

A Note From the Alumni Board - "Why No Dinner This Year?

Many alumni are asking why there was a decision made NOT to have a dinner this year in 2022, as has been done in the past. Several reasons— first and foremost was the cost—at \$40 a person, the Alumni Board members felt this was just too much. Several Alumni have noted that \$40 is not too much to pay for a nice dinner. What most people fail to realize is that the \$40 charge, just isn't for the food. There are other costs that the Alumni must cover at each dinner.

There is a cost to rent the tables, chairs, table coverings and the small platform that is used to elevate the speaker so everyone seated in the gym can see. There is a cost to cover printing the Historian paper that is given out to each Alumni at the dinner, as well as the programs. In addition, there is a cost to have the Lion's Club members help serve and a cost for the school janitor. All these costs must be combined into the price of that each attendee is charged. This year the cost of food was \$23.50 a plate, for the very basics, not including the cake. Tables and chairs were a total of \$1100. Add that to the printing costs, the money to be paid to the Lion's Club and the rest, and you get a price that the Alumni Board felt was too high for a majority of people.

The Alumni Association does not make any money off the Annual Dinner—if lucky, there is a break-even, if not, then the extra funds come out of the General Fund, which has a very small operating budget. Not only is the cost an issue, but setting up all the tables, chairs and decorations falls to a very few people, who following the banquet must break everything down and clean up.

If you are one of those people who want to see the dinner brought back, then perhaps joining the Alumni Board and lending a hand and a voice is something you should consider. More help is always appreciated!

Women from the Mayville Class of '70 nurtured a sisterhood to create a lifelong bond

This assignment for the Alumni Historian was simple: Write about a group of former Mayville High School students who stayed connected for years after graduation.

Piece of cake. Instantly, I knew I had the perfect subjects to write about. My own Class of 1970 had just such a group. They call themselves the Wingnuts (more on that later) and have stayed close to one another for more than 50 years.

I connected with the group and met with them during one of their monthly luncheons. I must say I was pretty nervous meeting them. I was older, fatter, grayer, and creating new wrinkles at record speed. Self-doubt gnawed at me like a tiger having a cheetah over for lunch. Would my old school mates shun me and run away in horror at the mere sight of an aging teddy bear?

They did not. To my relief, I enjoyed hugs and warm greetings all around. I felt ashamed that I thought the Wingnuts would be anything less than charming and graceful. They were delightful and clearly eager to see each other and spend a long luncheon together.

The first order of business for the group after the initial greeting chatter died down was a round-robin discussion where each member updated the others on what had occurred in their lives since the last time they had met. Each had plenty to share from their robust lives, and all seemed excited to absorb every detail. It was delightful to watch, and these ladies are even funnier and livelier than I had remembered.

In no particular order, please allow me to introduce you to the Wingnuts: Penny Lynch Wallace of Okemos, Joanne Wenta Metcalf of Davison, Sherry Malkowskli Mocniak of Lapeer, Deborah Tompkins Shadley of Mayville, Debbie Robinson Lorenz of Davison, Denise Robinson Serr of Flint, Harriet Grzyb Long of Lake, Dorlis Haver of Lansing, and Suzette Silvernail Dougovito of Lapeer.

Over time, the lives of the Wingnuts took flight. They became accomplished nurses, teachers, health-care providers, auto industry employees, artists, poets, State of Michigan officials, moms, wives and grandmothers. They stuck together – sometimes only through letters and phone calls – through the roller coaster we all know as life.

Sometimes, life can feel overwhelming, but the Wingnuts rally for each other.

"They surprised me at my retirement party, cried with me at my dad's funeral, helped cope with divorce," said Deb Shadley. "I can count on this group of besties

for life. What a beautiful bond. I've had to call Suzette or Joanne for nursing advice. And Suzette even made a house call when I panicked over a situation my husband had after surgery. We laugh together, we problem-solve together – we are never alone."

For most of the Wingnuts, their bond began to forge eons ago when they were kids. Fostoria is a key location for the group. Joanne and Janet Wenta grew up with the Robinson twins. Harriet and Dorlis lived nearby. They met and became friends with other members of the group when the country schools closed and Mayville welcomed kids from the sticks to town.

"I met them in the seventh grade when our country school closed. Never knew any of them before that," said Suzette Dougovito. "We are now truly best friends that are there for each other through thick and thin. There is nothing we would not do for each other."

Sherry Mocniak remembers some of the group from kindergarten. "I met some in third and fourth grades when we went to Fostoria while the elementary school was being built, and some in junior high when the country schools closed."

As the years have piled one on top of another, Sherry says she feels tighter with the Wingnuts than ever. "I feel closer, more trusting and I feel that I know them better now. I even like them more."

Love, as we all know, is a loaded word. It has so many different meanings and levels for each of us. But love is a word that many members of the Wingnuts are comfortable using when talking about each other.

"I think there are different levels of love, and our group has a special love that keeps us together," said Denise Serr. "To explain that, it's like when there is someone special in your life that's not next to you physically, yet is always present in the back of your head and in your heart. That's a special love, and that's what this group's love is like."

Suzette believes the group's unity is special because of the effort each member makes to enhance and improve their cohesiveness. "Our open honesty with each other is key. Except for Denise, we've all been through divorce and other life crisis. We all became closer and began to understand who we are as individuals. Seems with life lessons, we each understand more deeply who we are. Our group is special because of the love we share for each other and our commitment to stay connected no matter what." continued on page 9

Joanne agrees. She says the lives of the Wingnuts became intermingled. "Because of our shared history, the stories of our lives were mixed with family events, births, deaths, health issues, and age-related milestones. Our sisterhood became stronger as we became older and experienced life's ups and downs.

"I have lost both parents and my brother," Joanne continued. "With each loss, these friends reached out to support me with calls, cards, letters. Maybe even a little wine, too. Ha! They cared and took the time and made the effort to show it."

Time, which is often our enemy, seems to have strengthened the Wingnut's bond. Penny Wallace says the group has grown closer in the last 10 years, especially as more members retired.

"I have contact with at least one member every week," Penny said. "It's so nice to have true friends who applaud your successes and commiserate with your losses. We have such a strong bond from our shared experiences – Mayville, the school, sports, band, cheerleading, teachers."

The Wingnuts are not a private club or exclusive. Hey, they invited me to join them so I got to believe the bar for admission is pretty low. Pretty much anybody with a Mayville High School pedigree can join the sisters. "We'd definitely like to open it up more and have others join us," Penny said.

So, I know you're dying to know where the name "Wingnuts" came from. It came about suddenly, and naturally, when members of the group joked with each other that they would one day all end up crazy and in a wing of a nursing home together. Hence, Wingnuts became their moniker. I'm not positive, but my guess is that alcohol may have been a factor leading up to the vote.

This group likes to have fun. They are definitely sisters, but no one would mistake them for nuns.

To help complete this assignment, I asked each member of the group to respond to a short survey of questions. They responded with great spirit and energy, or you would be staring at a blank page.

I also asked Denise, the group's resident poet, to write about her sisters, this group of remarkable women. I think she nailed it with this poem.



Cycling Through Life – A Trip Around School

In 2010 I purchased a fairly nice 21-speed bicycle as a reward to myself for quitting smoking. I spent about five years riding around Millington, North Lake, Otter Lake, Columbiaville, North Branch, and of course Mayville. I started riding for the exercise but found the social aspect of riding the most rewarding. I would stop and visit with neighbors who happen to be out in their yards when I would have otherwise driven my car past without a word. I visited old relatives, friends, and classmates I hadn't seen in fifty years or more. Some of those are no longer here to reminisce with ever again. The relatives I spoke with shared information about their families that I never knew.

One of my last bicycle rides, before we moved to Florida, was to Mayville and around my old and, in my day, the only school in town which included all the grades K-12. As I rode past the north entrance, I recalled the time when all the buses would be parked in a line on W. High St waiting to return students to their homes, most of them to their family farms. The bus ride home seemed to take forever. We lived on the southernmost end of the route, so it was one of the last stops for our longtime bus driver, Steve Barkowska. If you didn't behave on Mr. Barkowska's bus he would boot you off the bus and you'd have to walk the rest of the way. I do remember him taking my older brother, Tom by the collar escorting him off to walk home. Fortunately for Tom that was only a half-mile.

After passing the north entrance I passed the doors to the old school gym which doubled as a cafeteria and auditorium with a stage. It was where we had our assemblies, pep rallies, Friday night football home game dances, gym class, and Saturday night DJ dances with 'TJ the DJ' from Flint's WTAC - "600 on your radio dial". As I rode past the gym entrance to the west, I noticed more school buildings where a parking lot once was. The parking lot was where many teachers parked and if you were lucky enough to drive to school, students parked.

I next turned south on Fox Street and continued riding around the south side of the school where the playground once was, where we played on swings, teeter-totters, and monkey bars during class recess. Now, a blacktopped parking lot was in its place. Just beyond and to the south was the hill that ends where what is now the new high school and accompanying parking lot is. In the winter months, we would slide down that hill, had snowball fights, and during the fall months we played pickup football and baseball games. The middle school's south entrance was where buses dropped off students in the mornings. After getting off the bus we'd step inside to the sounds clanking and banging of school lockers echoing through the halls as students readied for their homeroom classes. Not much talking. We were too sleepy to talk much. As the halls filled with the incoming students so did the halls fill with chatter.

I then rode around the new high school, through the parking lot by the south entrance, past the tennis and outdoor basketball courts. To my left was that dreaded hill coach Ralston had us run to the top to get the football team in shape for the upcoming season's games. Straight ahead was the 'Lion's Den' with the locker room smells and the cold dampness of its cinder block walls. I just stopped and stared at the entrance, remembering the pre-game readiness and halftime speeches from coaches Rolston, Hill, Titus, and McSherry to name a few. Straight ahead and a short distance was the baseball diamond, the only baseball

diamond at that time. Just to the south of the 'Lion's I sat there soaking up memories a while longer before Den' was the football field. Ah, football season was my favorite time of year and for years after high school, the fall season's cool weather still takes me back there.

I rode around on the track that still surrounds the football field and stopped at the bleachers at the south side, the Wildcats side of the field. I played halfback and center linebacker, jersey number 12. As I sat looking at the empty field, I had flashback memories of my days on that field and especially the night of our Homecoming game against Reese on Friday night, October 11, 1963, when we pulled off an upset against Reese in the last 30 seconds of the game-winning 13-12 with a 70-yard pass from quarterback Larry Lamiman to the fastest guy on the team, tight end Jim Plain. That day is my most memorable school day of all. Both Larry and Jim are gone now as well as a few others of those days of maroon and white games. In my mind, they are all still as young as they were in 1963.

continuing my ride out past the 'new' high school and south onto Fulton Street towards home.
