

This year the Alumni Association has chosen to honor John- '59 and the late Sandra (*Howard*) Secord - '60, for their many years of service on the Alumni Board, as well as to the Mayville Community Schools.

Sandra "Sandy" Lee *Howard* Secord passed away after a lengthy illness on February 11, 2019. Sandy was born January 3, 1942 to the late Charles and Gladys Mae (*Jones*) Howard in Caro, Michigan, one of eight children, with five sisters and two brothers. She graduated from Mayville High School with the class of 1960.

Sandy married John Secord on March 23, 1963 at the Fostoria United Methodist Church where she was a dedicated member for 55 years. Together they raised three children, all who attended and graduated from Mayville High School—Sherri '82, Renee' '83 and Jeff '87.

Many alumni will remember Sandy as a favorite bus driver, smiling school cook, and cheerful janitor. She began her career with the May-ville Schools as a busdriver in 1985, and in 1987 she worked in the High School kitchen, as well as driving bus. In 1996 Sandy transferred



from a cooking position to a custodial position at the Elementary School, where she worked until her retirement in 2000.

Sandy was a seamstress and did a lot of sewing and alterations for many people over the years. She made her own wedding gown, along with the dresses for her attendants. She also made her daughter Sherri's wedding dress, from pattern to completion, and she made all four bridesmaid dress, as well as dresses for the bridal train bearers. She also baked and decorated the wedding cake and was hostess of the backyard wedding for four hundred guests! Sandy also made her daughter Renee's wedding dress, the bridesmaid's dresses and the wedding cake. When her son Jeff got married, she made that wedding cake as well.



Sandy loved baking and cooking and over the years she decorated many special occasion cakes as well as making and selling chocolate candy to fellow workers on her breaks when she worked for RJ Chambers in Lapeer. She did the same for the Mayville school staff when she worked there.

Sandy mastered many things, from cake decorating and candy making to sewing, knitting, crocheting, basket weaving, and even macramé, but she loved to travel with friends and family and spend time with her grandchildren and great-grand children.



John Ernest Secord was born November 15, 1941 to Ada Bell (Osburn) and Harold John Secord of Columbiaville, Michigan. John was the oldest of three boys. When he was 15 years old his father suffered a fatal heart attack while at work at the Fisher Body Grand Blanc Plant. John's mother later became an Elementary School teacher in Fostoria and then Mayville, where she taught until her retirement in 1978. Many Alumni will remember her as Mrs. Ada Harp.

John graduated in 1959 from MHS and enrolled in Michigan State University, earning a Bachelors Degree in microbiology in June of 1963. After graduation from MSU, he and Sandy moved to Grand Rapids where John began his internship at St. Mary's Hospital. During this time Sandy worked for a dry cleaner, doing clothing alterations. Their first daughter, Sherri Lynn was born in December of 1963.

In 1964 John began working in the lab at the Lapeer County General hospital. Their

second daughter, Renee' was born in 1965. Around that same time John began working for Dr. James Higgens PHD, in a experimental department of the Lapeer State Home. Following the birth of their son Jeffery in 1969, John and Sandy purchased land on Millington Road near Fostoria and put in a double-wide home, which remained their residence until the fall of 2018.

Another job change found John working in Saginaw in a commercial lab before accepting a job at a hospital in Cordova, Alaska, a small town on the east side of the Prince William Sound— 2,783 miles from Fostoria, Michigan. Three years later in 1976, the Secord family returned to Michigan and resided for a time in Westland, near Detroit, before moving back into their house near Fostoria.

In 1987, John ran for and won, a seat on the Mayville Board of Education. He served a four-year term and in 1991 he was re-elected for another term, serving a total of eight years on the BOE in various offices. In 2007,

John retired from the Hills and Dales Hospital in Cass City, where he had worked for 30 years.

Both John and Sandy enjoyed traveling and were able to visit all of the states at least once. They also took each of their grandchildren on a week long vacation with them when they turned 10 years old, and they took day trips throughout Michigan with their great-grandchildren.

All three of John and Sandy's children graduated from Mayville High School and all of their grandchildren have, or will graduate from Mayville as well, with the exception of one grandson. Their great-granddaughter Danielle attended Head Start this year and will attend Kindergarten for the 2019-2020 school year at Mayville Elementary.

John and Sandy have been active on the Alumni Association Board for more than 20 years. They have served as Members-at-Large, on the Scholarship Committee, participated at the Annual Alumni Banquets and John was President as well as Seretary of the Alumni Board for several years. Their contributions to the Alumni Association and to the Mayville Schools has been extensive, and their hard work, dedication and support over the years has been greatly appreciated, and an inspiration to many alumni past and present.



It's 11 degrees outside and a cold wind howls on a January day while Robert Tallman leads a visitor on a tour of the 38-acre testament to nature that he and his wife, Diane, have created just west of Mayville – the community where he taught, learned from others, and inspired many for more than 30 years.

Bob, as his friends call him, gestures with a raised left arm and an ungloved hand in a wide arc. "And right over there is our underground river," he says through rosy cheeks, the only visible sign that he senses the cold.

For Mr. Tallman, as his students called him, this was just another cold day in paradise.

The Tallmans, who were named Tuscola County Wildlife Conservationists and Conservation Educators of the year in 2012, have dedicated their lives to sharing their love of nature with others.

Bob leads his visitor on a forty-minute tour where he describes the flora and fauna of the partially wooded property in such detail and with so much affection that it's easy to tell he planted and nurtured many of the seedlings that make up this preserve.

Later, in the comfort of their cozy home, Bob fondly recalls many of the students he worked with on a wide variety of projects.

When the visitor asks him to talk about the Mayville High School Class of 1969, which will be celebrating its 50th graduation anniversary this summer, a wide grin slowly spreads across his face, causing his eyes to brighten and his eyebrows to dance.

"Well, I believe I learned more from students in the Class of '69 than they learned from me," he said, maintaining the adventurous, almost mischievous, smile. "Those students taught me that they thought they were in charge, and I had to figure out a way to use that thinking to get them to learn without realizing that I was in charge."

Mr. Tallman, who joined the Mayville teaching Gang of Bobs – Bob Warren, Bob Cudney, Bob McGregor, and

Bob Morrison, thinks the Class of '69 marked the beginning a new era for the school district.

"The Class of '69, in my view, was really the beginning of the Golden Age for Mayville Schools, the era of Super-intendent Jerome Thiennes," he said. "We were doing a lot of the things right here at Mayville Schools that became models for the Intermediate School District."

Students recall Mr. Tallman, a native of Pontiac, warmly. They loved his passion for nature and science, and the way he worked with them. When asked about the educator, students almost always respond by using one



word, "Buzz!" - the word he used to correct them rather than using the dreaded: "Wrong!"

Laura Lawless Walker, Class of '90, said the science teacher treated all students equally, indifferent to what social class they came from or their family name.

"Mr. Tallman had a passion for science that could not be subdued by the sarcasm of high school students," Lawless Walker said. "His goal was to enlighten youth with the knowledge of science, and he was very good at what he did."

Shannon Marie Jankowiak Noth, another Mayville grad, recalls fondly the experience of being pregnant while attending his classes.

"Oh, Dear Lord, he wanted to deliver my baby with cow forceps," she said, laughing. "He was such a ham! Being pregnant in his class was cool be-



cause he always shared his microwave popcorn with me."

Many former students recognized that Bob Tallman's influence extended far beyond the classroom. He was active in the local community, Tuscola County and at the state level.

Susan Elaine Walker, Class of '70 who became a noted booster and activist across Tuscola County, said she is delighted to call Bob and Diane her friends.

"These are two very exceptional people and we are so fortunate to have had them leading our community," she said. "Bob and Diane are dedicated volunteers, unselfishly helping many individuals and families. Their hard work has resulted in countless humanitarian contributions. I am honored to know them."

Bob Tallman's love for nature and science is now well documented, but his first love was music and the clarinet. It began with his Aunt Betty playing Big Band music on a Baby Grand piano. As a fourth-grader, he was lead soprano in the church boys' choir. During his senior year in high school, he and the 1st Chair trumpet players taught beginning bands at three different elementary schools. Playing clarinet and singing 50 to 60 times a year rekindles his love of music to this day.

Mr. Tallman's affinity for plants started with a problem – trying to grow pine trees from pine seed. His solution was growing trees and shrubs in portable containers, which saved time and labor. A paper he wrote on the subject resulted in a four-year scholarship to the University of Michigan.

The Tallmans now have 51 tree species around their home and over 200 species of plants inside a two-story greenhouse attached to their home. A spinoff of this interest was the development of the Mayville Forestry Class that maintained village trees, township cemeteries, and the school grounds for 25 years.

Bob's interest in education led to work with Diane in right brain – left brain function. The learning studies spawned numerous Advanced Biology projects and spread learning techniques into the elementary school.

He continued making observations of the ways brain function affected student learning, incorporating these observations into his teaching style.

Studying botany enabled Bob to earn additional majors in Zoology and Limnology. He worked with the state Department of Natural Resources and state department of Environmental Quality on environmental problems. His study of human anatomy led to him becoming a Woodrow Wilson fellow at Princeton University where he learned about DNA fingerprinting and monoclonal antibodies. He started teaching DNA fingerprinting at May-ville High in 1993.

A lifetime of study and learning earned Mr. Tallman a number of advanced degrees. In fact, a casual observer of his education might conclude that he had more majors than the U.S. Army. Interesting, considering the conservationist started his education in the first grade of a one-room schoolhouse near Route 66 in Missouri

where his dad served in the military during the Korean War conflict.



Accolades for Bob and his work continued to pile up over the years. He was named Michigan Biology Teacher of the Year in 1976. He's had numerous citations in Who's Who in America. Bob also helped develop the Science Objectives for the State of Michigan and wrote lessons for K-12 school children for nature centers.

After retiring from Mayville Schools in 2000 after 32 years, Bob taught graduate classes at Saginaw Valley State University, student teachers for Central Michigan University, and as an adjunct biology teacher at Delta College.

Bob and Diane met at the University of Michigan and will celebrate 52 years of marriage this year. They have

three children: Colleen, Bob M., and Andy. The Tallmans have six grandchildren who keep them busy and interested in new activities.

After the tour and discussion concluded at the Tallman home, the visitor heads to his vehicle in the driveway. Bob follows, talking and gesturing the whole way. "But wait, I've got one more story to share with you," he says, holding up the index finger on his right hand. The visitor listens, but doubts that his well of stories is running dry.

That's what happens when a dedicated educator lives an overflowing life of discovery, learning and sharing. There's always going to be one more good story to tell.

Time to look forward and plan for the future...

This past year the question was asked if the Alumni Association would set up and administer individual scholarships for alumni members, so I will try and answer that question. The Alumni Association is a 501(c)(3) -a tax exempt organization, and as such we must follow the IRS guidelines for scholarship funding and administration.

We are able to accept donations specified solely for our scholarship fund, however, we can not operate to serve private interests of individuals, as the Federal Government prohibits this. In other words, we cannot award scholarsip monies per individual requirements. This simply means that we cannot set up and administer scholarship funds for individual persons. Any and all monies that are donated to our Alumni Scholarship Fund in honor or memory of loved ones, must be awarded per the guidelines of our association by-laws, and in accordance with the IRS rules. Any alumni member is able to set up a scholarship fund and administer it on their own if they desire, but the Alumni Association cannot be involved.

The "awarding" of the 2018 Alumni Scholarship to a graduating senior at the 2018 Banquet, did not go as anticipated, and the senior who was chosen to receive the award, failed to attend the banquet or to respond to follow-up corresepondence from the Alumni Association. I have talked before how difficult it is to get the seniors to apply for this scholarship, as well as the many other scholarships that are available to the seniors. I do not know how much easier we could make the process for them, nor do I think that it is too much to ask that the senior that receives the scholarship attend the banquet in order to accept the scholarship. This has been a part of the scholarship requirement from the very beginning when the Alumni Board first established the Alumni Scholarship Award.

It was after the 2018 Banquet that the Alumni Board decided it was time to switch our direction and take a look at how we could make better use of the scholarship for a graduating senior. Through the years the Alumni Association has been associated with the Norm Duncan Memorial, so the Board decided there needed to be more than just a recipient's name engraved on a plaque for receiving what I deem to be a prestigious award, given to a deserving, graduating high school scholar and athlete. Seniors "apply" for this award in theory just like they apply for any other scholarship—they are graded and scored just like most other scholarships. They are looked at for not only their scholastic ability but for their athletic ability and their overall high school career. The past recipients have proven themselves to be dedicated young men and women who strive to be the best at what they do—their accomplishments are lengthy to say the least and they are always goal oriented. Contary to what some Alumni have thought, there is not and never has been any money associated with the Duncan Memorial Award. It was the unanimous decision that as of the 2018/2019 school year the recipient of the Norm Duncan Award would also become the recipient of the Alumni Scholarship. We hope with this decision, going forward, we can continue to help further the education of our young people, whether it be a college, tech school, or any other continued education that they persue...

It is also my pleasure to announce we will continue our Ca\$h 4 Cla\$\$ scholarships for Mayville Teachers for the upcoming school year. We can actually see how these mini scholarships are used in the classrooms and we can reach more than 1 or 2 students with them each year. (You can read more about Ca\$h for Cla\$\$ on page 14) The purchases the teachers are making are items that have more than a one-time or one year use.

These teaching aids and supplies are used by dozens of students each day. Our goal is to help further and to strengthen the education of the students attending Mayville Schools. If we can help lessen the financial burdens for the educators who often reach into their own pockets to purchase items to keep the kids involved, engaged and thinking outside of the box —why not? We need to change with the times, to be creative in our own right and to think outside of the box as well!

In closing, I would like to offer my condolences to the family of long-time board member, Sandy *Howard* Secord—Class of 1960, who passed away on February 11, 2019. Sandy and John, both have been a very instrumental part of the Alumni Board for dozens of years. Their daughter Sherri (Secord) Elenbaum - '82 is also a part of our current Board. We will miss Sandy and her cheerful smile, and we are honored that she was part of our Board for so long, and helped with so many Annual Alumni Banquets, and served as part of our Scholarship Committee for many years. Her passing leaves an empty place in our hearts as well as our board.


