When I was asked to be Rectora, I really didn't have to think of a theme for the weekend because it was something that happened to me on my weekend. My theme was - or should I say IS - "A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you. You will be my people and I will be your God." Ezekiel 36: 26, 28. I consecrated the weekend, all candidates, and all team members to Our Lady of Guadalupe. My prayer was for a weekend of peace, renewal, conversion of hearts and spirits.

There were many special moments on the Cursillo. Everyone in attendance of a Cursillo has their own moments which are closest to their hearts. I will share only a couple of mine or this might never reach an end! The first was the blessing of seeing music touch the hearts and minds and souls of the candidates as they turned shining faces heavenward with eyes closed, just listening. At the Clausura, one of the candidates stood up and told us her birth story and how she had come to bear the name Guadalupe, and how she had come to this Cursillo after being asked and refusing twice before. She now has a whole new take on things and is going home to make a shrine to Our Lady of Guadalupe. The other incident is something that also leaves me awed - one of the candidates told how a year ago she went to the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, found herself buying a scapular of Our Lady of Guadalupe, then praying and fasting for someone whom she would give the scapular to. She was twice inspired to give it, yet did not. At the Clausura she said she finally understood who was to receive it, took it off and presented it to me. What a beautiful and humbling moment. I thank God for the beautiful experiences that serving as Rectora brought to me. I hope the candidates find themselves also blessed by the work this entire team did. A Cursillo is always the sum of everyone and the efforts of all. Many thanks to everyone who listened, heard, and acted on the call of the Holy Spirit to bring this Cursillo to fruition.
