



Mayville class ring, missing for half century, recovered

When Susan Tompkins' Mayville High School class ring slipped off her finger one day in 1969, it fell into an abyss, the bottomless black hole where all lost class rings seemingly land, and remained there for 54 years.

The gold beauty, ornate with a classic block M, sparkling blue stone, the graduation year of 1968, and the initials, S.T., finally made it back to the ring finger of Susan Tompkins Fox earlier this year. When recovered, the treasured piece of jewelry slid perfectly back into place where it belonged.

Needless to say, Susan was elated to get her ring back after it had gone missing for more than a half century.

She had purchased it in 1967 during her junior year with her own money from working the summer as "a go-fer" for the late, great Mr. Lamiman, Mayville High School principal.

"I was humbled and grateful to be a student at Mayville High School," Susan said in an email detailing the recovery of her prized piece of jewelry. She and husband, AI (Mayville Class of 1967), reside in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. "The ring was a symbol of those Wildcat feelings."

The tradition of class rings in America goes way back to 1835 when the U.S. Military Academy at West Point issued

graduation rings to successful cadets.

Since then, the tradition has spread through colleges and high schools to the point where it's estimated that nearly 50 percent of high school grads purchased class rings in the mid-1980s. Today, Jostens, the nation's largest producer of class jewelry, says that number has fallen to about 20 percent of students.

Each year, an unknown number of class rings, like all jewelry, goes missing. That's one of the driving forces behind record annual sales of metal detectors. It's also why Jostens, and several others, sponsors a Lost Class Ring Registry on the Internet. Many rings fall into the abyss and never make it out, leaving owners broken hearted and disenchanted.

During the 1960s, receiving a high school class graduation ring was deemed a high honor, a genuine prize for a job well done in the pursuit of accomplishing one of life's first major goals.

Susan was so proud of her Mayville class ring, she wore it every day. It was always with her – until one day in 1969 when it slipped away, falling into the black hole of lost gems.

"I had worked a summer waitstaff job at Zehnders of Frankenuth, and one day it was just gone," she said. "I quizzed fellow waitresses, friends, and family members. No ring."

Had the golden rock fallen into a bowl of chicken gravy? Did it make a pot of mashed spuds a little lumpy, extra crunchy? Had it become the final seasoning in a dish of dressing? Nope.

But no one really had a clue to what happened to the ring. No one knew where it went.

"I figured it would just appear in some obscure place," Susan said, always brimming with optimism. "Someday it would reappear, sooner rather than later, though."

Fast forward more than 50 years. The story of discovery started when Susan was contacted by her daughter, Kimberly Fox Fanelli, who had spotted a Facebook post from a Mayville Alumni Association member who wanted to know the whereabouts of Susan Tompkins. Why, Kimberly wondered?

A class ring had been found with indicators that it might be Susan's long-lost treasure: initials, graduation date, block M, as well as the location of the discovery. It all added up. Susan's lost ring had been found.

The ring had ended up in a Frankenmuth resale shop. Owner Faye Morrison reported that she had won a bid in a Vassar auction for a box of unknown "stuff."

Wedged in a bottom corner of the box was the still beautiful Mayville High School ring. Where did the box of "stuff" come from? Where had it been all these years? Faye had no idea, but she decided to try and find its rightful owner.

The Frankenmuth shop keeper took it upon herself to become a detective and track down and find the ring's owner. Mayville, Marlette, and Millington public school districts were contacted. A process of elimination soon revealed the only S.T. to graduate in 1968 from those schools.

In January of this year, the gorgeous piece of jewelry made its way back to Susan Tompkins finger. And what did Faye Morrison want in return for finding the lost treasure. Nothing. She would accept only the sincere "thank you" from its Wildcat owner.

The gracious gesture by the ring's finder makes for a happy ending to this 54-year Mayville High School class ring mystery.



Cycling Through Life – "Life Flashing Before My Eyes"

I recently saw the name of a young man that struck an emotional chord in me. His last name took me back to my school days at Mayville. I asked this person if they were related to a classmate friend from back in my 50's and 60's school days when times were more carefree. The person replied and stated that he was in fact a grandson to my old high school friend.

I was 5 years old in '52 when my parents purchased our family farm at the corner of Rich and Barnes Road just a little over two miles from the village of Fostoria. We moved from a small 'starter' home at Miller Lake. There I attended kindergarten at a small one room country school named Skelton school at the corner of Skelton and Columbiaville roads. There weren't any buses to take us to school. My brother Tom, neighbor girl Pat, and I walked about a mile and a half of dirt country road to get there.

I started school at Mayville in Miss McRoy's first grade in the fall of '52. At the time it was the only school in Mayville and included all grades, kindergarten through 12th. The 'city' kids walked to school while us country kids rode the school bus. The 80-acre farm with my mother Irene and father Amos was located on the southernmost school boundary. If we lived just one quarter of a mile to the south my brother Tom and I would have had to attended North Branch schools.

During the winter months school days when at

times, the temperature would reach into the single digits or below we didn't stand at the roadside waiting for the bus. We waited at the kitchen window looking to the south for the bus to turn the corner off Barnes onto Rich Road and head north to pick us up. For a few years until I got tall enough to see out that window I depended on my mother or brother to yell out "HERE COMES THE BUS!" Only then would we head for the road.

Because we were on the southern end of the bus route, we were also one of the first few to get on the bus. As we boarded it was easy to count and tell where kids were sitting by the frosty puffs of mist from their breath coming from behind the seats. It was still pretty quiet as not much was being spoken. It was early and the bus was cold. Some of the younger kids seemed to be a little fatter than they really were all bundled in heavy coats. You knew who they were under those coats because you were familiar with the style and color of the coats. As we headed back through the aisle between the bus seats looking for a place to sit you could hear the rattle of the folding bus door closing behind you signaling that you had better grab hold of the back of the seats as you walked back or risk falling when the bus lurched forward again.

As the bus began to fill with kids it became more difficult for the new boarders to find a place to sit. They would slowly walk back through the aisle between the seats scanning side to side looking for an empty seat or friend's 'saved' seat. Those who got on the bus earlier in the route would glance up at the newcomer as they passed by without a word spoken. Those that were chatting with someone across the aisle had to interrupt their conversation and swing their legs in out of the aisle while holding their homework books in their laps with one hand to allow the new arrival to pass.

As the bus filled the chatter became louder filling the air making it more difficult to distinguish individual conversations. When the bus got a mile or two closer to school it would finally get warm enough and coat hoods fell back to shoulders and gloves would begin to come off.

When the bus arrived at school kids would begin to rise from their seats. If you looked out the bus windows you would see the 'city kids' walking up the sidewalks in small groups with an occasional lone walker usually about to meet up with a friend. As the bus turned into the school's drive chatter began to subside as kids rose from their seats preparing to exit. When it finally came to a halt most kids would already be standing in line in the aisle holding their homework books in one hand on their sides and holding onto the seat's back with the other had to keep their balance. Most would be standing in the aisle while some still stood behind the seat waiting for someone to allow then into the departing line.

When the buses' door would fold open with that familiar clatter the first in line would begin to step down off the bus extending one leg down with that last step onto the pavement. There were usually other buses in line letting students off resulting in a broken line of kids or pairing with friends wandering their way toward the school's door.

If yours was one of the early buses to arrive you could hear echoes of indistinguishable chatter further down the school's hallway as you walked through the large wood double doors. If you were one of the later arrivals, you heard mixed chatter but could still distinguish the voice of those more familiar friends or classmates calling your name. Boys yelled out in last names like ... 'WARGO', 'DUNCAN', 'PLAIN', 'BERLIN'. Maybe because of it being an impersonal way of addressing each other.

Girls used mostly first names like Susan, Ann, or Cindy maybe because it's a sign of familiarity that denotes closeness that may have been too touchyfeely for us 'tough guys'.

The surname I heard that took me back happen to be a grandson of my high school friend whom I attempted to contact many times in later years but for some reason or another it just didn't seem to happen. As we move on in life after those school days and head on our way to separate paths and into the world, we become involved in our personal lives such as family, careers and other callings.

Those days past seem to fade for a while in life, but the memories seem to rebound as we get older.

This high school friend and I did not ride the same bus as he was one of the north Mayville country kids. But almost every day we would meet and hang out in those same chatter filled hallways where we would razz and shove each other around and walk down those same halls, books at our sides to attend many of the same classes.
