometimes very controversial issues. Our teachers pushed us for critical thinking. They urged us not to simply accept the common practice of the day or dogma of politics.

And one of our veteran teachers, Mrs. Ewing, taught civics – examining the role of government in our every day lives. She encouraged us to evaluate that role and become active participants in government at all levels. I recall dynamic discussions in her class, particularly in regard to the growing protests on college campuses across the country, culminating in the Kent State shooting of students by members of the Ohio National Guard in May 1970 – just before our class was set to graduate.

Those four years of high school in Mayville helped shape me as a journalist and I was always grateful for the educational opportunities I had. And, of course, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the role teacher Robert Warren played in my development as a writer and journalist. He kicked me in the pants to improve my reporting and writing skills at every turn. I'll never forget his parting words to me just before graduation: "You have serious writing talent and I'm going to be very pissed off if you don't develop it and become a professional writer at some level."

From there, I wrote for my college newspaper for two years. When I enlisted in the U.S. Marines, I was sent to combat correspondent's school. But instead of getting orders to the front lines in Vietnam, I was blessed and ended up as the editor of a base newspaper in South Carolina. During my final year at Wayne State University, I earned a reporting internship at the Detroit News. Later, I

was hired by The Flint Journal to cover the UAW and the auto industry. From there, I was promoted to features editor and then managing editor at The Bay City Times.

Like I mentioned earlier, it was a great career, and I loved every minute of it. When newspapering began its long, slow, death march, I decided to fulfill a bucket-list item – write a novel. Now, lots of people declare they're going to write a novel or place it on their bucket lists, but very few do.

With that in mind, I started writing my first story, *A Formula for Murder*, with Nick Steele as my protagonist reporter. Within the first 500 words, I realized I had no idea what I was doing. It became clear that I had to learn a different kind of writing, which pushed me to attend three week-long seminars of the American Mystery Writers Association.

It took almost five years to complete *A Formula for Murder* and I had no expectations for the book. I checked "Write Novel" off the bucket list and moved on. But to my surprise, the book was very-well received, and I started getting emails from readers who wanted to know when the next novel was coming out.

In the back of my mind, I was tinkering around with another story idea, so I started writing *A Grand Murder*, which took just over two years to write. It did even better than the first book, so I started a third – *Murder in the Wind*, which also did very well with readers. By now, I believed I had the making of a very good series in the works. Plus, I had begun loving the process and my need to write was being satiated.

Since then, I've completed and published a total of seven novels – the Nick Steele Mystery Series. Each story simply flowed from one to the next. And just as I started working on book number eight, I connected with Mission Point Press, the noted and acclaimed publishing house in Traverse City.

When I finished writing novel eight on April 4, it took seven weeks to write. Mission Point Press read the book and accepted the manuscript. The publisher now has my new novel, *Mackinac Murder – Pipe Dream of Terror*, scheduled for release in October.


My first book took five years to write, and my latest took seven weeks to complete. Who says old dogs can't learn new tricks?

My boyhood home was on an 80-acre farm about 6 miles south of Mayville. After a few years away from the area, for military and the years getting settled back into society, my wife and I purchased a home and settled just two miles south of my dad and his wife Hazel and my boyhood farm. I have lived in the Fostoria, Mayville, and North Branch area all but about 8 years of my 75 years.

Whenever I went into any of the local towns it was not uncommon to see groups of 2, 3 or 4 people chatting and laughing in the stores, parking lots, restaurants or, on downtown sidewalks. It didn't matter whether it was winter or summer. The conversations were just shorter in winter. In Fostoria the groups were smaller, but still there, in front of the grocery store, tavern or the Tribesmen Motorcycle club house. If you caught someone's eye in passing you had to be quick to give your greeting nod before they did. Seeing people in a hurry was rare. The front door of the local taverns was often left wide open to release the aroma of beer and cigarette smoke to anyone passing by. Maybe you

couldn't understand the conversations but you could surely hear the laughter.

When I attended Mayville junior high and high school from 1958 to 1963, I played sports, but football was my game. My dad wasn't available to transport me back and forth to practice or the games so between the time I got out of school and the Friday night games I would often get invites to stay with one of my in-town teammates. Some nights after a game I occasionally walked home or caught a ride with the parents of the other players that happened to be going my way. I stayed with many families throughout those years. There were several times when I stayed overnight after a game and had to find my way home Saturday morning. No matter where I stayed, I was always welcomed. I was treated like family, maybe better.

All the years we lived in the area, before and during my adult years, we never locked our doors to the house or the car. Keys were often left in the car's ignition at home. When I stayed with classmates in town we would simply walk into homes with just a twist of a knob, no key needed. There was one family in Fostoria where every kid in town just walked in through front screen door. It was home to all the kids whether they lived in town or not.

I am always amazed at how many alumni returned to teach the upcoming Wildcats. Many families often returned to the area after being away for a while, some to retire. Some families never leave. Family heritage has lingered. It's pleasing to hear familiar family names still around that are from my own era in those two small towns. There's a reason people stay or return.

Being a good parent is difficult. It takes a lot of work. But it is rewarding to both you, the parent and the child and the rewards are great. Your children want to be with you because they enjoy being with you, and you enjoy them. It's simple. Being a good parent produces good people and productive members of society and a pleasure to have around.


