Pre-Cursillo Report by Lenore Zegiel

In the Fundamental Ideas of the Cursillo Movement it states that in the PreCursillo stage, our Movement initiates the evangelizing process in which it must accomplish in order to fulfill its purpose.



Sponsoring candidates is one of the main aspects of the PreCursillo, and an important factor that contributes to the success of the Cursillo Weekend; to the continued development of a personal relationship with Christ; to living a life of Grace and having the tools to become the servant-leaders of Christ; to the Post Cursillo that supports, encourages, equips and enables each Cursillista to become a part of the evangelizing mission of the Catholic Church.

These three stages of The Cursillo Movement are so closely connected that it can be said that they constitute an organic whole, a living and thriving organism, and a failure in the functioning of any one of the three stages of the Movement will have a direct consequence on the other two.

Through the last six months many different venues were used to spread information about the Cursillo Movement, such as: letters were sent to all the pastors in the dioceses, over 1,500 pamphlets were given away, Ambo Talks were given, Cursillistas represented the Cursillo Movement at ministry fairs, and Articles about the Movement, such as the bilingual *Ultreya* and Cursillo picnic were published in the *Observer*. This information about the movement is slowly spreading throughout the Rockford Diocese. People are becoming aware that we are here to serve Christ and others. But these are just venues to give information about the Movement and not meant to be a substitute for our Lord's call to evangelize our environments.

It is through knowing and continuing to develop our friendship with Christ that we are given the ability and power to tell others about Him. It is through this visible and joyous expression of our relationship with Jesus that draws those around us to hear and receive the Love of God, so our environments will become Christ centered.

May your friendship with Christ, empower you to "Make a friend, Be a Friend, and Bring Your Friend to Christ"!

Who are the Cursillo Leaders?

All who attend a Cursillo Weekend are called Cursillistas. On your weekend, during the Leaders talk, we affirm that all, for good or bad, are leaders of something or someone in life. They must be Christian leaders within their environments (home, work, social, political, etc.); however, not all Cursillistas are called or choose to become Cursillo Leaders.

“The worst enemies of a movement are those who promote it without understanding it.”

(Structure of Ideas, Ultreya Press)

Leaders are total leaders. Leadership entails much more than just being on Cursillo teams. Leaders are the axis of Ultreya and of Christianity and are involved in **all the phases** of the Movement---Precursillo, 3-Day Cursillo, as well as the Postcursillo. Involved means making things happen. This is done primarily through personal contact with: (1) persons in the Precursillo, (2) participants on the Weekend, and (3) Cursillistas in their Fourth Day.

The leaders' role is to give a witness that is exemplary in terms of living in grace and using the Cursillo method. The Leader is not a technician, an organizer or a speaker. He is a person who lives the Christian life to the fullest and takes every opportunity to share it with others in their environments.

What is an Ultreya?

"Ultreya" is a Spanish word, derived from the original Latin, meaning Onward! It was commonly used by pilgrims to greet and to encourage one another along the way. This word is now used by the Cursillo community to signify the meeting which is held after a Cursillo experience. This meeting may be between Cursillistas from one or several communities.

The Ultreya gathers groups together from a particular region and provides continuity by contributing to the maintenance of the Cursillo spirit and by revealing the reality of the living Church. In a climate of friendship, members share their life experiences based on a passage from Scripture or the three tenets of Cursillo life: Prayer, Study, and Action. This sharing can be contemplative in nature or may deal with an evangelizing experience. These sharing's from real-life experience serve as examples to all of us of the challenge which Jesus lays before His followers: "Go and do likewise."

As its name implies, the Ultreya, is a call to move forward and to keep the flame of the Cursillo burning brightly.
