Grand Knight's Message

Brothers,

I thought I would fill you all in on the history of our namesake Bishop Henri Regis Granjon. I thought it was interesting to find out about him and some of the things that he accomplished in his life as a priest and Bishop.

Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Tucson, Arizona, where he served for 22 years, from 1900 until his death in 1922. Most Reverend Henri Regis Granjon, D.D., attended Saint Sulpice Seminary in Paris, France, where he was named a Reverend Bishop Henry Regis Granjon, D.D. Doctor of Divinity and ordained a Catho-

lic priest on December 17, 1887. He came to America in 1889, and the following year he went to serve in the Arizona Missions. He was the pastor of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Tombstone from 1892 to 1895, and he also served in New Mexico and Montana. In 1897, he went to St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore, Maryland, where he was the director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. When Bishop Peter Bourgade of Tucson was chosen to be the Archbishop of Santa Fe, New Mexico,

in 1899, Pope Leo XIII selected Father Granjon as his successor in Arizona. He was consecrated as the third bishop of Tucson by Cardinal James Gibbons in Baltimore on June 17, 1900. He then oversaw the growth of his diocese, including the design and construction of Marist College in 1915 and Santa Cruz Catholic Church in 1919. Bishop Granjon returned to Europe in April of 1922 for an ad limina visit with Pope Pius XI, and to seek treatment for angina pectoris, which had afflicted him for some time. He died at Brignais, France, at age 59, and was buried there. Bishop Jean-Marie Bourchany, auxiliary bishop of Lyons, presided at his funeral Mass.

In 1887 an earthquake damaged parts of San Xavier de Blanc Mission in Tucson. In 1905 Bishop Granjon started major repairs on the Mission. If you go around the back of the Mission you will see a huge gate, this gate is called the Bishop Granjon Gate because the Bishop wanted something there to bring the Natives and others into the Church.

If you get a chance to get to San Xavier Mission take the short tour to find out more about the history of the Mission itself and some other facts about some of the paintings and statues in the Church

Chaplain's Message

Question: You die! But God grants you the gift of returning to earth to visit one person. Who would that person be?

I'm sure that many Brother Knights would probably say their wife. But perhaps another person would get their attention.

I write this column on the Feast of Saint Mary Magdalene, July 22nd. How opportune! For Jesus the first person he appeared to after his resurrection was Mary Magdalene. Not the apostles nor his mother Mary nor his close friend, Lazarus. No! It was Mary of Magdalene...which says much of who she was in the life of Jesus.

Mary has gone through quite a renaissance over the history of the Church. Falsely accused of being a prostitute — "a sinful woman" — by Pope Gregory the Great in 1591, this female friend of Jesus has, through scripture scholarship, prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, been rehabilitated! Now she is given a "feast" in her honor — and acknowledged at "Apostle to the apostles". It was to Mary whom Jesus told to bring the news of his resurrection to his apostles/disciples.

Mary of Magdalene's feast reminds us of the importance of women in our Church and in the spread of the Good News of Jesus. Women easily make up more than half of the ministers in our Church – from liturgical ministries – to being teachers of religion – to volunteers in the work of the Church. Without the female presence and their unique gifts in the Church, we would be an improvised Church.

We must always strive to make sure that both female and male gifts and talents in their totality are present in the Body of Christ. In his love and affection for Mary of Magdalene, Jesus would expect this as part of our role & ministry as Brother Knights.

Catechism Studies

295. Why did Christ institute the sacraments of Penance and the Anointing of the Sick?

Christ, the physician of our soul and body, instituted these sacraments because the new life that he gives us in the sacraments of Christian initiation can be weakened and even lost because of sin. Therefore, Christ willed that his Church should continue his work of healing and salvation by means off these two sacraments.

296. What is the name of this sacrament?

It is called the sacrament of Penance, the sacrament of Reconciliation, the sacrament of Forgiveness, the sacrament of Confession, and the sacrament of Conversion.

297. Why is there a sacrament of Reconciliation after Baptism?

Since the new life of grace received in Baptism does not abolish the weakness of human nature nor the inclination to sin (that is, *concupiscence*), Christ instituted this sacrament for the conversion of the baptized who have been separated from him by sin.
