2024 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements

County Fairs

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.

All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at <u>https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx</u>.

2. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. If an official electronic CVI is utilized, the exhibitor should be able to log on and show Bureau of Animal Health Personnel the completed CVI.

CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.

3. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.

Animal identification number (AIN): A numbering system for the official identification of individual animals in the United States that provides a nationally unique identification number for each animal. The AIN consists of 15 digits, with the first 3 being the country code (840 for the United States or a unique country code for any U.S. territory that has such a code and elects to use it in place of the 840 code).

4. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.

- 5. CVIs for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 6. CVIs for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 7. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise.

Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.

Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.

In the event of the suspicion of or diagnosis of a foreign animal disease, emerging animal disease, or other actionable disease, animals may be subject to quarantine on the fairgrounds until such time that it is determined that the disease is no longer a threat.

8. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. Examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

9. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.

Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.

10. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

CATTLE

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, approved official ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable), or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

Beginning in 2025, individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Illinois Cattle

Brucellosis

Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at <u>https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx</u>.

Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
 - C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
 - D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
- 2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
 - A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when

accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.

- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
 - C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

SWINE

Illinois Swine

Identification

- 1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for all barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine.

(Note: Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for interstate movement or official testing.)

Beginning in 2025, individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Brucellosis

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Pseudorabies

Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Out-of-State Swine

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at <u>https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx</u>.

Identification

- 1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is not acceptable for crossbred animals.

Beginning in 2025, individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Brucellosis

- 1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.

B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.

2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

Pseudorabies

- 1. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
- 2. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
- 3. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- 4. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

SHEEP

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Market Lambs

All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Illinois Sheep

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Sheep

All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at <u>https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx</u>.

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

GOATS

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

Illinois Goats

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Goats

All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at <u>https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx</u>.

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

Illinois Equine

- 1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
- 4. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

Out-of-State Equine

All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at <u>https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.</u>

- 1. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.







There is no shortage of history in Pike County when it comes to the topic of Truck and Tractor Pulling. To name a few, there is the Noble Harrison shop, the Rodhouse Sled, the McKinnon family, among many others. But on this day we are going to head to the Mississippi River bottoms, just north of "Monster Road", near the railroad tracks that some thrill seekers have been known to jump for a good time. Today we get to go pay a visit to Larry Hill (we were going to meet Ronnie as well but he was vacationing in the Ozarks) where we get to hear about going to the first National Farm Machinery Shows in Louisville, KY, a rainy mess in Minnesota, some historical facts about pulling in Pleasant Hill, IL, the advancement of safety features through the years, among many others.

Let's start with today. It was a breezy, "warm for March in Illinois" day. Farmers are getting the planters ready, and some are planting roadside beans to stir up buzz at the coffee shop. I pull into the Hill residence, and we waste no time talking about the pulls of yesteryear. I think an important point to bring up is what led up to Larry and I's conversation today. Larry's cousin Matt and I have been great friends since about 3rd grade. We've farmed acres of carpet together, went to a lot of motorsports events together, Macon, MO in the 90's, the drag races in Madison, IL, Tomah (and the Leinenkugel's Brewery), Henry, IL, Louisville, and many others. Something that was always a topic of conversation were the "Larry and Ron-

nie clutches". So naturally the first question I asked Larry was, "Tell me about these clutches I have heard about for years". He wasted no time on his answer. "Well, we ended up exchanging information with Ron Schaefer from Texaco, IL. He had a 560 with a Crower Clutch and told us a few things about them. I think we ended up with one of the first Crower's in a 460 Farmall." That answered my first question and started the day's conversation.

Larry started pulling in 1964/1965 on a Wards Tractor. "I bought this tractor for \$600 and actually fixed it up as an FFA project in high school". This would be the tractor Larry piloted when he was 18-19 years old at the 1st National Farm Machinery Show in 1969, taking 1st place in the 5,000

(light) class. "The tractor had a flathead Chrysler 6-cylinder engine" according to Larry. I think it's relevant to mention that when everyone from the area was first going to Louisville, Interstate 64 did not exist. There were no cell phones or other modern conveniences (Like Google Maps). I asked Larry to take us through the first trip. "I think it took probably close to 10 hours on the road. Every road was 2 lane, and I don't think my truck went more than 50-55 MPH. I remember stopping in Vincennes, IN to stay at a hotel, and then started driving the next day". For comparison to today, you can make that trip from Pleasant Hill in 5 hours if you keep your foot in it and only stop when necessary. Larry made it to Louisville and took 1st place at the first trac-

tor pull. When asked about the track, he mentioned what every puller still says to this day. "It always had a hard bite. Set the gear lower than what you thought and let it go". He also mentioned that "Sleds back then were not like they are today. Back then they started heavy, and they stayed heavy". He also mentioned that Broadbent arena as we know it today was not there in the early years. "In the early years we pitted outside, the whole time. That cold weather was rough on the alcohol tractors". In 1970 the Wards Tractor returned, and Ronnie drove that one to another 1st place finish. Larry was unable to be there as he signed up for the National Guard in Fort Bragg, NC around that time. Larry was able to return in 1971, but this time with a new tractor, a Farmall 460. The 460's first appearance ever was in Bethany, MO where the tractor took 1st place, but he burnt the clutch out. That tractor went to Louisville and did not place in 71. In 1972 that same 460 took 1st place, and he got a 2nd place there either the next year or year after. Larry says they always did well (at least in the top 8) when they went to Louisville. He thinks their last year was in the early 1980's. At that last pull, there were around 8 460's there, and he thinks about 6 of them blew the rear ends or axle housings. Before Louis-ville, the Hill's removed their cast iron decks off, and replaced with aluminum. They did not blow theirs apart, but he said it definitely took some damage from that biting track.

The 1st pull Larry remembers going to was when he was a child, and his dad pulled "A W6 International at Pleasant Hill. The sled (which was a pan) had sandbags piled on it, and the tractors basically jerked the sled 20-30 ft. 40 foot was a long pull for that time. You'll have to double check this, but I'm fairly sure the tractor then hooked back on to the other side of the sled and pulled it the other way, and they measured that distance too, but I'm not 100% sure on that". When asked about more early pulling days, Larry says "there were stakes, roughly 10 feet apart going down the track. A guy stood at each stake, and as the sled went past, people stepped on the sled." He then went on to mention that the Rodhouse's built one of the early weight transfer sleds to help with that. I asked them about one of the crazier stories they had to share,

which was an interesting one. He mentioned that they recall "all the local pullers finished pulling at a local show (they think Hardin, IL), and a bunch of them loaded up that night to head to Mankato, MN. It was a 4 day event, and we pulled on day #1. I backed up to the sled and it started to downpour and rained out the rest of the pull. It rained so much everyone got stuck in the muddy pits, and we stayed in Ron Schaefer's travel bus. Finally, bulldozers came in to help clear roads, clean the mud off the grounds, and they were ready to go. Instead of going home though, Darrel Richards and Ed Dreisden told us to follow them to Spencer, Iowa. They said if you make the cut on day 1 you'll get a chance to hook a second time. There were 54 tractors there in my class, and I ended up getting 2nd place.'

Larry also mentioned that he


tried for years to win the M&W pull, because the first-place trophy was "a large silver cup. When I finally won the M&W they switched from the big silver cup to a regular trophy. I was happy to win, but disappointed in the trophy switch. When asked about some of the guys he competed with in the Light Tractor Class, Donald McKinnon's 180, "Which you can find on YouTube if you search Alton, IL NTPA 1973" "Russel Miner was one of the only guys I knew that ran the Wards tractor with the Wards tires, which were their own type of tire similar to a road grader" Other friends and competitors noted were "Ron Schaefer, Lloyd/Steve Wiewell, PC Long, the Brabec's, Doug Leek, Henry Piper, the Carroll family's Levee Leeper, Dave Marino, Roy Talon's 4010, and Kimber Wilson of Smithfield.'

The last part we talked about

was the evolution of safety and safety equipment. He remembers watching "the guy in front of me at Louisville who had a bucket seat. He took off, and the tractor kept coming up and he never let off of it. The tractor came over on top of him (this is pre-wheelie bars) and the steering wheel was stuck up under his ribs, I thought he was dead when we got there." When they lifted the tractor off him, he was pretty banged up, but overall ok. "He ended up getting some plastic ribs or something, but he made it". In Kansas City, he witnessed another tractor come over on top of a puller and this guy "had to lay on a board while we waited on an ambulance. This was before EMS was required to be on the grounds during an event".

And the most notable was the modified tractor in the early 70's where the flywheel came out of the tractor in Pleasant Hill (next page bottom left). "There was a woman leaning against a post, and the flywheel/shrapnel hit her in the foot and she lost part of her foot".

Toward the early 80's, Larry said they converted to diesel, and went with port injection. From there they began staging turbo chargers, and then start-ed blowing the bottom ends out of the engines. They tried heat treating rods, and that didn't work. It became apparent that they'd have to start upgrading the lower end, and he started with a new set of Crower rods. The rods took a long time to get to him, and by that time, the tractor had been sitting long enough that he realized it was probably the end of tractor pulling.



Larry's tractor sold off in parts, with the frame and chassis going to Missouri. Ronnie's 460 ended up in Canada. They hauled it to the border in Minnesota, and that was it. Finally, as our conversation drew to a close, I had to ask if they were still primarily a Case IH farm family. "We've pretty much switched to John Deere for farming, but I've still got the 1206 (Bottomright) in the shed".

They ll work on the family farm that Willie Hill started in 1942. Larry and Charlotte's home remains on site and Larry's grandson Kendrick lives in their old homeplace and works on the farm full time. Willie passed in 1988 and the heritage continued. Larry's late son Brian and wife Marsha live just a few miles away. Brian worked at Titan Wheel for a few years after school and helped farm during busy season. Brian went full-time farming in 1998. Brian loved tractor pulling from an early age and that continued throughout his life. If there was a pull in the area, he was probably there, and was always the life of the grandstands, someone that was fun to be around. Unfortunately, Brian lost his fight with kidney cancer in August 2022. I'd like you to take the next few moments and remember Brian Matthew Hill -7/24/1972-8/13/2022.
